



System has safeguards

Dear Commissioner Nabers: I would like to comment on what I see as a growing area of abuse in the unemployment compensation system. More and more people are working temporary jobs these days, some because that's all they can find, some because they do not want to be tied to a full-time job. The unemployment insurance system is not structured to distinguish the former from the latter and, consequently, many people who have no desire to hold down a full-time job use unemployment benefits to supplement their occasional earnings. I do not think it is fair for taxpayers to pay the bill for someone's flexible lifestyle... a lifestyle they have voluntarily chosen. What, if anything, can be done to close this loophole?

Dear W.J.: I think it is helpful to understand the relationship between unemployment insurance and wages. Benefits do not provide more than a 50% replacement of a person's average earnings for a maximum of six months. The system is designed to assist people temporarily without eliminating the incentive for them to return to full employment. People who normally work only very sporadically will not qualify for much in the way of benefits and they

will have to report any money they make while filing claims. This will in turn further reduce an already small benefit

There have always been individuals who will abuse or take advantage of a system designed to assist large numbers of people. Fortunately these individuals are in the minority. Even so, some states have regulations requiring an individual to name not just his last work but his last work of a specific duration, for example, six weeks or more. The Texas Unemployment Compensation Act does not require this, but it does have several safeguards which attempt to prevent the form of abuse you describe. Under Texas law a person receiving benefits must be able, available for, and actively seeking full-time work. A person who restricts his availability will be held ineligible to receive benefits. Also, if suitable work is offered and refused, the claimant will be disqualified from receiving further benefits.

The increase in the number of people who prefer to work temporary or part-time jobs is indeed an interesting phenomenon. About 11 percent of all temporary workers are now professional level workers including engineers, attorneys, managers, and computer specialists. I think it is a trend worth watching.



1988 Property Tax Rates Hansford Hospital District

This notice concerns 1988 property tax rates for Hansford County Hospital District. It presents information about rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. Compare it to the tax rate the taxing unit proposes for this year. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.
