The Hansford County Heart Association raised \$13,612 with all their activities in celebrating the month of February as "Heart Month.

The climax of the celebration and fundraising was the Hansford County American Heart Association Banquet. The banquet was held at the fellowship hall of Gruver's First Baptist Church on February 16.

Hansford County American Heart Association board members and supporters met in the fellowship hall of Gruver's First Baptist Church on Feb. 16 for the annual banquet, association program and fundraiser auction.

The hall was decorated in primarily red, white, and silver, with clusters of red and silvery balloons forming an arched entryway. A large sign in one corner of the room spelled out this year's program theme, "Deep in the Heart of Texas," and was painted in red, white and blue. Lining the room's walls were town "store fronts'' labeled "Blacksmith," Meat Market," and "Beauty Shop," and auction items were tastefully displayed on long tables nearby.

As diners enjoyed their steaks. salads and baked potatoes, prepared and served by the Spearman Jaycees, then topped the meal off with homemade ice cream sundaes, a trio of lively musicians entertained. Brothers Les and Rod Barkley played guitars and sang a variety of

Police Department Gives Report

Spearman Police Department's annual report for fiscal year 1988-89, which was approved by the Spearman City Council.

Raper noted in the report that the information reflects a general view of the activities of the police department and compares the information for fiscal year 1988-89 to fiscal year 1987-88.

In his summary, Raper pointed out that although the number of calls for service decreased over the last year, the number of offenses increased by 57 percent. He explained that the crime rate was not up for the year, but attributed the increase in offenses to more complaints being filed and to more efficient record-keeping. Of the 297 offenses investigated by the SPD, 85 percent were

Spearman Police Chief Joe cleared by the end of the year, as Raper recently submitted the compared with an 83 percent clearance rate for 1987-88. The number of arrests was also up from 33 to 37. The total of accidents investigated was down 32 percent; citations issued were down 20 percent; and complaints filed in municipal court were down 33 percent.

> Raper said animal control activities show a decrease in all major areas except citations. Calls for service were down approximately 10 percent; impoundment of animals was down 25 percent; and complaints were down slightly, he said in the report.

Of the animals impounded 10 percent were claimed, 62 percent were destroyed, five percent were adopted and 22 percent were classified as "other," which includes escaped or stolen, released by citation, died in shelter,

SPD received 2,197 calls for service last year, as compared with 2,239 received the previous year. Offenses totaled 297 in 1988-89, while in 1987-88 there were 189 offenses. Two felony arrests were made last year, and only one the year before. Misdemeanor arrests totaled 35 in FY 1988-89, and 32 in FY 1987-88. There were no accidents resulting in fatalities last year, while one person died in an accident the previous year.

Only two injury accidents were reported in FY 1988-89. A total of 15 injury accidents were investigated during FY 1987-88. Noninjury accidents totaled 37 in 1988-89; and 41 in 1987-88. Spearman police officers issued 431 citations during FY 1988-89, and in FY 1987-88 they issued 518 citations. Complaints received by

SPD totaled 518 in 1988-89, and totaled 690 in 1987-88.

Calls for service to Animal Control totaled 549 last year and 602 the previous year. A total of 359 animals were impounded last year, as compared with 449 impoundments the year before.

Of that number 37 were claimed 223 destroyed, 19 adopted and 80 were classified as "other." During the previous year 34 animals were claimed, 335 destroyed, 15 adopted and 65 were classified as "other." Thirty-six animals were received dead by animal control in FY 1988-89, while during FY 1987-88 43 animals were received dead.

Citations totaled 14 last year and nine the year before. Sixtyfour complaints were received by Animal Control in FY 1988-89, and 69 complaints were received in FY

Municipal Court Judge Albert H. Graves recently presented the Municipal Court Fiscal Report for 1988-89 to the Spearman City Council.





Library Book Notes

by Rita Curtis Librarian

HANSFORD COUNTY LIBRARY- for 1989 came to \$30,390. THE ORGANIZATIONAL FACTS

"Do you own the library?" "Are you a county employee?" These questions, plus others concerning the library have been asked of me. No, the librarian does not own the library. No, the librarian is not a county employee. nor is the library a part of either the county or city government.

The Hansford County Library is a nonprofit organization governed by a library board whose members are appointed by the City of Spearman (Mary Alice Gibner, Marsha Murphy), Hansford County (J.L. Brock), Spearman Lions Club (James Cunningham), the Spearman Book Club (Althalie Trayler), and the Spearman Twentieth Century Club (Frances Stump, Myrna Biggers, Frances Kilgorel. Frances Stump is the current board chairman.

Funding for the library comes from several sources. The city and county each currently give the library \$750 per month. The library thriftshop, which is operated entirely by volunteers, brought in \$12,000 for the library in 1989. Donations, including money for memorials, are used to purchase books. Other monies which go into the library's operating fund include funds collected from making copies, fines from overdue books, and rent collected for use of the upstairs meeting

Paid library staff includes the librarian (Rita Curtis) and assistant librarian (Frances Kilgore), both of whom are hired by the library board.

The librarian selects all library books and other library materials. Cataloging and processing of the books is carried out by either the librarian or the assistant. Library holdings total 18,900, which includes books, periodicals, and A-V materials.

The thriftshop director is Jo McLaughlin, who is a volunteer, as are the ladies who work in the thriftshop. Current thriftshop ladies include: Jo McLaughlin, Jettie Davis, Sara Dossett, Caia Hester, Lilly Love, Pauline McGee, Margaret Novak, Helen Sanders, Jean Sheets, Dorothy Tackitt, Mary Fern Terry, Dorothy Irwin, and Claudine Laxton.

The thriftshop, which is located in back of the library building, is open for business from 2-4 on Saturdays. Items donated by people in the community are offered for sale, and all proceeds go directly to the library.

The Hansford County Library is a member of the Texas Panhandle Library System and is a member of Harrington Library Consortium which is a multitype automated library network based in Amarillo.

The library is open 34 hours a week. Weekday hours are 10-12; rooms. The library expenditures 2-6 and Saturday hours are 9-1





wanted to learn to fly an airplane. A good friend of mine, Neal Pack. heard of my interest in flying and invited me to a FAA safety meeting in Gruver. During the meeting the instructor explained that when flying, a pilot could experience "vertigo." He explained that the senses would send out wrong information to the brain, making a pilot think he was flying straight and level when in fact he was flying the plane at a dangerous attitude. Pilots experiencing "vertigo" have inverted their aircraft and flown them

into the ground.

Several years ago I decided I

To illustrate this point, he had me sit on a stool that had a place for my feet. The seat of the stool and the foot rest allowed my body to rotate in a complete circle. Next he placed a hood over my eyes. The hood was specially made with a small chamber in front of my eyes. I could see small red lights at the far end of the chamber. A stick was placed in my hands that ran down between my legs to a slot in the foot rest. The stick was used to simulate the control stick in an airplane.

In this position, the instructor began to rotate me slowly, then increased the speed somewhat. The speed of the rotation was never extremely fast. My job was

to keep the stick an even distance between my knees and in a neutral position from my chest to my knees. Slowly the rotation stopped. A very frightening sensation took over my body! My sense of balance was telling me I was standing on my head. My mind told me that the stool should be on its legs on the floor. The hood was taken off while I was in this disoriented state. 
