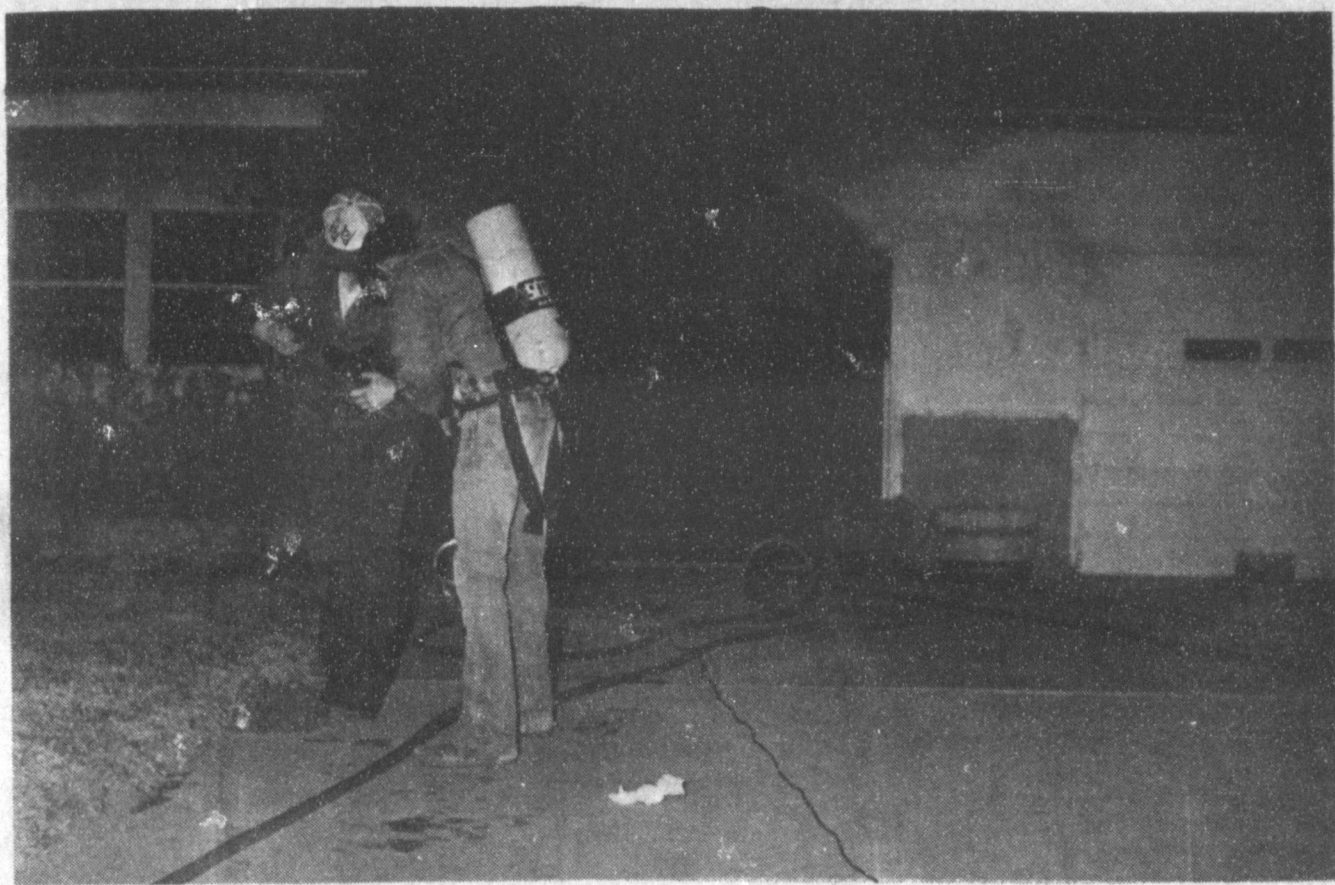

New Legislation Calls For New, Expanded Water Rules

New rules governing the permitting of water wells, waste of water, water well drilling, and the closing of abandoned or unused irrigation wells are to be considered by the Board of Directors of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1. Consideration of amending some of the District's existing rules is required in order for the District to comply with new laws passed by the 69th Texas Legislature regarding underground water conservation districts.

The most notable change required in the District's rules, will require the permitting of wells designed to produce and which will produce more than 25,000 gallons of water per day. Previously, state laws and the District's rules required permitting only those wells which were designed to produce in excess of 100,000 gallons per day.

Several classifications of wells will, however, be exempted from the permitting process. For instance, domestic wells which supply water for ten or fewer households, water wells for the drilling of oil and gas wells, and jet wells for domestic needs are exempted under the provisions of the new law. The District's Board of Directors is given an option in the case of wells used to provide water for livestock and poultry connected

with farming, ranching or dairy operations. Under the law, individual boards may consider the applicability of exempting livestock wells within their jurisdiction.

Provisions for the automatic permitting of wells which produce from 25,000 (17.4 gallons per minute) to 100,000 gallons of water per day (69.5 gallons per minute) that existed at the time the law was passed are outlined in the legislation. The permitting of these wells is automatic upon application for and completion of a water well permit. This registration process is necessary so that the District may recognize all existing well sites and provide protection for these existing sites as new permits are requested.

City Rebate Check Down Starting '86

State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently sent checks totaling \$53.2 million in local tax payments to the 1,017 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

Muleshoe received a check in the amount of \$12,594.43, down by 29.36 percent for the year from a payment a year ago in the amount of \$17,828.49.

At Morton, the rebate check was very near their payment for the same time last year at \$3,781.61, as compared to the \$3,745.04 for the same period last year, an increase of 0.98 percent.

From Littlefield, it was reported that the city received a tax rebate check in the amount of \$13,590.52, down by 6.61 percent from the \$14,552.06 received for the same period last year.

Friona's check was in the amount of \$5,726.89, reflecting an 11.72 percent decrease from the figure of \$6,487.49 the previous year.

Houston's check for \$8.4 million was the largest, down three percent from last year's payment of \$8.6 million. Dallas received \$6.4 million, down four percent from the \$6.7 million sent last year.

San Antonio's payment of \$3.3 million was up eight percent from 1985's figure of \$3.1 million. Austin received \$2.6 million -- the same amount the city received in January 1985.

Fort Worth's check for \$2.3 million was a 28 percent increase over last year's \$1.8 million check. El Paso's payment was \$1.3 million -- a seven percent increase over the \$1.2 million received last January.

"Statewide payments are up three percent over last January's checks. However, a short holiday shopping period since Thanksgiving and an early cut off in processing tax returns may account for some cities showing lower payments," Bullock said.

Local Author Has Latest Book Ready

There's no such word as "retired" in Glen Williams' vocabulary. Although he has been a farmer, a county judge, an insurance representative and currently is Community Service Advisor for the Aging Program, he also has a very prolific sideline -- as an author.

Just released is Williams' latest book, "Baptism." This is by no means his first book published, and certainly will not be his last.

West Plains Publishers, formerly Art Loft, owned and operated by Leon Watson, printed Williams' latest publication. It is more than 170 pages, bound in a hard cover, beige in color, with gold lettering.

Glen Williams probably has the most extensive private library on the South Plains, and spends much of his time, as he has for many years, in study and research prior to writing his books.

His latest book was termed by one reader, "The most comprehensive book on Baptism I have ever read."

When asked where he found the time to write, Williams said he writes while sitting down at night, between meals, and anytime he can find when he is not doing anything else. "I am either reading or writing," he added. "Sometimes I can find some time on Saturday, at least when I can be home, and sometimes can find time on other days."

At this time, he has another two books in the works -- and they will be in print in the near future. One is on the Book of

Approximately \$950 is paid yearly on a service and maintenance contract for the copy machine the boosters purchased in 1980 for use in the band department.

The spokesman added, "Making the public aware of the importance of the funds being raised, it is hoped that there will be a wide-spread participation in the forthcoming activity scheduled for Saturday, February 1, at the Civic Center."

"The Sweetheart Festival will begin at 7 p.m. and conclude at 11 p.m. with the coronation taking place at 10 p.m. Candidates will be representing each fine arts department and the final winners will be determined by the amount of funds raised for their candidates.

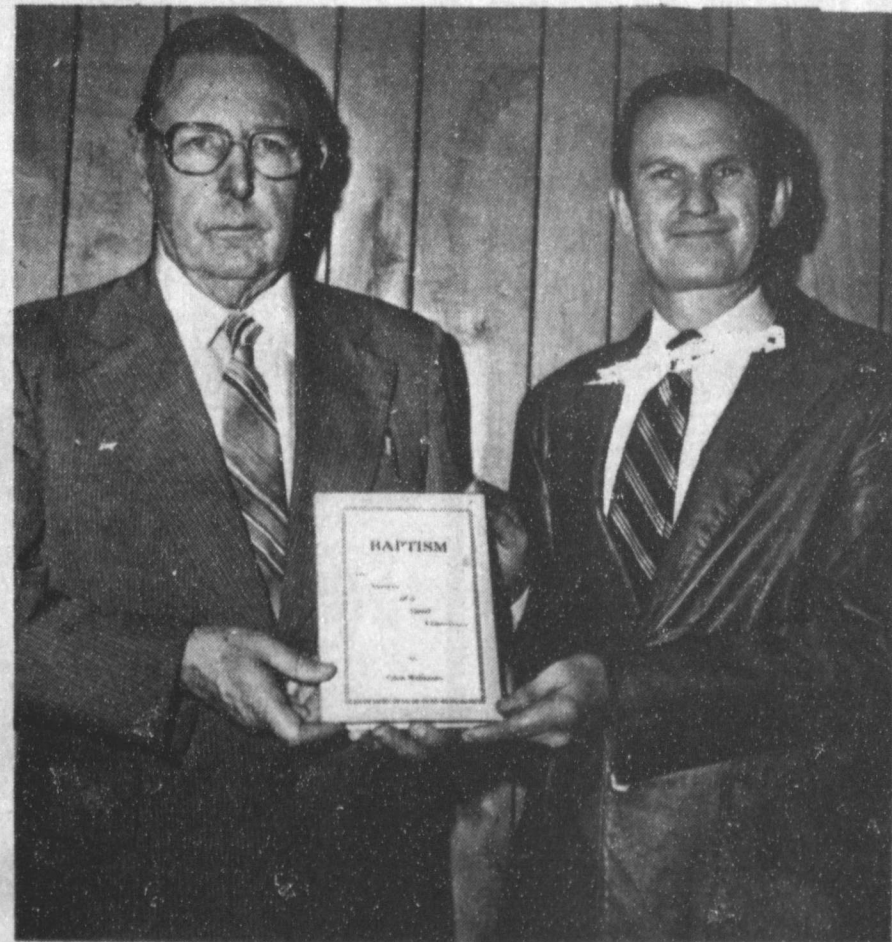
DECA Plans Fund Raiser With Radio

Teens And Stress

Teenagers may be especially vulnerable to stress related to school, family, and change. During the teenage years, youngsters experience dramatic physical, emotional and social changes. When too many changes pile up, the teen may feel a loss of independence and regress toward greater dependence on parents and other adults for decision making.

Reactions to stress differ from one youngster to the next and from one time to another. The key to recognizing a teen under extreme stress is to observe any changes in his or her feelings and behavior. An adolescent under stress may show one or more of the following symptoms:

- * Disorganization - cannot follow instruction or has trouble completing assignments.
- * Lack of interest in self and others - withdrawn, cannot find happiness.
- * Preoccupied - stares into space, distracted.
- * Emotional - cries easily, emotions out of his control.
- * Behavior changes - acts differently than he or she used to.
- * Violent outbursts - hostile, destructive, verbally abusive.
- * Regression - becomes "babyish" and has immature behavior.
- * Weight change - sudden weight loss or gain.
- * Fear - takes fewer risks, hesitant about trying new things.
- * Fatigue - very tired, lethargic; may be due to loss of sleep or irregular sleep patterns.
- * Extreme obedience and compliance - doesn't seem to really care or thinks that if he or she is good everything will be all right again.
- * School absenteeism - due to assuming more chores for depressed parents, or because he's unable to face friends.

Caring teachers, parents, and group leaders who are alert to the symptoms of teenage stress may be able to prevent tragedies such as drug and alcohol abuse, or even teenage suicide.

Dietary Questions About High Fiber Foods

Is it necessary to buy special high-fiber foods for health? Not if you're eating a well-balanced diet that includes about 15 grams of dietary fiber for every 1000 calories, say nutrition experts.

Marketers have capitalized on medical scientists' call for more dietary fiber as a possible cancer preventative, by introducing a number of high fiber products. For example, several cereals with 9-12 grams of fiber per one-ounce serving are now on the market shelves.

But according to Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist Dr. Alice Hunt, more fiber isn't always necessary.

She says nutrition research over the years has identified several useful properties of dietary fibers. Reduction of cholesterol absorbed by useful properties of dietary fibers. Reduction of cholesterol absorbed by the intestine, alteration of the ratio of types of fats absorbed or changes in the transit time of digested food through the intestine have all been reported.

However, the researchers also point out that high bulk diets may cause a loss in the absorption of essential vitamins or minerals, says Hunt. Re-

duced absorption of proteins, fats, minerals and vitamins can result from 35 grams of dietary fiber per 1000 calories per day.

Research is continuing to determine both the best types and amounts of fiber for a healthful diet.

In the meantime, the person who eats a balanced diet containing the recommended four servings of vegetables and fruit each day, as well as four servings of whole grain breads and cereals, should be able to get enough fiber from regular foods, says the nutritionist.

Vegetables, fruits and whole grains are the most common food sources of fiber, she adds. Some of the foods highest in fiber include broccoli, raw cabbage and carrots, dried beans and peas, wheat bran, oatmeal, dried prunes, unpeeled apples and other fruits with skins.

In a letter received along with the certificate Jerry T. Walker made the following statement: I express, for the Texas Department of Health, our heartfelt congratulations on this remarkable achievement. We are certain that you will make every effort to maintain this superior

level of care for your residents.

The Superior Certificate will remain valid until a re-determination is made pursuant to rules and procedures governing grading.

"We are extremely pleased to receive this award and recognition for the nursing home. We will continue to strive to provide the best care possible for our residents. I feel our staff is to be congratulated for this splendid achievement" said Jim Swanner, nursing home administrator.

These supplements and special foods are often marked up by 300 percent or more and may be of questionable nutritive value, says the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service specialist.

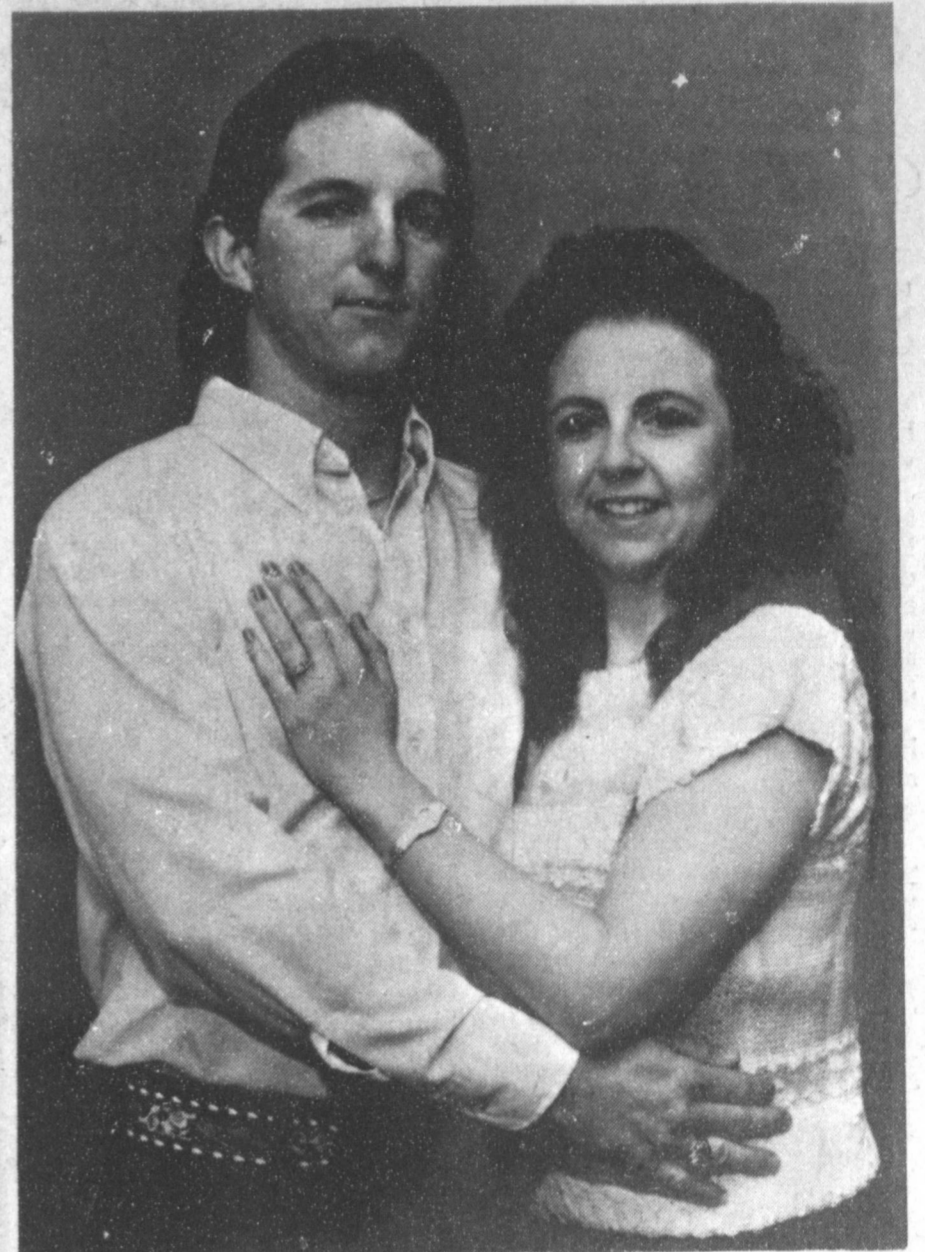

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup unsweetened cocoa
- 1/4 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1 cup buttermilk or sour milk*
- 1 can (21 oz.) cherry pie filling
- 3 cups sweetened whipped cream
- Sliced almonds (optional)

Beat egg whites in small mixer bowl until foamy; gradually beat in 1/2 cup sugar until stiff peaks form. Set aside. Combine flour, 1 cup sugar, cocoa, baking soda and salt in large mixer bowl. Add oil, buttermilk or sour milk and egg yolks; beat until smooth. Gently fold egg whites into batter. Pour into two greased and floured 9-inch layer pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes or until cake springs back when lightly touched in center. Cool 10 minutes; invert onto wire rack. Cool completely. Place one layer on serving plate. Spoon one-half cherry filling in center to within one-half inch of edge, pipe edge with cream. Top with second layer. Spoon remaining cherry filling to within one-half inch of edge. Frost sides; pipe top edge. Pat almonds into frosting, if desired. Chill. 10 to 12 servings.

* To sour milk: Use 1 tablespoon vinegar plus milk to equal 1 cup.

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Go Cart Races Pay For Vinson Cousins

Go cart racing is fun and entertaining, as well as time-consuming for the whole family as two Muleshoe families are well aware. They are the Bill Vinson and the Buria Vinson families.

Bill and Eva Lee Vinson have one son, Jerd, who drives in three classes, three go carts each race night. Buria and Linda Vinson have two sons, Jeff and Allan. They each drive one cart, in one class, each night and at times, two carts. Buria and Linda Vinson's other son, Ray, raced until he graduated from high school in May, 1985.

Jerd was the first to start racing in July, 1983. He started with one nearly new cart and a stock Briggs and Stratton engine.

About a month later, he and his dad bought a second, nearly new cart and engine. That is the cart that Allan started racing in September, 1983, when a used cart was purchased for the 1984 season, and Jeff started driving the extra cart.

Later, following the purchase of a third cart, Ray started racing. By July, 1984, Buria had purchased each of his three sons a cart. After trading, swapping and buying, Allan has one cart, Jeff has two carts and Jerd has five carts, with three of these being for sale at this time.

In the summer, Allan, Jeff and Ray worked for Buria at his business during the day, and were racing go carts at night. Last summer, Ray left for California to attend school.

Jerd does all the work on the family farm and works on his go carts. He says his day usually starts around 7:30 a.m. and ends about 10 or 11 at night.

The boys and their fathers do most of the work on their carts, with just major engine work being done by professionals.

The mothers sure don't get by without doing their share. They have the normal laundry and repair of racing suits and equipment. Also, Eva Lee is one of the two scorers for the Amarillo club and Linda fills in when one of the scorers is absent.

The Vinsons have been racing every Friday night at Amarillo at the Modified Midget Track at Folson and Amarillo Blvd. from around the first of May until the last of September and every other Saturday night at the go cart track at the Lubbock Speedway on the Tahoka Highway. That season usually runs from middle April to middle October.

During the part of the race season that coincides with school, usually the boys stay quite busy, according to Eva Lee Vinson. They work on carts at night and then on Thursday the carts have to be serviced and loaded so they can leave as soon as possible after school is out on Friday. Since Jerd has three and sometimes four carts to service and load, he usually does not get to bed until around 10:30 p.m. Racing is over most of the time between 10:30 and 11:30 p.m. So, most of the time it is quite late when the Vinsons return to Muleshoe from Lubbock or Amarillo.

Jerd and his parents made three trips to Topeka, KS so he could participate in the International Karting Federations Grand National race. The participants of this race come from Oregon, Louisiana, Kansas, Nebraska, and Missouri, as well as other states.

They said the first time they went to Kansas, it was just to find out what kind of racing facilities they had. At that time, Jerd won one first place, the second trip in July was for the pre-nationals and this was the first race for the participants to come from the entire Western United States. At this time, Jerd won a fourth place and the races were rained out after they had only raced two out of three heats.

When they went back in August for the Grand Nationals, troubles went with them. After a summer of preparing, everything went wrong, and Jerd ended up running with a borrowed cart and engine, but he did come in eighteenth out of 50 racers.

Jerd has approximately 170 trophies, ribbons and medallions. He has 117 first places, 30 second places and 14 third places. Included in Jerd's trophies are a first place win in September, 1983 for an IKF Region Four race held at Lubbock; High Point Champion for mid-season in 1984 in Modified IV Class, mid season Champion 1984.

Allan was mid season Champion in the Rookie II class. Also, Jerd was 1984 seasonal Champion in Junior II, Rookie II and Modified IV, and Hi Points Champion in Rookie II, and Modified IV and second place in Junior II. These were won at Lubbock.

At Amarillo, they do not have mid season high points or mid season Championship, but at their season's end, Jerd had first in High Points Modified IV, Allan had first in Junior II and Jerd had second and third in Rookie II.

Jerd has first in Rookie II and Junior II and second in Modified IV in the Seasonal Championship race. In 1985, at Lubbock, Jerd won first in High Points Mid Season in Rookie II, Junior II, and Box Stock, and Allan won second in Junior II.

Mid season Championship saw Jerd with first in Box Stock and Rookie II and second in Junior II and Allan was first. At the Seasonal Championship, Jerd took first in Rookie II, Junior II and Box Stock and Allan took second in Junior II.

In High Points, Jerd was winner of a first in all three classes. At Amarillo, Jerd was High Pointer, first in Box Stock and Rookie II and second in Junior II, while Allan took first in Junior II. Jeff was first in the 100cc senior class. Seasonal Champion went to Jerd in all classes.

Jeff has 43 trophies, ribbons and medallions, which include 16 first, 14 second and 10 third places. Allan has 59 trophies, ribbons and medallions, which include 20 first, 26 second and 16 third places.

Allan and Jeff also have a rollover trophy each. These are given when a driver rolls his

cart over. This year, in August, Jerd will be traveling to the four cycle Grand Nationals in Alvin, TX and all three racers will be going to the two cycle Grand Nationals in California in July.

Jerd has two carts on display in the wheel division of the Amarillo Boat Show, being held

this weekend. Another facet of the go cart racers are the benefits they perform, such as for Big Brothers and Big Sisters in Lubbock, as well as the Good-fellows in Lubbock.

Racing is big for the Muleshoe cousins -- and they have the trophies and ribbons and medallions to prove it.

trict's rules and regulations are also required under the new law. For instance, the incursion of "negligence" in the definition of what constitutes waste of water will be needed. Previously the District's rules stated that persons who "willfully" caused the waste of water were in violation of the state law and the District's rules. With this change, persons who "willfully or negligently" allow the waste of water will be in violation.

Additionally, provisions for the District to recover expenses incurred in covering open holes is modified. Prior to this legislation, the recovery of District expenses when the District is required to cover an open hole after failure of the landowner to do so, was limited to \$100 in the form of a lien on the land. Now the recoverable fees for this action are a lien on the land for "reasonable expenses" incurred by the District.

The Water District's Board of Directors may also amend its rules to reference the Texas Water Well Driller's Act regarding the drilling and completion of water wells. The primary emphasis of this act requires a surface cement seal on all wells. This seal, according to the Water Well Driller's Board, requires that cement be placed in the annular space between

the borehole and the casing to a depth of ten feet below land surface, and requires that a concrete slab or block be placed around the well at land surface extending at least two feet in all directions with a minimum thickness of four inches sloped to drain away from the well. Basically these provisions serve to protect underground water from pollution by surface runoff, contamination from rodents burrowing between the casing and bore hole, or intrusion of brine from other water-bearing strata.

Two Former Residents Charged In Murder

A former Muleshoe resident is among three men and a male juvenile charged in the shooting death of an Albuquerque college student.

According to reports, Linda Lee Daniels, 22, a student at the University of New Mexico, was abducted and later slain and her body hidden in mountains northwest of Albuquerque.

The following story is taken from the Wednesday, January 22, 1986 edition of The Clovis News-Journal:

"Two men, one a baker's helper and self-professed underworld figure and the other a construction worker, have been charged with murder in the abduction, rape and shooting of Miss Daniels.

"A third man, a Sidney T. Sliger, 20, (formerly of Muleshoe), of Los Lunas, also has been charged in the case and a 17-year-old also is in custody authorities said.

"Johnny Zinn, 44, of Albuquerque, described as the mastermind in the case, was charged with murder with firearm enhancement, kidnapping and first degree sexual penetration.

"Wallace R. Pierce, 24, also of Albuquerque (add as far as can be determined, with no Muleshoe relatives), was charged Tuesday with murder, conspiracy to commit murder, kidnapping, conspiracy to commit kidnapping and two counts of fraudulent use of a credit card.

"Zinn, Pierce and Siler were arraigned before Metropolitan Judge Charles Barnhart.

Preliminary hearings for all three are set for Jan. 31.

"Albuquerque Police Lt. Bill Conley said Miss Daniel, whose

"The Albuquerque Tribune, in a copyright story Tuesday, quoted sources close to the investigation as saying Pierce, Sliger and the juvenile, James S. Scartaccini of Los Lunas, abducted Miss Daniels for Zinn, who said he wanted a woman for a pornographic film.

"The Tribune reported Zinn ordered the woman killed because he was alarmed by news accounts of the investigation.

"The Newspaper said authorities believe the pornographic movie story probably was a ruse so the others would go along.

"Pierce, Sliger and Scartaccini were arrested last Friday. Zinn was arrested Monday after Miss Daniels' body was found."

(Note: The Journal learned that the juvenile suspect in the Daniels kidnapping and murder is a cousin of Sliger, and probably lived in Muleshoe for a short time in 1984 and possibly 1985.

One source said the juvenile was married at the time he lived in this city.

Despite some reports that the victim was a former resident of Muleshoe, such cannot be verified by The Journal, and it is doubtful that the victim ever lived in this city.)

January checks represent taxes collected on sales made in November and reported to Bullock by December 20.

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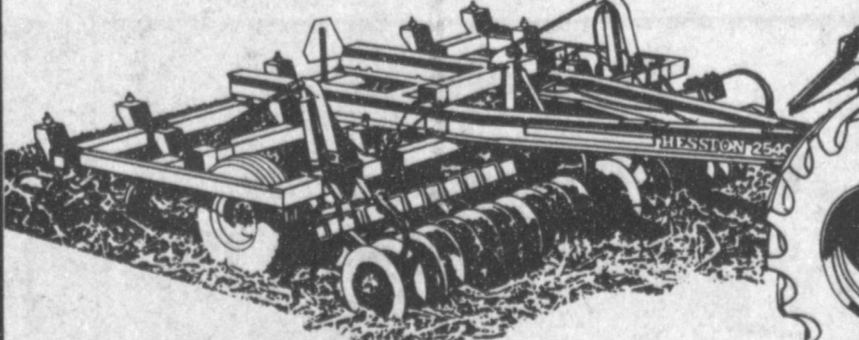

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Social Security News & Views

A new Social Security continuing review process is beginning, Laura Purcell Social Security manager in Lubbock said recently. The old process stopped in April 1984 while new rules were developed.

"The Social Security Disability Benefits Reform Act of 1984 and later regulations will make the process more effective, fair, and easily understood" Mrs. Purcell said. "Cases will be carefully and completely developed, and decisions to stop benefits will be well supported and uniform at all levels nationwide."

Mrs. Purcell said that the biggest change is the new medical improvement review standard. "Benefits generally will continue unless there is substantial evidence of both medical improvement and ability to work. Before, only ability to work had to be shown."

There are some limited exceptions where benefits may stop without medical improvement, but they will apply in relatively few cases. For example, entitlement can end if a person is gainfully employed or has clearly benefited from medical advances or vocational therapy related to ability to work.

"Another important change provides revised rules for more realistically judging a mentally impaired person's ability to work," Mrs. Purcell said. "They were developed in cooperation with public and private professional experts who work with mentally impaired people."

"Also, a beneficiary who appeals a decision that he or she is no longer disabled can have checks continue through a decision by an administrative law judge. If the appeal is unsuccessful, though, benefits must be repaid unless a waiver is granted."

The law requires everyone

who receives disability benefits to be reviewed regularly. How often a person's case is reviewed will depend on the severity of the impairment, how likely it is to improve, and other factors.

A person getting Social Security or supplemental security income (SSI) disability checks can have his or her case reviewed from as soon as 6 months to as long as 7 years after entitlement.

Among the first cases to be reviewed under the new process are those where medical improvement was considered likely when benefits were awarded. Many of these reviews were previously scheduled but delayed while the new rules were being prepared.

Also scheduled for early review will be cases where a cessation decision was appealed. They include those returned by Federal courts which will be reevaluated under the new medical improvement review standard.


