
The current GI Bill, in effect since June 1, 1966, has passed its mitch ann-inversary, and the Veterans Administration had pro-nounced it in a thriving state of health. Increased emoliments in each of the first four mor-the of this year -- peaking at a record 1.8 million --vas cited as one sign of its viability. April errollments were mearly 17 percent above April a year ago and 2.2 percent above March. In fiscal year 1974, a record 2.4 million veterans and military service personnel used GI Bill benefits while mearly 5.7 million have used it since 1966. VA officials said an up-ryear followed enactment of the Vietnam Era Vet-erans Readjustment Act of 1974 (Dec. 3). The law increased educational assistance rates and other-wise liberalized benefits. Higher participation rates have been compiled under the current GI Bill than under either of its two predecessors. Some 4.4 million of 7.5 million Vietname ra veterans have used it, giving them a 58.5 percent participa-tion vare



If you do want to use honey for cooking, here are the substitution guide-lines, when using for sugar in puddings, custards, pic fillings, bread and rolls, use cup for cup. 
