



MOONEY suggests that the burden of careing for the unemployed cannot be carried on indefinitely. Well, if you get down to the basis logic of the situation, Industry must provide jobs, the government must provide jobs, or something like fifteen percent of our nations population must starve. Certainly, the present system of working for the small income, is much bettery than the unavoidable "dole". If there is any economist that can suggest a way of living on an income smaller than the average that is issued out to relief workers, we would like for him to come forth and give us the low-down. Perhaps Mr. MOONEY, who no doubt spends an average of \$15. per month for smokes (if he smokes) would make a suggestion that would enable a family of five to live on \$10, per month instead of the \$28, average the relief worker now gains.

We all agree with Mr. MOONEY that it would be a lot nicer if every available man in this nation had employment, and was in a position to shoulder some of the burdens of taxation instead of adding to the burden but we certainly will not get the job done by telling 15 per cent of the nations population to root hog or starve.

We suggest the old, old idea of constructive criticism to MR. MOONEY. If he is going to tear down the relief set up in the nation, let him advocate a remedy that will take the place of such a set-up.


