TFB Sends Delegates To Florida

Aubrey Rasor of Gruver will be among 23 voting delegates from Texas, including Texas Farm Bureau President S.M. True, as they participate in the 71st annual American Farm Bureau Federation convention in Orlando, Fla., Jan. 7-11.

The TFB delegation will be representing 327,589 member families when they vote on national policies which will impact the more than 3.8 million member families in 50 states and Puerto Rico during 1990.

Those 23 Texas delegates include True; TFB Vice President Don Smith of Sulphur Springs; TFB Secretary-Treasurer Gerald Clark of Edna; and State Directors Aubrey Rasor of Gruver and Leland White of Tahoka.

Other delegates include State Directors C.H. Dowdy of Wichita Falls, Billie Ray Huddleston of Celina, Bill Tullos of San Angelo, and Bob Turner of Voss.

The delegation also includes

Those who wish to receive USDA commodities in 1990 are requested to come in to the Hansford County Judge's office during January 1990 to certify or re-certify.

Eligibility is based on gross income, unless self-employed or farming, which is based on net income, and on size of household and residency.

Income that must be counted includes:

1. Regular wages or salary.
2. Social Security benefits (including Medicare premiums.)
3. Veteran's benefits.
4. Worker's compensation benefits.

5. Regular insurance payments.
6. Military allotments.
7. Child support payments.
8. Self-employment income less business expenses.
9. Regular monthly cash contributions or allowances that help the household meet its usual living expenses.
10. Unemployment compensation.
11. Income from rental property.
12. Interest that is received regularly (monthly, quarterly, or yearly.)

Recipients of AFDC (Aid to Families with Dependent Children), Food Stamps, MAO (Medicaid Assistance Only) or SSI (Supplemental Security Income) are automatically eligible upon proof of receipt. Food Stamp identification card is not proof, since it is not dated. However, a letter from the Department of Human Resources stating that you are to receive Food Stamps is proof.

Applicants must apply in the county of their residence and must provide proof of identity, residency and income.

The Hansford County Judge's office is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. until 5:00 p.m.

The 16 commodity advisory committee chairmen and the state YF&R chairman, Pat McDowell of Shamrock, will serve as alternate delegates to the convention.

National recommendations adopted by state Farm Bureaus, including those from Texas, will be voted upon by the 311 voting delegates at the convention.

Key speakers for the convention will be USDA Secretary Clayton

Yeutter, on Jan. 8; Susan Elizabeth Warren Forte, national agriculture ambassador to NASA, Jan. 9; and Og Mandino, retired magazine president and editor and noted sales executive, Jan. 9.

Among the key proposals to be considered by the delegates will be the 1990 Farm Bill, taxes, food safety, pesticides and water quality.

There will be several conferences on the afternoons of Jan. 8-9. The Jan. 8 livestock conference will focus on animal welfare issues and current U.S./European Community meat trade disputes.

Speakers for that conference will include Alan Middaugh, president of the U.S. Meat Export Federation, and Richard Simmons, a British farmer and member of the British Parliament.

The dairy conference will focus on biotechnology, especially BST (bovine somatotropin). Dr. Joe Conlin, the University of Minne-

sota dairy specialist, and Dr. Harold Harris, Clemson University agricultural economist, will be the speakers.

There will be one conference devoted to integrated pest management and its emerging technologies.

The other conferences will include leadership development, horticulture, peanuts, health care economics, agriculture and the environmental movement, and local governmental affairs.

On Jan. 9, the conferences will include grain and oilseed, food safety, low input sustainable agriculture (LISA), volunteer training, animal rights, farm labor, stress management, insurance, skin cancer prevention and tax planning.

Other conferences on Jan. 9 will include cotton and rice, time management, safety, agriculture in the classroom, food safety, aquaculture and improving marketing skills.

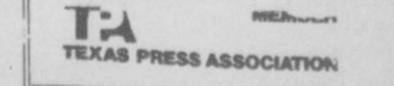

LABEL READING FOR FATS

Remember when it used to take about 15 to 20 minutes to shop? Not any more. With a typical supermarket offering about 20,000 different items all containing any number of ingredients--many of which are unknown to consumers, grocers, etc.--reading labels is the best way to discover if what you will eat fits into healthy lifestyles. Health-conscious consumers are seeking foods with less total fat and saturated fatty acids as well as other nutrients such as sodium and sugars. Label reading for these consumers is essential since so many processed foods contain hidden sources.

Nutrition Labels

Many manufacturers include nutrition information on food labels. These labels show the amount of fat (in grams) in a serving. The product's percentage of calories from fat, the amount of polyunsaturated fatty acids (saturates), and cholesterol may also be listed. Amounts of monounsaturated fatty acids are seldom listed on labels. With this information, you can compare the fat and cholesterol content of different products. For example, the labels on two products from the same manufacturer show that compared to mayonnaise, an imitation (reduced-calorie) mayonnaise may contain only half as much fat.

The real mayonnaise label has a total of 11 grams of fat (6 grams polyunsaturates and 2 grams saturates) and the imitation mayonnaise has a total of 5 grams fat (3 grams polyunsaturates and 1 gram saturates).

The labels of most packaged and processed foods include a list of ingredients. Ingredients are listed by weight, with the item present in the greatest amount listed first and the item present in the least amount listed last. Although amounts of ingredients are not given, the order, number, and types of fats listed can be helpful.

As shown below, both mayon-

naises and imitation (reduced-calorie) mayonnaise contain such unsaturated fatty acids as soybean oil. The imitation mayonnaise has more water (first item listed on the label) than the regular mayonnaise and has added carbohydrates (food starch).

INGREDIENTS: Soybean oil, eggs, water, vinegar, egg yolks, salt, sugar, lemon juice, paprika, dehydrated garlic, dehydrated onion, calcium disodium EDTA to protect flavor, natural flavor. Imitation (Reduced-Calorie) Mayonnaise:

INGREDIENTS: Water, soybean oil, food starch--modified, egg yolks, vinegar, salt, eggs, mustard, flour, phosphoric acid, dl-tocopheryl acetate (vitamin E), calcium disodium EDTA to protect flavor, natural and artificial flavor, oleoresin, paprika, beta carotene (color).

MUFFIN MANIA

If you have joined the muffin mania, beware! Many muffins on the market today are high in fat, sugar and sodium. A recent analysis of commercial oat bran muffins showed that they varied in size from 2.5 ounces to 4.4 ounces and in caloric count from 220 calories to 450 calories each.

PREFERRED OILS

Canola oil and olive oil are two of today's preferred fat choices. Olive oil is 77 percent monounsaturated, 9 percent polyunsaturated and only 14 percent saturated. Canola oil is 62 percent monounsaturated, 32 percent polyunsaturated and only 6 percent saturated.

OMEGA-3 FATTY ACIDS

Omega-3 fatty acids, highly unsaturated fats found in seafood, have been shown to slow the progression of atherosclerosis. While fish oil supplements are not recommended, two to four servings of fish a week make excellent sense for overall good health.

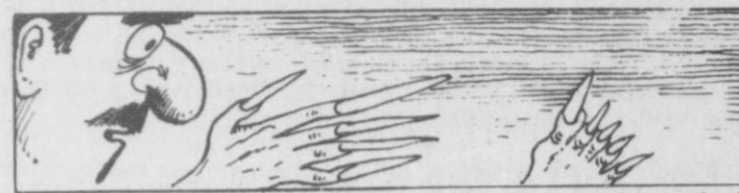
