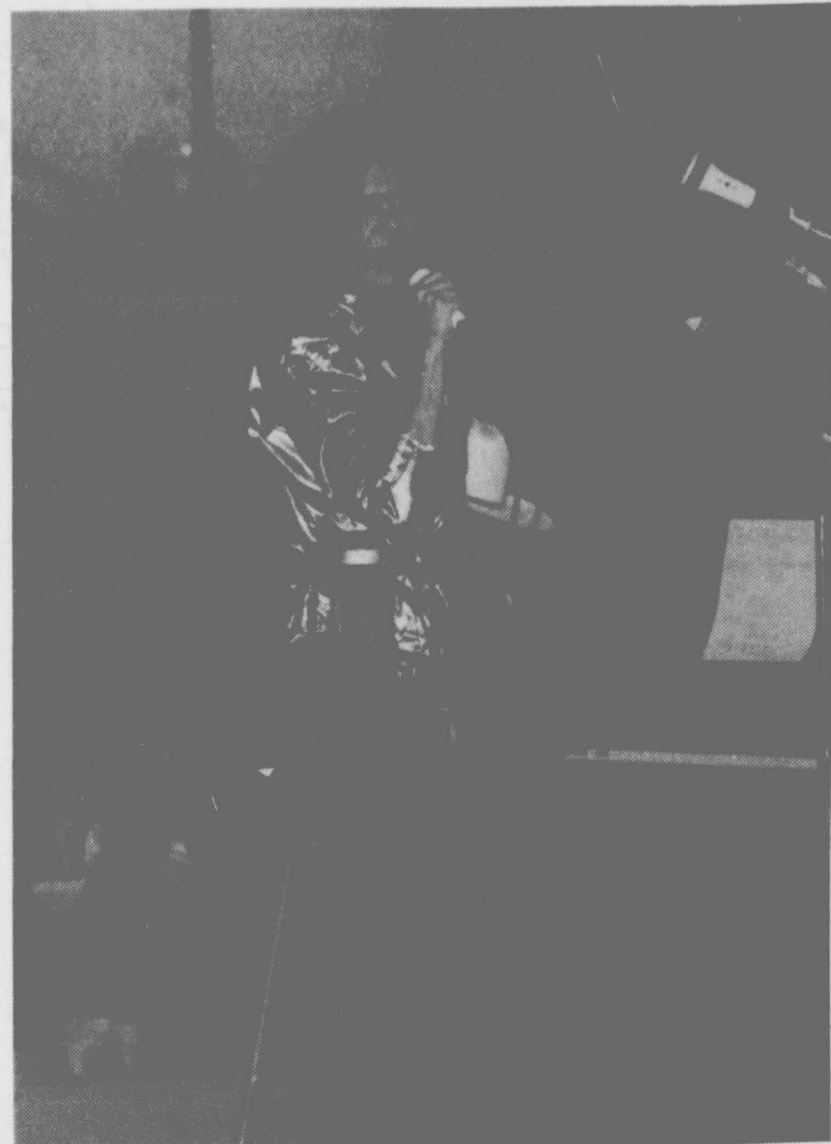

## PDRA gets loan from Texas Water Board

Bond proceeds from a closing of a \$17,880,000 Texas Water Development Board loan to the Palo Duro River Authority will be used to construct a dam on Palo Duro Creek in Hansford County. This is the second portion of a two-part loan totalling \$22,300,000.

The dam will form a reservoir with a capacity of 60,900 acre-feet of which the Authority will use 5,630 acre-feet for municipal purposes. The Authority intends to construct only the reservoir at this time and will follow with the construction of a distribution

system and treatment facility within the next eight to ten years.

Built in response to the growing concern over the area's diminishing ground water supplies, the project will provide surface water to Moore and Hansford Counties and the city of Stinnett in Hutchinson County. The project is intended also to supply water to the cities of Spearman, Gruver, Dumas, Sunray and Cactus. Presently, these cities receive their water from Ogallala Aquifer which will continue to be used as a supplemental water source.

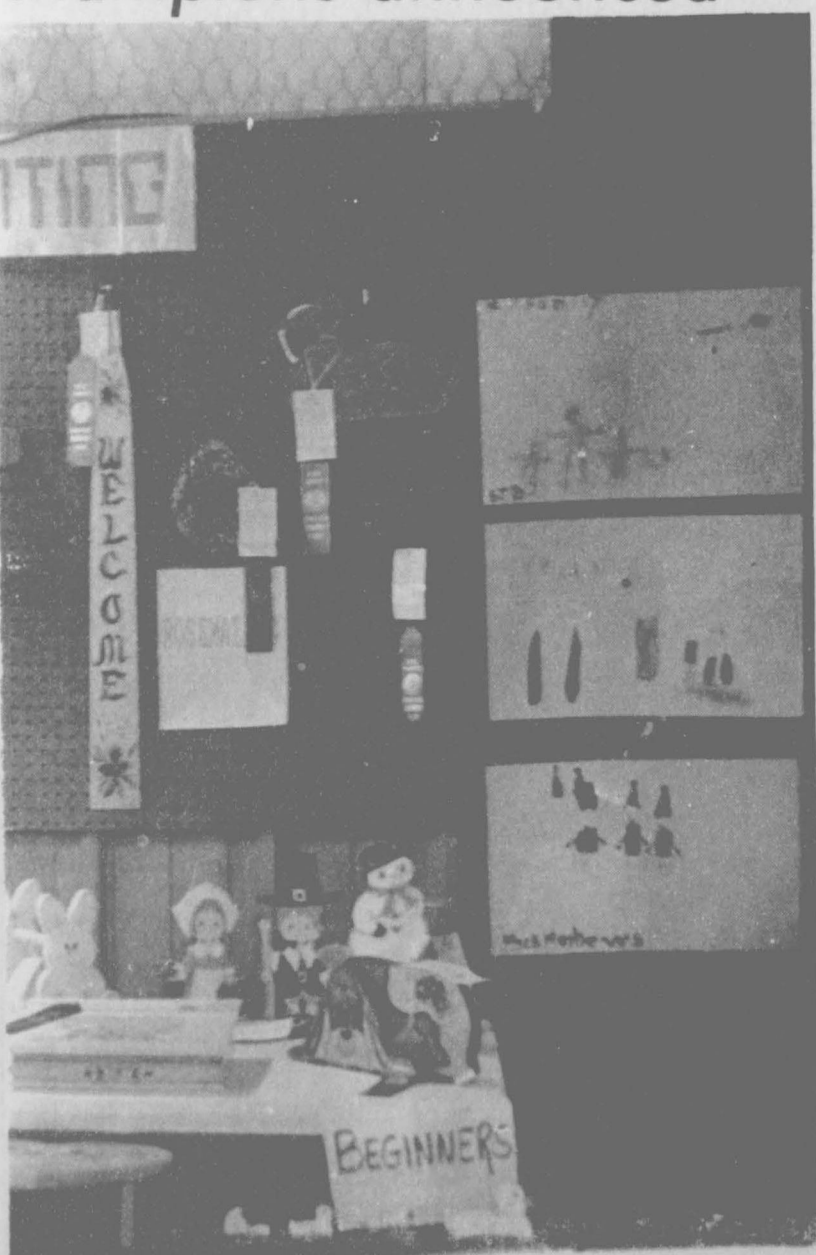

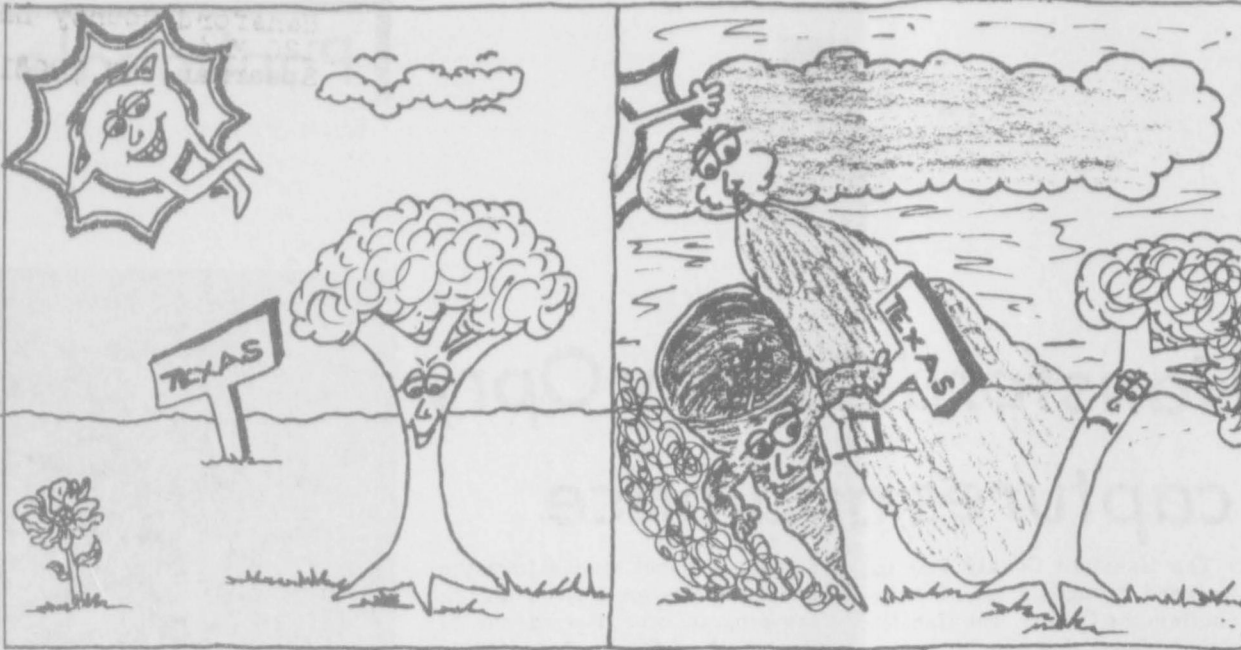

### Hay dealers reported to short patrons

Fraudulently represented hay deliveries plaguing nearby states has caused some concern in north Texas. Because of drought conditions, hay is being hauled to this area in large quantities. There have been reports of hay dealers using false weight tickets when charging for the hay.

Terry Harman, State Executive Director of Texas ASCS, said, "Some hay dealers have weight tickets showing as much as twice the amount of hay as they actually have for delivery. We're not accusing anybody, but we sure want everyone to be aware of the situation and take needed precau-

### Bullock announces lifting of coupon sales tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that shoppers who use discount coupons don't have to pay state sales tax on their savings.

"Tax is collected only on the actual amount you pay for a taxable item, not on the pre-discount price," Bullock said.

According to Bullock, the amount of tax paid on items bought with coupons used to depend on the type of coupon being redeemed.

As a result, businesses and customers were sometimes confused about the correct amount of tax due.

"I can't find one good reason to tax items at the full price if they're being paid for with a discount coupon. This is a simple issue that somehow got complicated, and I hope I've cleared it up for once and

for all," Bullock said.

Bullock said that with the new rule, store owners will find it much easier to collect the right amount of sales tax due on purchases made with coupons. Bookkeepers will also find it easier to keep track of taxes due to the state.

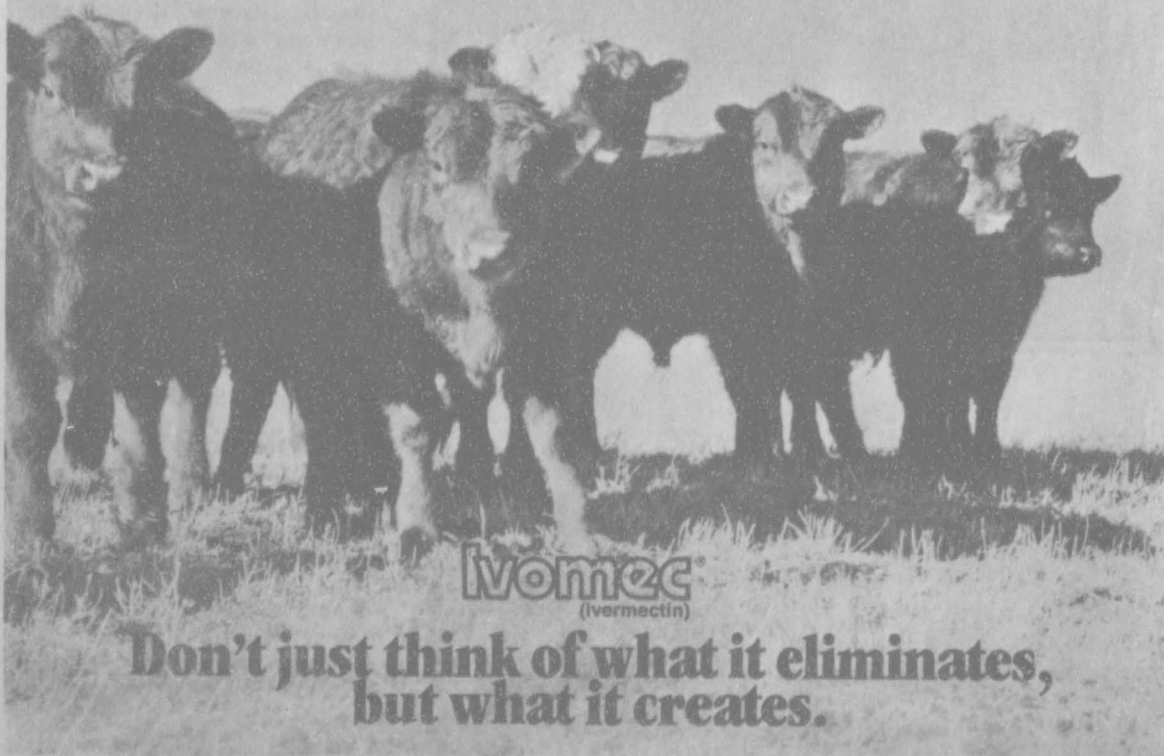

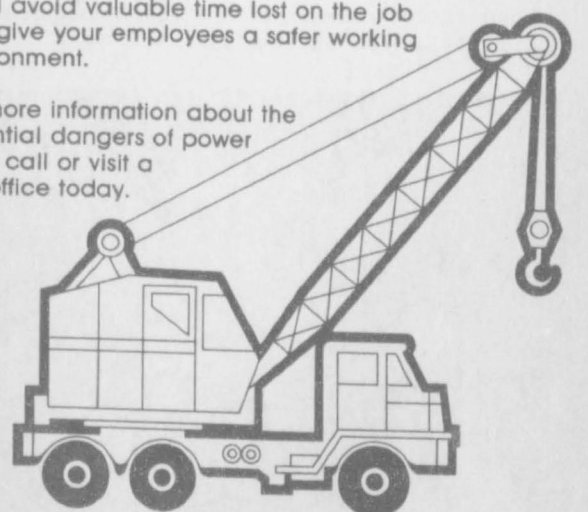

## Panhandle Crisis Center

Several persons who were aware that we had called on some generous-hearted men to help us move the Shelter furniture, etc., to the new, temporary location, asked why the clients residing there didn't do the moving.

Perhaps you, too, would like to know the answer to that. They did help. But they were unable to do the heavy lifting that even a dolly requires. (Most of them suffer from bad teeth - the results of stress; and from back problems - the results of battering.) But they certainly did help - packing up dishes, supplies, etc.

Some of you may think that these clients have a sort of Holiday Inn existence while they are at the shelter. Not so. Before they are admitted, they must sign a contract committing them to certain chores, such as cooking, cleaning, laundry, etc., in addition to child tending. They follow a tight schedule, from when they get up in the morning to when they put the children to bed at night. They must also sign out and sign in for when they go to work, or even for conferences related to their particular problems, including court appearances, etc.

Yes, occasionally there's some wrangling over whose turn it is and over how good a job someone else did. But this all comes out in the "family" conferences that are held at regular intervals or whenever needed.

At first we had thought to have the clients responsible for yard work, too. Then we realized that there is some hazard connected with such work, so we eliminated that. We also started off with a kitchen garden, but that required too much of the Supervisor's time, so we dispensed with that.

Other rules are applied in the Shelter. For instance, discipline for the children cannot include spanking. Furthermore, their waking and sleeping hours must be regular, as well as their meals. And would you believe their TV hours, too? Even

the little ones soon learn to monitor their programs. And to put up their toys.

Though some clients balk at first, they are amazed to learn that their own personal freedom is enhanced by the rules, so that everyone profits from them.

Only once has a client refused to sign a contract. She, of course, was not admitted.

Remember, too, that once-a-week attendance at a support group is mandatory for each resident. These support groups, the patterns set at the Shelter, and the role modeling of the Shelter Superintendent have all inspired the residents to learn better ways of relating and better ways of running their households.

So, "Don't worry. Be happy!" No one gets a free ride. All are committed to a fair share of the work detail. And, believe it or not, the children nearly always love the routine and the calmer but immediate discipline!

Stinson Gibner, Spearman's link to the extra-terrestrial, recently participated in a most extraordinary (to Spearman folk) experiment which was two months to the completion.

He and five other representatives of Cal-Tech of Pasadena, Calif. gathered data at a scientific experiment with high altitude helium at Prince Albert, Saskatchewan. They took two large trucks transporting their part of the required equipment, which included one of the three huge balloons.

The three balloons, inflated with helium, expanded as they rose and the barometric pressure decreased, to a size of 600 feet in diameter. The balloon in the experiment in which Stinson was connected stayed up 34 hours and was still visible at a distance of 200 miles.

It was radio controlled and the resulting data was detached and returned to earth in a parachute as the balloon disintegrated.

The purpose of the experiment was to measure sub-atomic nuclei from other parts of the galaxy thereby finding some clues as to how stars burn and what is produced.

This experiment was first attempted in 1984 at NASA at Palestine, Tex. and since has been modified and transferred to Prince Albert which is much closer to the earth's magnetic pole.

There were 45 scientists involved in the experiment, several from NASA. So much information was gathered, Stinson estimates it will require fully a year to a year and a half for him to assimilate and analyze the material.

He will find the data useful for his Ph D thesis in Physics on which he is working.

Stinson was pleased that his wife, Thuy, was able to accompany him. He felt a contact with the Panhandle while visiting with the drivers of the trucks who brought the helium from Amarillo.

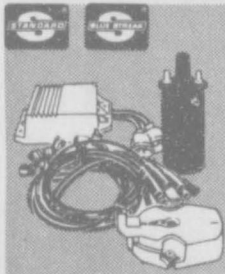

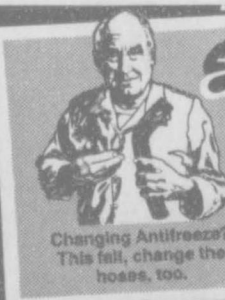
