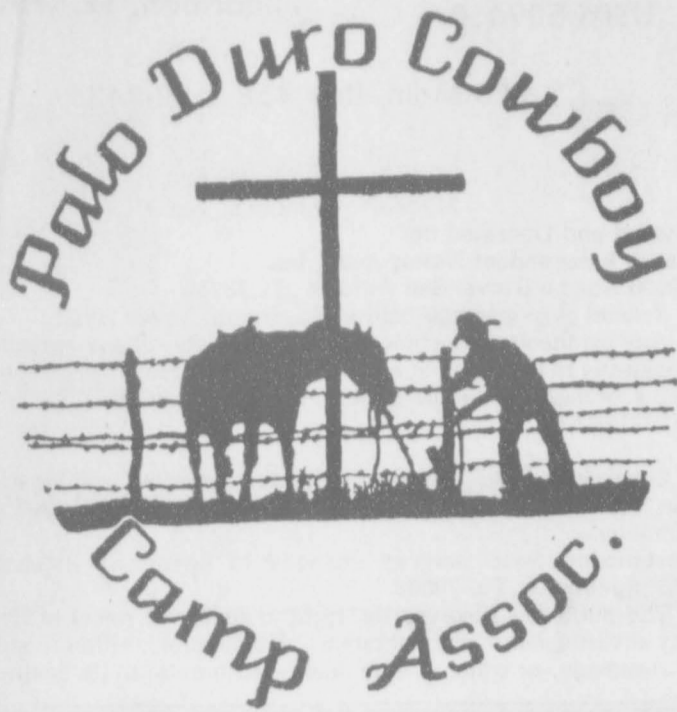

Texas by the pioneer ranching families - Evans and Means. This started in the days when folks found it necessary to travel many miles for religious fellowship.

There are now more camp meetings than ever, and the Palo Duro organization is proud to be carrying on the tradition.

Economic development studied by Texas A&M

A meeting for the rural economic development study to be done by Texas A&M University was held June 5 at the First United Methodist Church in Spearman. Dr. Ron Knutson and Dr. Dennis Fisher, and associates, were present to conduct this planning meeting. They provided additional information about the development project, and discussed the strategic planning. Sponsors were First State Bank, First National Bank, and Interstate Savings & Loan.

Graphs were presented for each of four counties - Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb and Hutchinson. The graphs showed, among other things, the rise and decline of retail sales figures for each of the four counties, over the years of the mid-1970's to 1987. They also showed how each county compared to the overall state figures. Teacher's experience and teacher's salary figures were also presented. However, no agricultural data was included, with the information given.

There has been an overall decline in each of the four

counties, over the years specified. It was decided to have a county chairperson, selected by each county. It was also decided to meet frequently as a group, to discuss what areas to look into, and ways for growth and/or expansion. Hansford County will thus be deciding their own county "strategic plan" for future development.

A county chairperson has not been officially named for Hansford County, as of this date.

In short, Texas A&M provides the demographics (figures), and Hansford County will implement their own strategic plan.

Texas A&M's offer of assistance to the four counties is through grants received through the Kellogg Foundation, Farm Foundation, Texas Banker's Association, and Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Next meeting has been scheduled for July 6, and the counties involved will report what areas they will each work towards, and eventually work out their strategic plans for future development.

Television network arrives for officers

Coming to Hansford County July 1 will be the Law Enforcement Television Network. This is a national TV network developed exclusively for the law enforcement community and will be seen only by them. It is a training network for officers.

The satellite equipment is already installed on the courthouse roof. Hansford, along with Potter, Hutchinson, and Dallam counties are all charter members of this program. There will be no expense to the taxpayers for the installation of any of the satellite equipment as being a charter member takes care of that. The cost of the program will be \$285 per month and will be prorated between the county and the city, and possibly Gruver if they decide to be in the program.

Sheriff R.L. McFarlin feels this program will be a savings to the community as all the schools the officers and personnel go to require a lot of travel time, fees, and motel expense. The State requires 40 hours additional training each year for their officers; Sheriff McFarlin requires 80 hours. Sheriff McFarlin and Deputy Gary Evans are both certified instructors.

There are changes occurring at all times and new technologies being developed so our officers need a simple resource with in-depth information and training to keep up. They are the only people who go to work with a gun strapped on and bullet proof vests, so there is the need for effective, on-going, in-service training information.

Some of the training and information that comes over the 24 hour per day network is new product reviews, handling neighbor and family disturbances, officer safety, traffic enforcement, avoidance of civil liability, administration issues, stress management, court cases, crime scene

procedures, leadership issues, and executing warrants.

There will be films of actual officer down situations, live call in question and answer sessions, up to the minute news, legislative actions, and in-depth documentaries.

The satellite is based in Dallas and will pipeline its information to 600,000 plus officers. Approximately twenty people in Hansford County will train with this new program.

You've heard of bringing people in off the street for news! Well, that is literally what I did this week, only it was "off the highway." I passed four young women bicycling towards Spearman on the Perryton highway. They had their gear packed heavy on their bikes so I knew they were traveling. When I got even with two of them, I slowed down and asked where they were headed. "California!" came the answer. I registered shock. "Where are you from?" I asked. "New York!" they answered.

The girls were still about five miles out of town, but agreed to come by the news office for an interview when they got to Spearman.

Ann Dorgler, Lynne Tenpenny, Kathy Grey, and Ann Marie MacNamee left Manhattan, New York on April 20. Three of the girls quit their jobs and the fourth took a leave of absence to trek across America. The four friends have wanted to take a trip like this for a long time so decided to do so.

When asked if they have had many problems on the trip, the girls said the trip has not been too bad. They have been in snow in Virginia (all they brought was shorts), a tornado in Memphis, Tenn., and a lot of rain. Zip lock bags have been a lifesaver. Their canvas type saddle bags did not repel water enough; their clothes were getting wet. They brought two small tents with them to camp out at night, but always seemed to wake up wet and sticky from the humidity, so being typically fe-

These men have come together for the purpose of sharing God's love through song. Coming from varied backgrounds and diverse walks of life, they have the common bond of their faith in Jesus and a strong desire to share this faith wherever and whenever the opportunity is open.

male, they stay in motels most of the time.

The motels have caused the cost of their trip to be a lot more than anticipated, about \$1500 so far.

The girls average about 50 to 60 miles a day. The most miles per day being 90. They've had 10 flats and a derailment. On leaving Spearman, they headed to Amarillo to find a bicycle shop as all their spare equipment was low.

Most of the people across the U.S. have been nice to them.

There are always a few exceptions. A few teenagers tried to run them off the road, someone threw a bottle at them, and at one town a man loaned them his car to go do laundry then harassed them.

One of the young ladies, they range in age from 24 to 29, has a habit of lagging behind. People seem to keep the others informed of how far back she is. Each day the ladies plan check points and wait for her. One day she was an

hour overdue. The other three sent a State Trooper out to look for her.

My main concern, having daughters this age, was, "Aren't your parents worried?" The young women call home often. The mother and sister of one young lady plan to fly to Tucson to visit her there.

And what happens when they get to California? They are going to fly home.

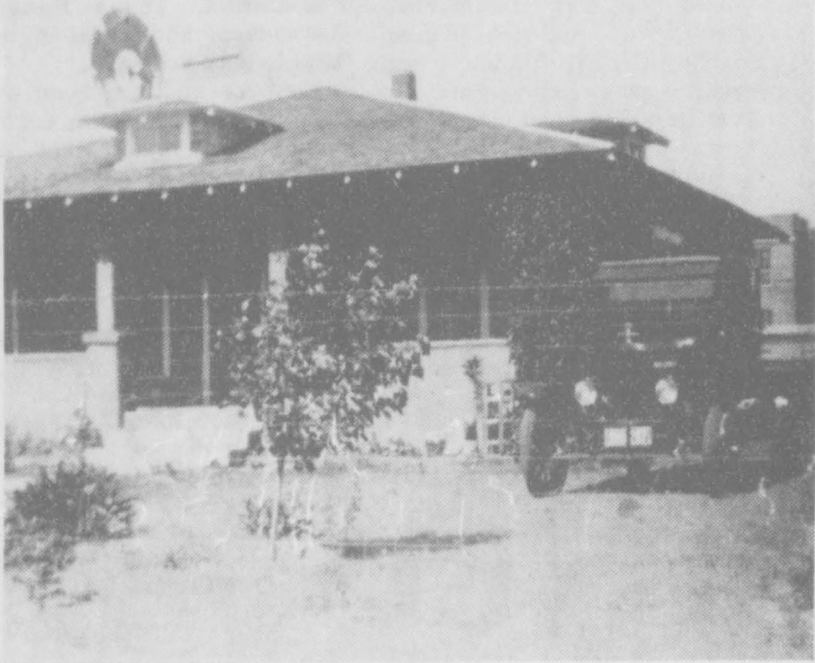

The picture of Jasper and Millie Glover, at the "John Berry" house were brought to mind by the copy of an ad you printed in the April 22 Plainsman concerning feed, seed, etc., for sale by J.M. Glover at his farm outside of town. This is the same J.M. Glover as the one in the ad. I do not know how long my grandparents lived in Spearman, as my earliest memories of them in the early thirties were in Bethany, Okla. They also moved to the Rio Grande Valley in the middle thirties and supplied us with Valley citrus for several years.

The "yard pictures" were recalled by the comments made about the various "flower clubs" formed during the dust bowl years. I recall that my mother was a member of the "Dahlia" group, and that my Dad used to act absolutely furious about the fact that she would cut his flowers to be brought in the house or to be taken some other place. He really enjoyed them being used, and he had flowers in his yards from then on until he passed away. I remember the dust bowl well - mainly because I was taken to Abilene for a year to go to school (1938-39) to break a three year cycle of having pneumonia each year - at least partly due to those "dusters."

Am enjoying the series of articles on the centennial activities. Hope it will be collected in a permanent form.

Students need college degree to compete in life

A high school diploma will not guarantee the same success in the job market that it did 20 years ago. A college degree now is necessary to compete for jobs that a generation ago could have been had with a high school diploma.

"People now visit college campuses to interview business school graduates to be manager trainees at a fast food restaurant," said Dr. William Reese, assistant professor of sociology at Texas Christian University.

Young people entering the job market today are expected to have a bachelor's degree or to be trained in a needed trade in order to get a decent job, Reese added.

As a result, parents and educators must develop a more realistic approach to education, he said.

"We can no longer tell our young people that if they finish high school they can become president of a major company," Reese noted. "A high school diploma now must be viewed as a means of going on to college to

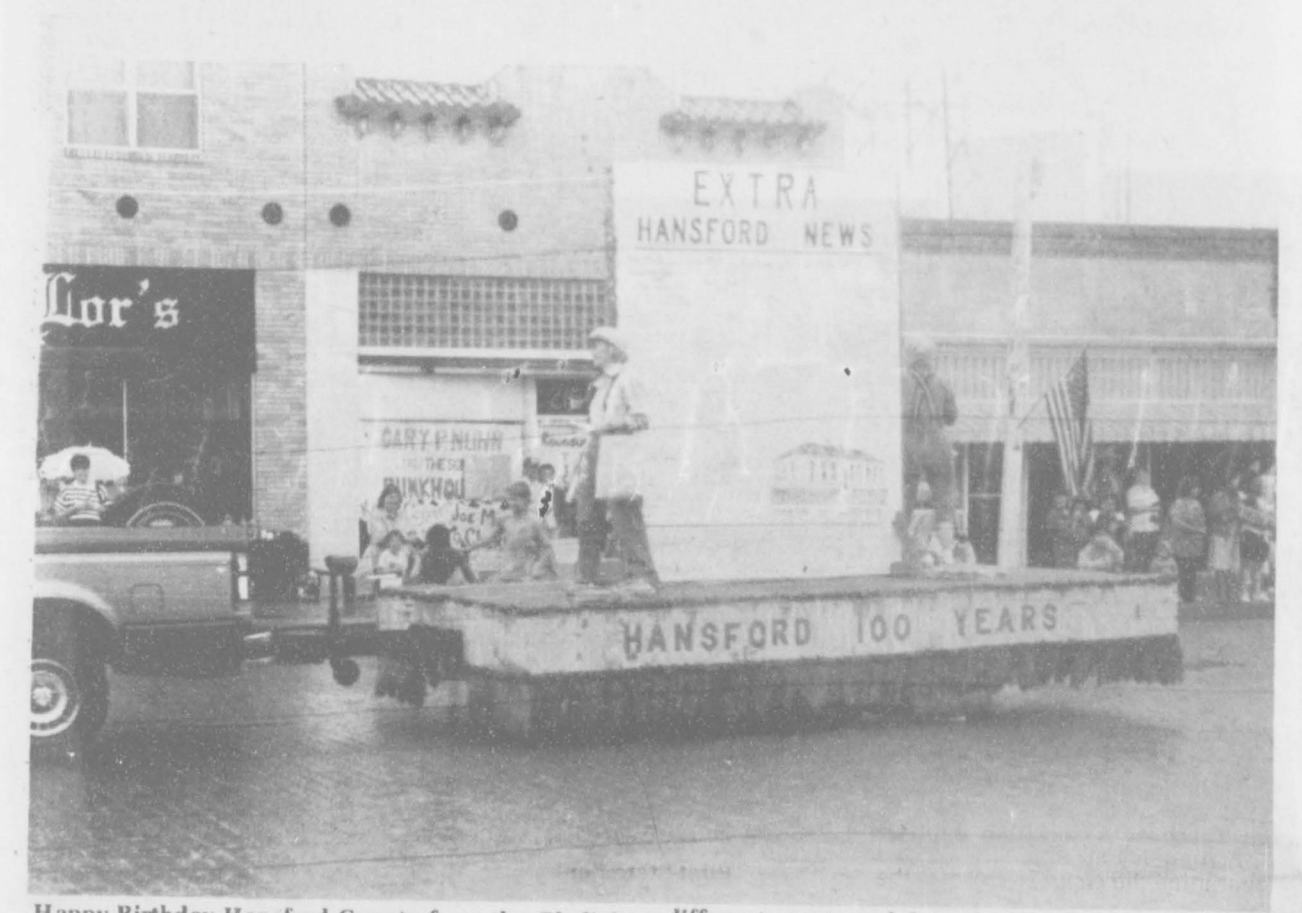

The Spearman High School class of 1959 celebrated the 30th anniversary of its graduation with a reunion Sat., June 3. Classmates began to assemble at 11 in front of the J.L. Brock building to watch the Hansford Centennial Parade. Following the parade, class members and spouses gathered for lunch and a time of fellowship at the Brock building. A "lite lunch" buffet featured a 5-foot "super sub" sandwich, a fruit tray, vegetables with dip and cookies. After the initial welcome and lunch, many memories were revived by the numerous scrapbooks, school yearbooks, and photographs on display. The early afternoon was spent visiting.

At 3:30 p.m. Loyall Turner provided guests with several drawings and a brochure detailing the Palo Duro Dam project. Following some discussion of the project and the future lake and recreation area, members adjourned to the dam site. Loyall provided a detailed description of the work being done and specifications of the dam and reservoir at completion. The drive through northern Hansford County sparked numerous memories for classmates who had been on class picnics, Girl Scout outings, and weekend camp-outs on the old Steele ranch.
