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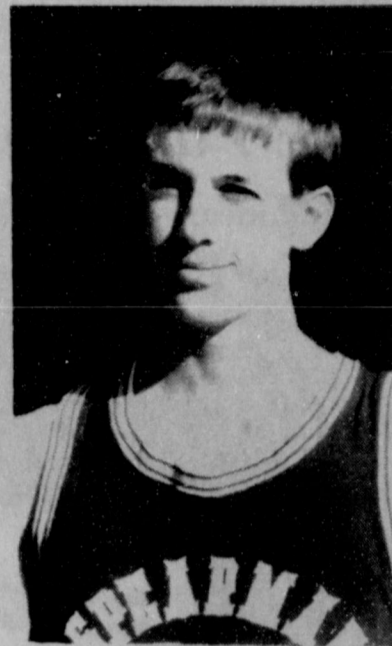
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To God a Note of Thanks

Friends, that there could be a wonder in the mind of the reader of the Bible articles, "To God a Note of Thanks" by Mrs. E. A. In height 5 feet and 1 inch and now at 98 year since Oct. 24, 1886, weigh near 100 pounds and by Gods breath given I am still here. Our home a small farm 1 1/2 miles north of Alba Missouri which was about 8 miles northwest of Carthage. At age 22 1/2 years I came to the Panhandle of Texas as the bride of Edwin Adams Grever our home 6 miles south of Wawaka, 15 miles east of Hansford and 15 miles west of Ochiltree. When a railroad came our way Wawaka's named changed to Waka. The Hansford town moved to Spearman and Ochiltree to Perryton. Throughout the years from 1908 to 1919 my soul was so very hungry for a closer walk with God in 1919 at the school house in Waka I surrendered my life completely to God and He sanctified spirit soul and body and oh such a greater peace was known. In 1921 at the Joe Davis home at an afternoon prayer service under the direction of Irene Dilworth, I tarried for the Baptism of the Holy Ghost, the Fathers seal that would give me the power needed to work for God and praise God the Holy Ghost that had witnessed of my salvation and sanctification came in felling my life witnessing to me of entering by taking complete control of my speech and speaking in a language I knew nothing of. (2nd chapter of Acts experience).

These blessings making me a new creature (yes a born again life.) My life flooded with joy peace and love and such a desire to live and tell others, and later one morning in the large living room seated with my Bible in my lap I was praying O God what can I do for you for all you have done for me, and when opening the Bible it was at the book of Ruth, and as definite at Ruth was told by Boaz not to go to another field but stay right there and labor until the close of harvest it was as the Lord speaking to remain in this field for your labor and this I have earnestly tried to do since. On Jan 20, 1985, when waking that morning that still small voice (The same voice that Eliah heard) told me to write these articles you are reading week after week. When knowing what God desired of me I lost no time in going to the Editor and Publisher of the Spearman Reporter to hear what he said about it. His reply, "Let the good work go on." And I fail to find words to Thank William M. Miller for his cooperation concerning this and beyond a doubt I can see and you can see without it these articles would not be published. My thanks also goes to anyone who may be helping in anyway. Friends, if any one is blessed in any way by my life, To God be the praise for I am only a sinner that was saved by Gods grace and now quoting Paul I say by the grace of God I am what I am. And now I write the words of some song writer. Oh I love to walk with Jesus like the publicans of old when He gathered them about Him and the blessed tidings told. How He came to bring deliverance to the captives in distress. Take away their

every burden giving perfect peace and rest. I will follow where He leadeth I will pasture where He feedeth I will follow all the way Lord I will follow Jesus every day. (By Gods Grace).

Our guest was Jake Dunkel - Rotarian - Perryton. The R. I. Board has designated February as World Understanding Month, a time to focus on this important aspect of the Object of Rotary. In addition, 23 February - the 82nd anniversary of Rotary's founding will be observed as World Understanding and Peace Day.

There is no medicine like hope, and no tonic so powerful as expectation of something better tomorrow.

There are monies provided by the 69th Texas Legislature in 1985 to make provisions for health care to the State's indigent and uninsured population. The programs are designed to not only provide health care to those who need health care, but also to cut the bad debt rate in hospitals and to save tax dollars.

The Panhandle Health Care Coalition works with counties, hospitals, hospital districts and clinics to coordinate eligibility screening, services, education and communications as well as other areas.

The grant programs are listed and summarized below: A. Indigent Health Care and treatment Act (S.B.1)

This act clarifies responsibilities of counties, public hospitals and hospit-

al districts in providing health care to indigent Texas residents. Counties without public facilities must provide specified health care services for residents whose incomes and resources do not exceed AFDC Program Standards but who are not eligible for Medicaid or other 3rd party coverage. b. Maternal Infant Health Improvement Act (MIHIA) (H.B. 1023)

This act provides for prenatal care for low income pregnant women in State targeted counties of underserved population or unmet need, and for comprehensive maternity care of medically high risk pregnant women and specialized care and follow-up for high risk infants born to these women in all counties without previous programs. These women must not be eligible for Medicaid or have other 3rd party coverage. c. Texas Primary Health Care Services Act (H.B. 1844)

This act provides funds to establish programs of high blood pressure treatment to low income persons not eligible for other forms of assistance or who do not have insurance. The program is designed to improve access to preventive and primary care services in order to reduce acute care emergency room and hospital costs.

Public Safety

Capt. Bob Russell, District Supervisor of the Amarillo Highway Patrol District comprising of 31 counties said, "For the year, 1986, our troopers investigated 63 fatal accidents, 884 personal injury accidents, and 1269 property damage accidents. There were 82 persons killed and 1328 persons injured in these accidents."

Sgt. Burt Christian of Borger stated, "In Hansford county, our troopers investigated 1 fatal accident, 1 personal injury accident, and 0 property damage accidents in the Year, 1986. 2 persons were killed and 2 person were injured in these accidents."

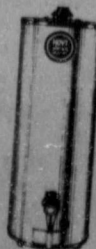

Friends, that there could be a wonder in the mind of the reader of the Bible articles, "To God a Note of Thanks" by Mrs. E. A. Greever that you read week after week, I feel it is pleasing to God that I write a very brief story of my life and of the call of God for the work he would have me do. In height 5 feet and 1 inch and now at 98 year since Oct. 24, 1886, weigh near 100 pounds and by Gods breath given I am still here. To be sure I am in this world no great person nor is it any great thing I have done nor am doing. I was of a family of 7 children our parents James Robert Teague and Alice Melva Jenkins Teague. Our home a small farm 1 1/2 miles north of Alba Missouri which was about 8 miles northwest of Carthage. At age 22 1/2 years I came to the Panhandle of Texas as the bride of Edwin Adams Greever our home 6 miles south of Wawaka, 15 miles east of Hansford and 15 miles west of Ochiltree. When a railroad came our way Wawaka's named changed to Waka. The Hansford town moved to Spearman and Ochiltree to Perryton. Throughout the years from 1908 to 1919 my soul was so very hungry for a closer walk with God in 1919 at the school house in Waka I surrendered my life completely to God and He sanctified spirit soul and body and oh such a greater peace was known. In 1921 at the Joe Davis home at an afternoon prayer service under the direction of Irene Dilworth, I tarried for the Baptism of the Holy Ghost, the Fathers seal that would give me the power needed to work for God and praise God the Holy Ghost that had witnessed of my salvation and sanctification came in felling my life witnessing to me of entering by taking complete control of my speech and speaking in a language I knew nothing of. (2nd chapter of Acts experience).

These blessings making me a new creature (yes a born again life.) My life flooded with joy peace and love and such a desire to live and tell others, and later one morning in the large living room seated with my Bible in my lap I was praying O God what can I do for you for all you have done for me, and when opening the Bible it was at the book of Ruth, and as definite at Ruth was told by Boaz not to go to another field but stay right there and labor until the close of harvest it was as the Lord speaking to remain in this field for your labor and this I have earnestly tried to do since. On Jan 20, 1985, when waking that morning that still small voice (The same voice that Elizah heard) told me to write these articles you are reading week after week. When knowing what God desired of me I lost no time in going to the Editor and Publisher of the Spearman Reporter to hear what he said about it. His reply, "Let the good work go on." And I fail to find words to Thank William M. Miller for his cooperation concerning this and beyond a doubt I can see and you can see without it these articles would not be published. My thanks also goes to anyone who may be helping in anyway. Friends, if any one is blessed in any way by my life, To God be the praise for I am only a sinner that was saved by Gods grace and now quoting Paul I say by the grace of God I am what I am. And now I write the words of some song writer. Oh I love to walk with Jesus like the publicans of old when He gathered them about Him and the blessed tidings told. How He came to bring deliverance to the captives in distress. Take away their

every burden giving perfect peace and rest. I will follow where He leadeth I will pasture where He feedeth I will follow all the way Lord I will follow Jesus every day. (By Gods Grace).

The R. I. Board has designated February as World Understanding Month, a time to focus on this important aspect of the Object of Rotary. In addition, 23 February - the 82nd anniversary of Rotary's founding will be observed as World Understanding and Peace Day.

There is no medicine like hope, no incentive so great, and no tonics so powerful as expectation of something better tomorrow.

There are monies provided by the 69th Texas Legislature in 1985 to make provisions for health care to the State's indigent and uninsured population. The programs are designed to not only provide health care to those who need health care, but also to cut the bad debt rate in hospitals and to save tax dollars.

The Panhandle Health Care Coalition works with counties, hospitals, hospital districts and clinics to coordinate eligibility screening, services, education and communications as well as other areas.

The grant programs are listed and summarized below: A. Indigent Health Care and treatment Act (S.B.1)

This act clarifies responsibilities of counties, public hospitals and hospit-

al districts in providing health care to indigent Texas residents. Counties without public facilities must provide specified health care services for residents whose incomes and resources do not exceed AFDC Program Standards but who are not eligible for Medicaid or other 3rd party coverage. b. Maternal Infant Health Improvement Act (MIHA) (H.B. 1023)

This act provides for prenatal care for low income pregnant women in State targeted counties of underserved population or unmet need, and for comprehensive maternity care of medically high risk pregnant women and specialized care and follow-up for high risk infants born to these women in all counties without previous programs. These women must not be eligible for Medicaid or have other 3rd party coverage.

C. Texas Primary Health Care Services Act (H.B. 1844)

This act provides funds to establish programs of high blood pressure treatment to low income persons not eligible for other forms of assistance or who do not have insurance. The program is designed to improve access to preventive and primary care services in order to reduce acute care emergency room and hospital costs.

Public Safety

Capt. Bob Russell, District Supervisor of the Amarillo Highway Patrol District comprising of 31 counties said, "For the year, 1986, our troopers investigated 63 fatal accidents, 884 personal injury accidents, and 1269 property damage accidents. There were 82 persons killed and 1328 persons injured in these accidents."

Sgt. Burt Christian of Borger stated, "In Hansford county, our troopers investigated 1 fatal accident, 1 personal injury accident, and 0 property damage accidents in the Year, 1986. 2 persons were killed and 2 person were injured in these accidents."

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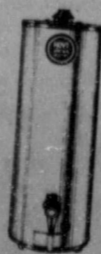

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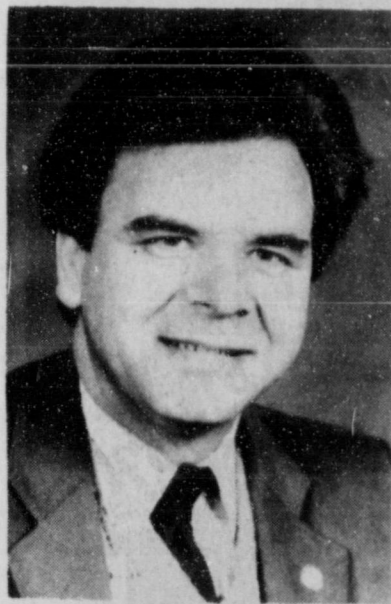
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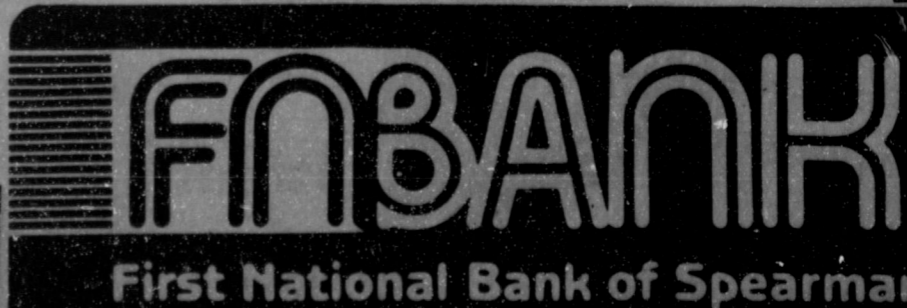
