

Wool Sales Receipts Needed By ASCS

"Farmers who have sold or plan to sell any shorn wool or unshorn lambs or mohair this year should turn in their sales receipts to be eligible for price support payments under the National Wool Act," Keith Martin, CEO of the Hansford County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said.

Martin said the quantity sold does not affect the eligibility. However, sales slips should contain the date of shearing (if possible), the month and date of sales, and net proceeds. Sales slips for lambs also must show the liveweight and state that the lambs were unshorn.

He also reminds wool producers that marketing charges must be itemized on the sales documents, other than for sales at a farm, ranch, or local shipping point. "If transportation charges are not shown on the sales receipt, producers will be required to furnish

this information when they turn in sales receipts and file for a payment.

The ASCS official said transportation charges will be deducted from the sales document even if the producer sells through a wool pool, with or without a manager, or through any other agent. The location for which the net proceeds are computed also must be shown on the sales document.

As of Jan. 22, 1990, three local farmers had filed for their 1989 wool payments, according to Martin.

Shorn wool and mohair payments are based on percentage of each producer's returns from sales. The percentage is the amount required to raise the national average price received by all producers for shorn wool and mohair in 1989 up to the support prices of \$1.77 a pound for wool and \$4.588 per pound for mohair.

Two SHS Seniors Can Win Stipends

The essays must be postmarked no later than February 16, 1990.

The essay is limited to a maximum of 400 words and no letters of reference will be accepted for consideration in the contest.

In addition to being a senior in high school, they must maintain a "B" average or better and plan to continue studies at a school of journalism. Once the winners are selected they must be enrolled in at least three hours of journalism each semester he or she receives assistance.

The scholarships will be divided into payments of \$250 per semester for two semesters for two students.

The essays will be judged by the Texas Press Association.

Census Bureau Needs Temporaries

The U.S. Census Bureau has issued a call for Hansford County residents to apply for temporary jobs.

Census work will last between two and eight weeks for most workers. They will receive \$5.00 an hour plus mileage for any official use of a private vehicle.

Applicants for the temporary positions must be 18 years old or over, a U.S. citizen, have a valid

drivers license, a social security card and take a written test.

The work consists of driving or walking in designated areas of the county to follow up on addresses that do not respond to the census questionnaire. Office jobs that will be filled are those of Data Transcriber and Clerks.

The census benefits all Americans. Reapportionment of the U.S. House of Representatives and

redrawing of Legislative District Boundries are based on census figures, while census numbers are used to distribute federal, state and local government funds to provide assistance to communities for housing, health and human services programs.

County residents interested in applying for the temporary positions should contact The Census District Office at 3501-H W. 45th, Amarillo, (806) 354-3700.

USDA Announces Program Signup Dates

Signup in the new 0-25 program for soybeans will be Jan. 16 through Feb. 16 for 1990 crops, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Since sunflowers and safflowers may also be planted on conservation use acres as approved nonprogram crops, sign-up for those crops is not required.

Dan Shaw, acting vice president of USDA's Commodity Credit Corp., said section 504 of the Agricultural Act of 1949, as amended,

provides authority to offer a 0-25 program to producers for planting soybeans, sunflowers and safflowers on 1990 program crop base acreage. The Act also allows producers to have this acreage considered as being planted to the program crop for crop history purposes.

Producers may sign up to plant soybeans on no more than 25 percent of their permitted acreages for 1990 wheat, feed grains,

upland cotton, extra long staple cotton and rice. Producers participating in this option will not lose or gain farm acreage base or individual crop acreage bases on their farms as a result of 0-25 plantings.

Following the signup period, USDA will estimate whether, based on the anticipated additional 0-25 soybean plantings, the average market price for the 1990 crop of soybeans will be less than

\$4.98 per bushel. (110 percent of the 1989 loan rate for soybeans of \$4.53 per bushel). If the soybean price is expected to be below this level, CCC will reduce or eliminate all or a portion of the permitted acreage that may be planted to soybeans under this program.

Program benefits other than soybean price support loans and purchases will not be available to producers who participate in the 0-25 program.

Hunting Lease Operators Receive Survey

Another Texas hunting season is nearly over. Hunting lease operators are preparing to close their books on this year's hunts and make plans for next year. Lease hunting occurs throughout Texas, but lease operations vary considerably. Many lease operators would like to know how others are providing services and facilities, managing game animals, protecting their operation, pricing their leases, and the range of lease charges.

How can they obtain this information? Beginning January 22, 1990, all 12,500 hunting lease operators in Texas will receive a one-page survey that asks for answers to these questions. The survey is easy to complete but of most importance to hunting lease operators will be the results. Finally, they will be able to compare their lease operation with others in the county and state.

This study is a cooperative research effort between the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Extension Service. County agents are helping get an excellent response rate by supporting this study and answering questions their lease operators may have about it. The value of the information to hunting lease operators will be directly related to the number of surveys returned.

The Extension Service will provide county/state data results to each county Extension agent for your area of interest. They will receive the results that compare

their personal operation with others in the county and state. This information should help operators and land owners improve their hunting lease programs.

Hunting lease operators that have multiple permits will be sent a survey for each permitted area. Each area under permit is described on the survey by acres and/or name—exactly the way it

was described in the permit application. Some operators or landowners may receive from two to 22 surveys in one day.

It is important that each survey for each permitted area be completed as a separate acreage. All hunting lease operators that have four or more permitted areas have been contacted about the study and advised they would be receiving a lot of mail the third week

in January.

The Texas hunting lease system has been in operation since 1929. There has never been a statewide study of how lease hunting contributes to wise management of the wildlife resource. Other states are beginning to consider lease hunting as an alternative to traditional agricultural land uses. The results of this study may demonstrate that lease hunting on private land is a practical and sensible alternative.

Turner County Judge Candidate

Loyall Turner has authorized the Spearman Reporter to announce his candidacy in the Democratic Primary for County Judge. The primary election will be Tuesday, March 13.

Turner, 49, is a lifetime resident of Hansford County. He was graduated from Spearman High School and went on to attend West Texas State University. He served in the U.S. Army in Europe as a Section Chief in the Commanding General's staff, 8th Division Headquarters. He has been a resident of Spearman for the last 26 years, where he has owned and managed his own business.

While a resident of Spearman, Turner has served in leadership positions on several voluntary service organizations. He served three years on the Grain Sorghum Producers Board. He was a committeeman for Boy Scout Troop 551. He has been the coordinator

for the Hansford County Weather Watch for 13 years.

Turner has also served as a county committeeman for the

North Plains Water Conservation District, and is a past president of the Hansford County Shrine Club.

Turner is married and has two children. His wife Ginger was born in Perryton and works as a loan officer at the First State Bank of Spearman.

Jennifer is Loyall and Ginger's older offspring. She is 18 years old, a National Honor Society graduate of Spearman High School, and is now a freshman at Lubbock Christian University. Their son Christopher is 16, and a sophomore at Spearman High School.

This is the first time Turner has run for an elected public office, but he has enlisted experienced people to help with his campaign. His campaign treasurer is George C. "Bud" Lowe. Lowe was a county commissioner for over 20 years.

Children and Cholesterol

American adults are becoming increasingly aware of cholesterol and its relationship to coronary heart disease. But there is another group at risk of developing heart disease later in life because of excess cholesterol - children.

An increased level of cholesterol, a soft fat-like substance found in the bloodstream, is a major risk factor for developing diseases of the heart and blood vessels. Some studies suggest that children with high blood cholesterol levels continue to have high levels into adulthood unless steps are taken to lower those levels through diet.

Cholesterol is found among the fats in the bloodstream. As cholesterol builds up on the inner lining of blood vessels, those vessels can narrow and even close, keeping oxygen-carrying blood from getting to the heart. The result can be severe chest pain and eventually heart attack.

According to the American Heart Association, atherosclerosis, or narrowing of the arteries, may begin in childhood and progress throughout young adulthood.

How do you know if your child is at risk for developing heart disease?

First, look at your family's history of heart disease. If you, your spouse or your child's grandparents have heart disease or high cholesterol levels, chances are your child will as well.

If your family has a history of heart disease, have your child's cholesterol level checked by a doctor. However, according to the AHA, routine screenings for cholesterol levels are not recom-

mended for all children-only those with a family history of heart disease. The AHA urges that all American adults have regular screenings for cholesterol levels and other risk factors beginning at age 20.

According to the American Heart Association, about five percent of 5- to 18-year-old American children have cholesterol levels exceeding 200 mg/dl. The AHA recommends that all American children gradually decrease their intake of cholesterol and saturated fat.

In 1978 the American Heart Association first advised physicians that children from high-risk families should be placed on a low-fat diet if they have excessive cholesterol or fat in their blood.

In reducing cholesterol and maintaining a healthful lifestyle in children over the age of two, the AHA recommends:

- maintaining a diet consisting of a variety of foods;
- maintaining a desirable body weight

- limiting total fat intake to approximately 30 percent of calories

- limiting daily cholesterol intake to approximately 100 mgs. per 1,000 calories, not to exceed 300 mgs

- maintaining protein intake at about 15 percent of calories, derived from varied sources

- limiting total carbohydrate intake to 55 percent of calories

- limiting sodium intake by cutting down on processed foods and condiments and taking the salt shaker off the table

- not smoking cigarettes; and
- maintaining a regular exercise program.

Developing good lifestyle habits now can help your child lead a healthier life.
