a thermometer to every farmer. Milk, he says, should be fed at a temperature of 100 degrees, or about body heat, and fed at the same warmth every day. warmth every day. For the first two to four days the

calf should always receive the colo-strum or first milk from its mother. This will help to prevent constipation and will stimulate the digestive tract. Until one or two week old, at least three feedings a day should be given, as a calf's stomach is small and can-not hold enough milk at one time to satisfy its needs for a 12-hour period, A change from whole milk to skim milk can be made at this time, but

the change should be gradual. Six to ten pounds of milk per day is enough for the first six to ten days. This is true for whole and skim milk, as the cream is not important in the dairy calf ration; after thirty days about one pound of milk should be fed for each ten pounds of live

weight, he finds. As soon as the calves show a de-sire to nibble, about the age of two week, a small amount of grain should be given twice daily. Any that is not eaten should be cleaned up before new grain is provided. Later, according to Mr. McIntyre, some good alfalfa hay can be added to the

ration. Three good concentrate rations for skim milk calves are: (1) corn three parts, oats three parts, wheat bran one part and linseed meal one part; (2) gound barley and inseed alead one part, (2) gound barley, and (3) oats five parts, corn one part, bran three parts and linseed meal one part.







Both men and women are required by law to pay their poll tax by January 31, in order that they may vote in the 1928 elections. The poll tax may be paid without paying the property tax but the property tax can not be paid without paying the poll tax. This applies when poll tax is charged on the tax rolls.

Automobile license must be paid by January 31, and license plates properly displayed on car, or driver is subject to arrest. Merely having the license plates in your possession is not sufficient. Also, be careful to place the "front" and "rear" plates in their proper place.
