Hansford woman claims state title . . . Wagner is pheasant cook off champ

It seems only fitting that the Texas state pheasant cook-off champ is a lady from the heart of the Lone Star State's pheasant raising region -- and that's Wanda Wagner of Hansford county, winner of the Texas Department of Agriculture's first annual pheasant cookoff held this past weekend in Amarillo.

Heart may be stretching things just a bit -- Wanda lives in the Hitchland community which is just a stone's throw from the Texas-Oklahoma border in Hansford county.

And, with typical Texan pride, she's quick to point out just where the border is to indicate her residency in the Alamo state.

Her winning entry -- Pheasant K-Bobs with Rice -- earned her a

pair of round trip tickets to anyplace in the continental United States, and a good deal of publicity, both in the area and state wide.

Wanda is a familiar face around the county with ties in both Gruver

and Spearman. Ashley is a freshman at GHS while Kimberley is a fifth grade student at Gruver junior high.

Her husband, Richard L., manages to stay quite busy as ranch manager for Bill Logsdon.

Spearman.

While no stranger to cook off events -- she has participated in a state fair cook off -- this is her first win.

Both Wanda and her husband, Richard, were chosen as finalists for the state competition held in Amarillo.

Entrants were first asked to send in their recipes for judging and a panel chose the finalists from the recipes submitted.

Ironically, a pair of El Campo friends of the Hansford couple, also earned berths in the actual cookoff competition in Amarillo after submitting their recipes on entry blanks provided by Wanda. "I just sent them an entry blank and they were chosen," she

I knew when I came to Hansford county that it was a special place. It came through in the concern and caring displayed so openly by its residents.

I saw it when the concession stand in Gruver was ripped apart by tornadic winds. It was rebuilt and re-equipped immediately. Now it's bigger and better than the original structure.

I've seen it displayed in countless number of ways -- generally toward the youth of our fair community which is always an easy class to feel generous toward.

But the response to the special fund set up to help Earnest Newcomb was something really special.

Those who established the fund were hoping to be able to raise about \$600 for a new automatic focusing camera for the venerable Hansford photographer.

Instead, over \$1,000 was raised. They were able to not only purchase the camera, but a flash unit as well and a 100 to 200 mm telephoto lens. And there's still money left over.

Those funds will be used to purchase a gift certificate for the omnipresent Newcomb so he can purchase film and batteries and pay for the processing -- at least for a while -- on the numerous rolls of film he has developed each week.

And Ernie will continue to give away his pictures and his friends

will continue to smile and be pleased.

But now they can smile with more than a little pride. Because those pictures are being taken with a camera purchased out of love.

Somehow, that makes it just a little more special. Both for Ernie and the recipients of his efforts.

80-years old and growing stronger . . .

Paper grows with Spearman, county

Old Hansford was the birthplace for many important Hansford County beginnings and such was the case for the newspaper which was the forerunner of the Spearman Reporter which celebrates its 80th birthday with this edition.

In 1907 Hansford County Judge A.E. Townsend established the Hansford Investigator and thus was born the fledgling which was to become today's Reporter.

It was a community affair in those early years with citizens of the still young city of Hansford

banding together to build the paper's first office building.

Such county notables as W.S. McNabb, John Collard and R.E. Martin were members of the building committee which served as a focal point for the investigator's office construction.

The Investigator operated for two years before the equipment was sold to a concern in Ochiltree County and editor Harry F. Purcell went with the potpourri of machinery to help establish a paper in Hansford's neighboring county.

Another Hansford pioneer, S.B. Hale then established the Hansford Headlight to fill the void left by the exodus of the Investigator's equipment.

Shortly thereafter, Hale sold the paper to Porter Wright, a Guymon newsmen. Porter expanded the operation of the county newspaper to include job printing. He operated the business for a year then sold the paper back to Hale.

Hale handled the operations for a few months before finding J.H.

By Hansford voters . . .

OK given 12 items in Tuesday ballot

The two referenda on Tuesday's ballot seemed to outweigh all other considerations and prompted a heavier-than-expected voter turnout in both Hansford County and across the state of Texas in this off-year balloting.

A total of 1,194 of Hansford County's 3,309 registered voters -- or about 36 percent -- turned out to vote in Tuesday's constitutional amendment and referenda election, reports Hansford County clerk Amelia Johnson.

While the state split on the two

referenda items -- approving the parimutuel wagering and turning down an appointed state board of education -- Hansford County residents turned thumbs down to both.

The parimutuel wagering referendum, while disapproved by Hansford voters, was the closest of the two referenda in Hansford with 523 voting for and 651 voting against the measure.

The appointed state board of education referendum was soundly

Pheasant K-Bobs with Rice

by Wanda Wagner

- 2 Pheasant Breasts--boned and cut in 1-inch cubes
- 1/4 cup Soy sauce
- 1/4 cup Water
- 2 T. Dry white wine
- 2 T. Corn Oil
- 1 T. Minced onion
- 1/8 t. minced garlic
- 1 t. sugar
- 1/4 t. ground ginger

Mix marinade in medium bowl, add pheasant and stir to coat well. Let marinade at least one hour.

Prepare vegetables to go on skewers -- onions, green peppers, yellow squash and cherry tomatoes.

Start Rice Cooking

- 1 cup Texmate rice
- 2 T. butter
- 2 T. minced Celery
- 2 T. minced onion
- 2 cups hot water
- 3 crushed chicken boullion cubes

Melt butter and saute rice with celery and onions until it is clear. Pour in two cups hot water and boullion cubes. Cover and cook 15 minutes. Remove from heat and let set 10 minutes.

Place skewers of pheasant and vegetables over hot coals. Place several mesquite wood chips (soaked in water) over coals to add flavor and pink color to meat.

Turn after 10 to 15 minutes. Total cooking time on grill is 20 to 25 minutes. Serve over platter of rice.

laughs. "We even shared the same grill. They cooked that morning and we prepared ours that afternoon."

The El Campo couple, Mike and Betty Jo Prasek, flew up to Amarillo from Houston last Friday and met Wanda and Richard Saturday morning just before the cookoff began.

Where the irony comes in is the fact that "Mike won second place in the competition with his recipe."

"I chose the k-bobs recipe just to have something different to enter," she notes. "I know a lot of people either fry or grill their pheasant and I thought this would be a bit different."

The recipe Wanda utilized is one she adapted from a beef recipe of her own and -- true to cookoff regulations -- she used only Texas grown ingredients in preparing the dish.

Since pheasant season doesn't open until December, practicing for the event required a bit of versatility -- and even a little luck.

Wanda refined her recipe on a chicken as she adapted it from beef to poultry.

As luck would have it, a pheasant committed suicide by trying to pit itself against her husband's pickup a week or so before the contest and she was able to test the recipe on the actual meat.

"At first my marinade was too strong," Wanda remembers. "But I found a way to dilute it."

The results of her efforts were made apparent Saturday when she was named the cookoff champ from among 17 finalists from across the state.

The Hansford couple is waiting right now for the guidelines on their free trip before making a selection for their round trip air fare.

She even consented to sharing her state championship recipe with her county neighbors and it is reprinted here in full.


Three sisters, Hazel Carr of Lake Charles, La., Irma Cook of Rayville, La., and Peal Carpenter of Shreveport, La.;

Buchanan who bought the **Headlight** and its accoutrements in July of 1911.

The versatile Hansford pioneer kept the **Headlight** in his capable hands for over seven years before a stock company of Hansford citizens purchased the ongoing business.

That stock company included founder Hale, John R. Collard and M.B. Wright. They hired R.B. Quinn of Guymon to edit the publication along with Oran Kelly as mechanical foreman.

Owner volatility seemed to be the order of the day and, true to form, within six months the paper changed hands again. This time it was Kelly, the paper's pressman, who purchased the publication.

Kelly owned and operated the **Headlight** for some 11 years -- the longest one-owner stint of the paper's still young life -- and was the owner when the paper was moved to Spearman and changed the name to the **Reporter**.

In 1928, the **Reporter** changed hands again although Kelly remained on hand for some three years after the sale to edit the publication.

The new owner was a corporation -- something still new to the rugged country of West Texas -- Nunn Warren Publishing Company with David M. Warren as manager.

Following the resignation of Kelly, J. Dave Cameron of Childress became editor manager of the **Reporter**.

Then, in 1932, W.J. Miller became editor of the Spearman newspaper. Later he bought out the newspaper and thus began the single longest ownership run of the **Investigator** turned **Headlight** turned **Reporter**.

Miller operated the **Reporter** until his death in the late 1960's at which time his son, Billy, took over the day-to-day operations of the newspaper.

That arrangement worked well for both Spearman and Hansford County with the younger Miller adding to the publication front of the county by taking over a Sunday publication, the **Hansford Plainsman**, and by establishing a paper for the citizens of Gruver, the **Statesman**.

These younger sisters of the **Reporter** are only some 17 years old now -- well behind the wizened lead of the Spearman Thursday newspaper who is 80 years old now.

In April this year, Miller sold his interest in the **Reporter** to a San Antonio corporation, **Texas Independent Newspapers, Inc.** which is headed by general manager **Howard S. Schramm**.

A Dumas newsman, James C. Jarrett, was hired as publisher of the **Reporter** and the **Reporter** continues to function as both a vital source of community news and happenings as well as an advertising leader for the Hansford County community it serves.

As the oldest continuous business operation in the county, the **Reporter** has seen a good number of changes in Hansford County.

It's seen the good times and the

While it appeared at presstime Wednesday that residents of the state would be okaying 17 of the 25 proposed amendments, Hansford County voters gave their nod to only 12.

Hansford voters okayed the amendment to establish a grain warehouse self-insurance fund; to limit school tax increases on the homestead of surviving elderly spouses; to issue bonds to pay for correctional, mental health and mental retardation facilities;

Only one amendment was close in its loss within Hansford County. Amendment 10 -- to exempt from taxes, if local voters approve, certain personal property not used to produce income -- failed in the county by a vote of 535 to 539.

Renowned group of mentally retarded persons . . . Handbell choir to present program

The Woodhaven Handbell Ringers -- a group of mentally retarded musicians -- will present a special concert at the First Christian Church in Spearman next Tuesday.

The one-hour presentation will begin at 7:30 that evening in the Spearman church.

English handbell ringers have been a tradition for many years. However, mentally retarded handbell ringers are newer in concept.

Woodhaven Learning Center is a residential school for mentally retarded persons in Columbia, Mo. and has been working with handbell ringers since late 1972.

The center received a set of handbells as a gift from a Christian Church in Florida and began to experiment with ways to use them with their young people.

Their first presentation came after only three rehearsals when they played "Row, Row, Row Your Boat" for the Woodhaven board.

Since that time they have increased their concert to a full hour with a variety of modern religious and inspirational songs.

The program also includes vocal solos, piano solo and a number on the musical saw.

The Woodhaven Handbell Ringers have presented concerts in towns throughout Missouri and have travelled from coast to coast, from north to south and to Canada.

In the summer of 1973, the troupe was invited to play several

Mrs. Key is a native of Ochiltree county and had been a resident of Senior Village in Perryton.


She has one son who is a missionary at Stogo, in Western Africa. She has a daughter in Longview, Washington and another daughter at Nacogdoches, Tx.

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
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


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


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
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Nominations for recognition mailed out

The Texas Excellence Awards for Outstanding High School Teachers were created last year by the University of Texas at Austin Ex-Students' Association in cooperation with UT's College of Education. In the first year, 289 teachers who were nominated by

their principals were recognized in their hometowns for their outstanding contributions. Dr. Waneen Spirduso, Interim Dean of Education, explained that the program "... is the University's way of raising public awareness of the contributions that

teachers make, and the raising of the esteem of the teaching profession and individual teachers in communities across the state." According to Roy Vaughan, Executive Director of The Ex-Students' Association, any high school teacher in Texas is eligible to be nominated for the honor by his or her principal.

High school students, former students, parents and Texas Exes are encouraged to recommend nominees to their principal. The deadline for nominations is November 16.

Nominations which will lead to the recognition of several hundred distinguished high school teachers are being made by principals across Texas. Forms were mailed this week to every high school principal in the state.

All teachers selected for the award will be recognized through local publicity, and many will be honored by UT alumni clubs in their towns. Ten of them will be invited to the UT campus for special recognition.

The 10 will be selected by a committee composed of distinguished UT alumni, high school officials, and UT students, faculty and administrators.

The 10 honorees will receive a \$1,000, a commemorative sculpture, and an exclusive on-campus conference which will include meetings with top students, faculty, and administrators for informal discussion and intellectual exchange.

Specific University of Texas enrichment opportunities will be tailored to each honoree's field of expertise, putting the teachers in touch with faculty and facilities that are at the heart of the educational process.

U.S. Rig Count: Week of October 26, the count was 1,130 down 4 from the previous week. Comments: T. Boone Pickens, Jr., general partner of Mesa Limited Partnership, said that depressed stock prices could lead to new corporate takeovers.

Mr. Pickens, who was in Atlanta to speak at a symposium on corporate takeovers, told 700 executives, "If companies were attractive targets when the Dow was at 2,500, they will be even more attractive with the Dow at 1,800." Noting that some merger proposals had already been made following the market plunge, Mr. Pickens said deals could be shaped within days.

Mr. Pickens spoke at a seminar sponsored by the General Electric Credit Corporation. He said companies purchased recently in mergers or leveraged buyouts were not in more danger of failing than they were a week ago. "These deals are made on anticipated cash flow, and the market is not responding to cash flow," he added.

Mr. Pickens concluded that if the market is going to be down, it's going to be down. "If it's going to go sideways for a while, so be it. We've had markets like that before. And then we start building back from a new basis."


