
# Round-Up for pre-schoolers announced

# Diseases can be

reduced by diet

Individuals can substantially reduce risks of heart disease, cancer and other chronic diseases through specific changes in eating habits, according to a national report released recently.

Dr. Mary Kinney Sweeten, nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said a National Research Council committee has offered this prescription for lowering chronic disease risk:

-Eat less fat and more fruits. vegetables and carbohydrates. Sweeten said the committee, which included Texans, completed its three-year study earlier this

The report complements the Surgeon General's Report on Nutrition and Health released last year, and is the only other comprehensive scholarly attempt to examine simutaneously all known dietary associations with chronic disease in an attempt to provide recommendations for reducing health risks.

Sweeten said the committee recommended that the public:

-Reduce total fat consumption to 30 percent or less of calories, saturated fatty acids to less than 10 percent of calories, and cholesterol to less than 300 milligrams

-Eat five or more servings of a combination of fruits and vegetables, especially green and yellow vegetables and citrus fruits. Also, eat six or more servings of starches and other complex carbohydrates daily to bring total carbohydrates to more then 55 percent of calories.

-Maintain only a moderate intake of protein. Meet the Recommended Dietary Allowance (RDA) for proteins each day, but in doing so do not exceed 1.6 grams per kilogram of body weight, which is twice the RDA guideline.

Sweeten said the committee report advised people to balance their food intake and physical activity to maintain appropriate body weight.

"Individuals will need to devote more time and attention to their daily diets, and professionals will need to provide guidance to the public in diet planning," she said.


The Allen brothers, land speculators who founded Houston, encouraged Sam Houston to establish the capitol of the new republic in their own town. Houston "was, predictably, enchanted with the idea of a capitol city named after himself." The Allen brothers even promised to build the capitol at their own expense, so Houston City was named capitol of Texas in late 1836.

The first boatload of goods headed

for Houston was brought up Buffalo Bayou in January 1837 by New Orleans merchant Frank Lubbock. He missed the site entirely and continued upstream until he ran out of bayou. He backtracked until he found the landing, which turned out to be a narrow path leading up the bank. When the first legislature convened in May, 1837, the capitol was still unfinished and carpenters lashed tree branches to the roof for shade.





## Poultry industry to present new products

Look for 1989 to bring an array of new poultry products aimed at consumer "convenience."

"Convenience" seems to be the driving force behind the success of mary food products, and poultry products are certainly no exception said Dr. David B. Mellor, pourry marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension

"Ease of preparation, microwaveability, finger foods and grazing are terms that seem to go with successful new products,' Mellor said. "Of course, it also helps for those products to be economical, nutritious and ver-

According to Mellor, the turkey and broiler industries have been forerunners in providing innovative food products to consumers. and that trend is likely to continue

'Look for some new products as well as adaptations of present products, such as making a product microwaveable or adding the flavor of mesquite, lemon or honey," said the specialist.

Mellor said that certain new products may come from ideas or systems that were introduced in 1988. These include egg white as a fat substitute, an ultra high temperature pasteurized aseptical package, liquid egg and a process for removing most of the cholesterol from liquid egg yolk.

"The poultry industry is continuing to work on two negative forces--cholesterol and Salmonella would likely boost individual brands or products and, at the same time, would chalk up another 'plus' for the poultry

While convenience is a major force in the success of new poultry products, profitability is a key consideration for retailers, said sion economist.

"Most poultry and egg items do not carry a high profit margin," Edwards said. "Therefore, they have to fight for that most precious commodity, shelf space. Over each of the last two years, manufacturers have introduced more than 9,000 items a year which have had a fight for shelf space. Many of these offerings have a life of less than six months."

So, convenience of the new product must be tempered with a dash of economic reality as well, said the economist.
