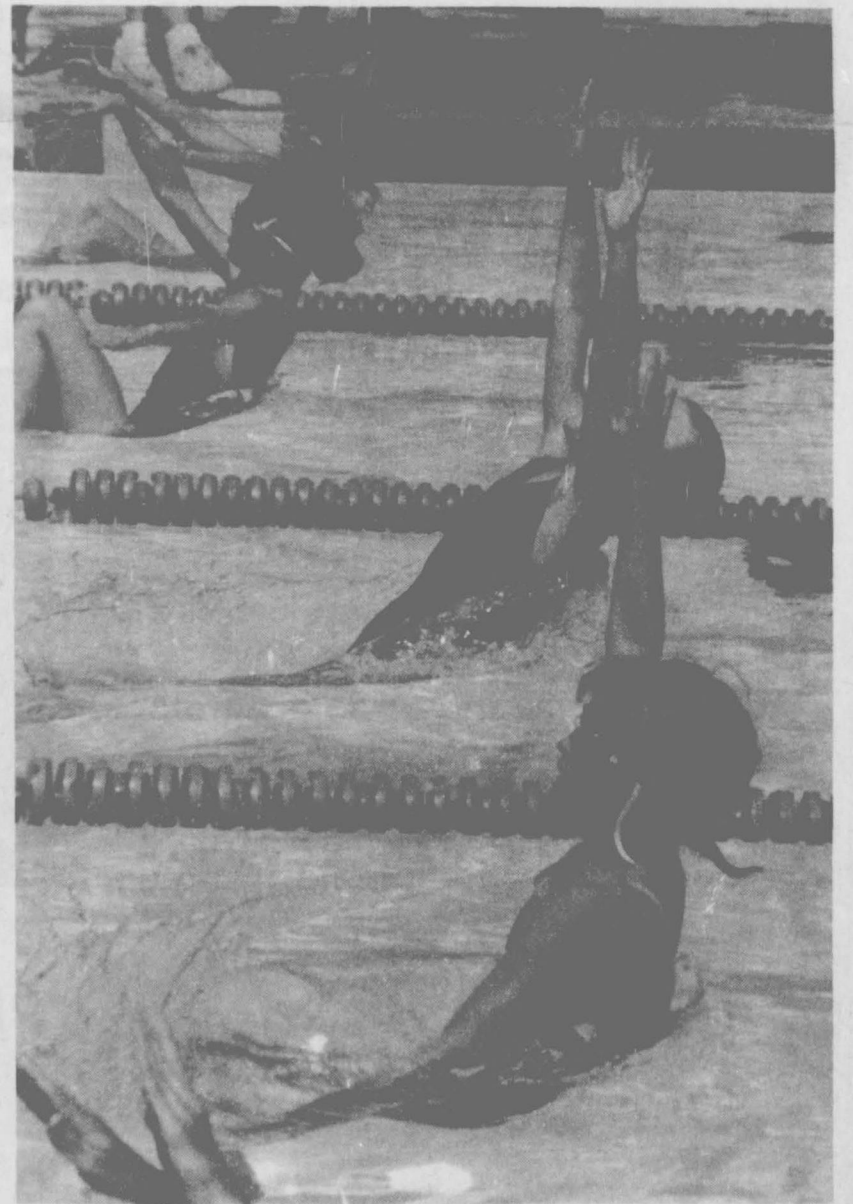

Adobe Walls Indian dancers at amphitheater

The Adobe Walls Dancers will take to the stage at the Lake Meredith Amphitheater armed with new dances, plus old favorites like the Hopi Indian rain dance where intrepid performers hoof with bull snakes in their mouths.

Performances, sponsored by the Magic Plains Arts Council, are scheduled for 8 p.m. July 28, 29 and 30 and Hutchinson County Museum Director Ed Benz said tickets at the door are \$2.50 for adults, \$1 for students under 18, free for youngsters under six and scouting groups of six or more in uniform, \$1 each.

Benz added that he predicts 300 people from all over the area will come each night to thrill to the Hopi Indian rain dance where

snakes are placed in the dancers mouths and the new attack dance.

Benz explained that snakes are used in the Hopi dance because it is believed they are in touch with the earth and rain. Part of the ritual is placing the reptiles in the dancers' mouths.

He noted that a gully washer usually follows the dance.

The principal figure in the attack dance is Isatai, a Comanche Indian medicine man that cast a spell over Adobe Walls and was said to have magical powers.

"He could cought up wagon loads of ammunition, developed bullet proof paint and had success with several celestial events," Benz said.

For the dance, Benz said a rock

building will be on stage to represent Adobe Walls, fire will be set to it during the dance through the magical powers of Isatai. The male dancers will have guns, lances and bows while the females sport scalp poles and scalps hanging off them.

Thursday, July 28 will be West Texas Comanche night--a salute to Stinett's newly consolidated school district, football and band.

All 25 dancers will be doing the never-before done Pueblo Comanche dance. Benz said this is based on a historical event where the Zuni and Comanche Indians battled.

As history would have it, the Comanches beat the Zunis and the Zunis created a dance to imitate

their opposition because they were so impressed, he said.

The Hoop dance will also be part of this year's repertoire, Benz said adding that the performers will be creating designs with five hoops.

In addition to the dances, the two hour show will also boast new back drops such as warriors riding across the horizon, two or three large teepees and a brush arbor, used to cast shade.

The Adobe Walls Dancers Summer Ceremonials are an educational program of the Hutchinson County Museum. The main participants are the Adobe Walls Indian Dancers Explorer Post 565, spon-

How Accurate Are Those Unemployment Figures?

Dear Commissioner Nabers: I have been unemployed and diligently seeking work for six months. So far I have had no success. I think I have discovered how the Texas Employment Commission keeps its unemployment figures at an artificially low level. Once a person has run out of benefits, he no longer has to report to the TEC Office and thus is no longer a statistic as far as the State is concerned. In other words, even though I still have not found a job, I am no longer considered to be among the unemployed.

What about it? Am I right?

Abilene, Texas

Dear P.H.: Yours is a common misconception. The State unemployment rate is calculated according to a rather

elaborate formula devised by the U.S. Department of Labor. It includes, in part, not only those who are actively filing claims but also those who have exhausted their benefits, those who filed but failed to qualify,

and estimates of those who have never even darkened the door of a TEC office. It is a little known fact that at any given time only about 15 to 20 percent of the total unemployed population of Texas is

filing for and receiving benefits. If we based our unemployment estimates only on this small population then we would certainly be far off the mark. Be assured that the statistics supplied by the TEC are based upon much more than just current claim activity.

As for your own situation, let me suggest that you go to a local TEC office and ask for information on Job Search Workshops. The success rate for those going through the program is outstanding and there is no charge. Good Luck!

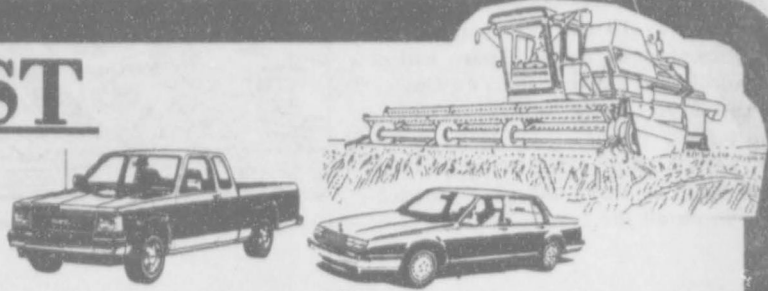

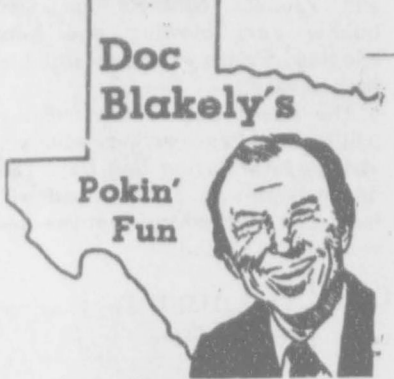

manuscript form, and sends it back to her with a first royalty check of \$5,000.

He becomes jealous of her success and is inspired to write once again and both of them become famous and rich authors. Of course, they hate each other's guts but that's beside the point. This conflict causes lots of sordid rumors, publicity, and sales.

The truth is that this kind of script is the work of a sick mind. The writer of such a plot wants you to be inspired and subjected to the same lifestyle he has endured -- namely rejection and poverty after which things start to go downhill.

It's like an author friend of mine commented that he received complaints about the contents and style of his latest effort. I consoled him with the philosophy that a statistical bell curve applied: 10% will love it no matter what you do and 10% will hate it. "Yeah," he replied, "and the other 80% won't buy the book either."

When they return this fall, imagine their chagrin to discover the wonderful playground is no more -- replaced by buildings . . .

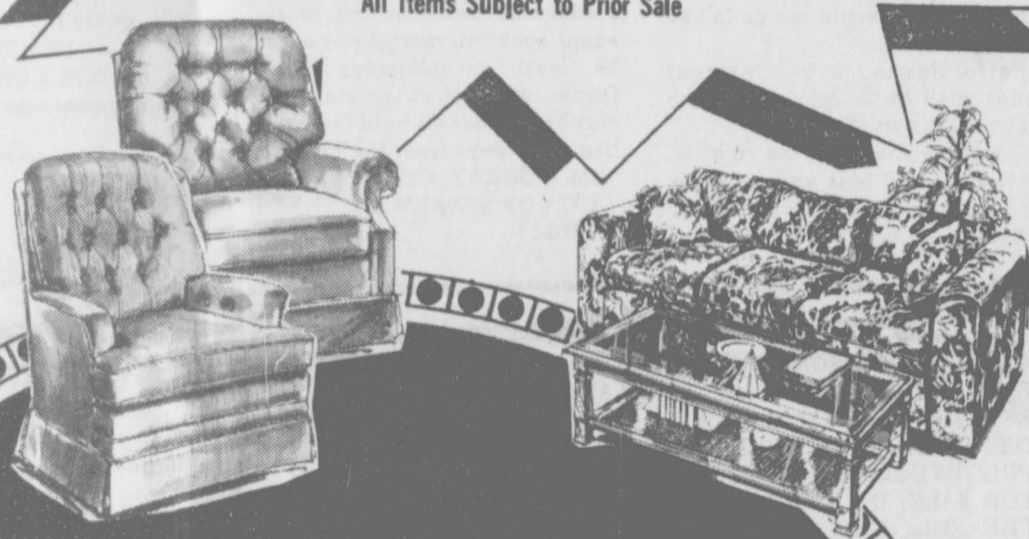
