City Council names team to negotiate cable service

The city council of Spearman held two meetings last Tuesday, Dec. 13. The first meeting was held in the morning for regular business, and an evening meeting was held, open to the public, for a hearing concerning a franchise agreement with Mission Cable. In the morning meeting, Dr.

Jack Hopper, consultant for the City of Spearman, presented a schedule for negotiations with Mission Cable. This helped prepare council for the evening meeting.

Next on the agenda, was consideration of a contract with Dwight L. Brandt Engineering for professional services for the design and inspection services of the following items; automation and control system for the water system, wastewater treatment plant, and the gas border station; metal building for well no. 7; step chlorination system for pump station no. 6 and pump station no. 7; and built up roof for pump station no. 6 and pump station no. 7. These items come to a total cost of \$15,700. All four of the professional services were approved by council.

The councilmembers continued the meeting by awarding purchase contracts for one 3/4 ton pickup truck with standard cab; one 1/2 ton long wheel base pickup truck with standard cab and wide bed; and one 4-door police special sedan. Contracts for all three vehicles were awarded to low bidder, Gillaspie Chevrolet Olds. Crawford Motor Co. also submitted bids on all three vehicles and Hergert Pontiac, Buick, GMC submitted bids on the two pickups.

Reports were considered and bills were approved before adjourning the meeting until reconvening time at 7:30 p.m.

About 60 to 65 concerned citizens were present at the evening meeting to voice their opinions to council and Mission Cable representative, president of the company, Jay O'Neal. Dr. Jack Hopper was also on hand to answer questions and advise citizens what their rights were in respect to a cable TV agreement.

School superintendent, Larry Butler was on hand to ask about the possibility of having an access channel for schools, and a member of the hospital board was present to inquire about an acess channel for the hospital district.

Mission Cable explained the company's capability of 21 channels, with some restricted FCC. And the company offered to rebuild the system to have the capabilities of a 35 channel system.

Members of council ask for input from the citizens concerning the QVC channel. An equal amount of citizens seemed satisfied with the channel, as those who were not. One citizen remarked that he "didn't mind the QVC channel, except that when they put QVC on air, they took CBN off the air." So the general consensus seemed to be for more channels, to provide for the varying tastes of the different viewers.

The main issue brought up by

several citizens was the quality of the signal of cable TV. Mission Cable appeared to be committed to buy a new system. They are a professional cable company that has been in the cable business for some time.

A negotiating team was named to come up with an agreement for cable service. In a matter of weeks, the team will bring their written proposals to the city council to look over and accept or deny. Some more information will be required of Mission Cable of technicalities before any final negotiations can be made.

City manager, Jim Murray noted, "We were pleased that so many individuals came to the meeting to express their opinions. The city council wants to know the views of the public before acting on these matters."

Schools recognized for scores on TEAMS tests

Spearman Junior High was among the schools recognized by the State Board of Education for the number of students who made exceptional scores or high gains on the TEAMS test.

The Board recognized those schools where 90 percent or more of students mastered all sections of the TEAMS test taken during the 1987-88 school year and those which recorded gains of 30 percent or more from 1986-87 to 1987-88.

Recognized campuses will receive certificates from the State Board of Education.

Other schools in the area recognized by the agency include Windsor Elementary in Amarillo; Gene Howe Elementary and Oscar Hinger Intermediate School in Canyon; Darrouzett Schools; Hillcrest Elementary in Dumas; Austin Elementary in Pampa; Shamrock

Junior High and Gruver High School and Gruver Elementary

Those recognized for exceptional

gains include Eastridge, Hamlet and Lee Elementaries in Amarillo: Central and Gateway Elementaries in Borger; Cactus Elementary in Dumas; Willow Vista Elementary at River Road; Sanford-Fritch Middle School; Shamrock Elementary.

Baker Elementary in Canadian, and Pampa's Baker Elementary were recognized for both high scores and exceptional gains.

Almost twice as many campuses were recognized by the State Board for the 87-88 school for their TEAMS performance than were recognized in the 1986-87 school year. The increase in the number of schools recognized is attributed to more campuses working harder on preparing their students to take the TEAMS test, Texas Educational Agency officials said.

Another reason for the increase is that the Board recognized campuses with six or more students. while last year, only campuses with 25 or more students were recognized.

It's always fun to browse in this beautiful store. La-Z-Boy recliners and other products are on sale through Christmas (recliners start at \$299), as well as all other brands of recliners. RCA electronics are also featured this month. Beedy's carries seven different models of VCR's (starting at \$249), including two with the new "on-screen programming," which the store owners are delighted to show off. Be sure to look at the pretty baskets and framed art as well. Anthony Electric Inc.

This store has selected appliances such as brands marked 50% off. A large Bunn coffeemaker, the brand restaurants are said to favor for quality and durability, runs

The Bunkhouse

This men's and women's clothing store sells a lot of western Resistol hats at Christmas, but there is also a good selection of colorful belts (for all ages), jeans, men's dress shirts, (a customer there at the store recommended their Peters and Ashley brand to me, costing around \$28) and women's apparel. The Bunkhouse has classic men's work coats by Walls (\$60) and goose-down Comfys (\$135), and nice men's Pendleton and Jockey sweaters. Hunter's caps with earflaps by Dupont are sold for \$10. There is a new line of Woolrich fashions for women that is selling well, but it is the Talk 'O Texas Santa Fe styles which are ardest to resist. These shirts and pants are hand-painted with Indian figures and designs. A long sweatshirt style with a lovely painting of an Indian woman costs

Cates Men and Boys

When I visited this store, the first thing I noticed was the big men's sweater section along the north wall. The Jantzen pullovers and cardigans are all machine washable and cost in the \$30 to \$68 range. There is also a "tall man's" sweater selection. (The turquoise and black one by Le Tigre with an abstract design is irresistible, costing \$34.95.) Other popular items of apparel in this big, comfortable store are colored Wrangler-Cut Jeans (gray, olive drab, blue, tan,) on sale for \$19.95 which start at waist size 30. Did Spearman Lynx shoe bags, gym bags, knapsacks and jackets (\$9.98

-\$30). This is also the place for accessories for the Boy Scout of your family, cowboy boots, hats, and belt buckles.

Big sellers for this exquisite gift store on Main Street include the "Aromatique" line of potpourri and "Aspen Mulling Spices," a half pint container of spices to add to hot or cold drinks. The store also features some unusual jewelry and watches, a snack food selection called Yuppie Gourmet, and many decorative items. My favorite item here was a wooden angel soaked in Christmas oil which gives out a wonderful yet subtle scent. You can't go wrong with a gift for a female here, from teenager to great-grandmother. And everything is 10% off, from now until Christmas.

Charlotte Ford Antique Trunks

Charlotte Ford specializes in restoring antique trunks, but the front of this store features country decor items selected or made by her daughter. Sample items include baskets made out of tightly coiled rags, t-shirts and sweatshirts and all kinds of handmade Christmas tree ornaments. C.O.'s Supply

This store sells new and used guns, reloading supplies, ammunition, and hunting licenses. Good sellers include Remingtons and 270 calibers are in demand. Gun prices range from \$89 to \$400. Country Stitches

If you are creative or buying for someone who is, this should be one of the first shops you visit. Items I noted include a cross-stitch calender for \$9.95, cross-stitch stationary (\$4) and towels and baby bibs all ready to cross-stitch (\$2.80 -\$4.99). Comptrollers office sends out checks to counties in Texas

The State Comptroller's office sent out checks totaling \$64.1 million last week to 885 cities that collect local sales tax at either one or one and one-half percent.

Checks totaling \$6.4 million were also mailed to 81 counties that collect the one-half percent county tax. December's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in October and reported to the Comptroller's office by Nov. 21.

In Hansford County, the net

payment for this period for Spearman was \$9,920.75 as compared to last year's payment of \$9,737.57 for the same period, making Spearman's payment up 1.88 percent.

Gruver received a net payment for the same period this year of \$3,335.21 compared to last year's \$3,406.90, down about 2 percent this year. But the comparative totals for the county were \$13,255.96 this year compared to a \$13,144.47 last year, or up almost one percent.


