VOTE FOR SOIL CONSERVATION SAT

SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD SATURDAY SEPT. FOURTEETH

Provides For Remission of Half Of State Ad Valorem Taxes 1935-1936

Hansford county voters will go to the polls on Saturday September 14 to decide upon the creation of a wind erosion conservation district in the county, the direct benefits of which will be the remission of one-half of the state ad valorem taxes for a two year period in the event the measure finds favor with local citizens.

In no event will the remission of taxes interfere with that portion collected for the purpose of paying Confederate pensions or for maintenance of public schools.

In the event the voters fail to authorize the creation of the district before October 1, 1935, the county cannot obtain the benefits of the bill passed by the recent state legislature.

No Raise in Taxes Requested to explain the law authorizing the districts, County Judge J. H. Brodhurst states it provides, and every voter should understand that creation of the district will not raise taxes one cent.

Assessments are closely restricted. If a man is keeping his land in condition no control work will be done on it by the conservation district, hence no assessment.

Particularly important to the landowner are these provisions of the law: That assessments cannot be made on any land except that on which improvements have actually been made: then not to exceed the actual benefit of the land, and not until after a full hearing.

Equally important is the provision that only a part of the actual cost on improvement can be assessed against the land; that such assessment must be divided into three annual installments, evidenced by certificates.

Additional Help Recognizing the terrific toll wind erosion has taken in the Panhandle, the last state legislature which passed the conservation district law authorized every possible help for the farmer and landowner.

SPEARMAN SCHOOL ENROLLMENT PASSES FOUR NINETY MARK

Spearman schools opened Monday morning Sept. 9th, under most favorable auspices and with good prospects for a most successful 1935-36 school year.

Enrollment is divided as follows: High school 146 students, Intermediate grades 159 students and Primary grades 165 students.

Quite an interest is being manifested in some of the special courses of study in the school. Records show that 25 students have enrolled for shorthand, a new subject this year.

Nineteen teachers are employed on the faculty this year, and all have been busy the first three days with the enrollment, issuing books, classification and building of curriculum.

The school opened with an appropriate program, following which, both teachers and students got down to work, and have the classes in excellent condition at this time.

One change that is proving very satisfactory to both the students and teachers is the change from 45 minute recitation periods to one hour periods.

MAN CHARGED WITH KIDNAPPING TURNED TO SNIDER SHERIFF

Mr. Greene visited his daughter, according to information, and while the child was with some of Mr. Greene's relatives, he drove up to Spearman, bringing his daughter. Deputy Sheriff J. B. Cooke stated that Mr. Greene says he only wanted to bring the child to Spearman for a visit with his brother.

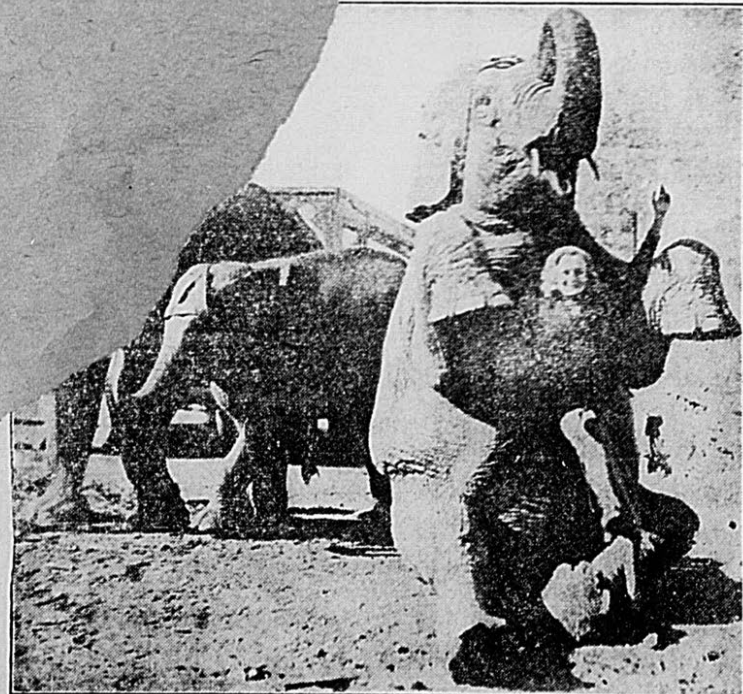

International Sunday School Lesson

By DR. J. E. NUNN

General Topic:— (A Christian worker in training) Scripture lesson 2 Timothy 1:1-11

Timothy, my dearly beloved: Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ our Lord.

I thank God, whom I serve by my forefathers with pure conscience, that without ceasing I have remembrance of thee in prayer and night and day.

Greatly desiring to see thee, I am mindful of thy tears, that they may be filled with joy.

Whom I call remembrance of my forefathers in which dwelt first in thy mother Lois, and thy mother Eunice; and I am persuaded also in these also.

Wherefore I put thee in remembrance that thou stir up the gift of God, which is in thee by the putting on of my hand.

For God hath not given us a spirit of fear, but of power, of love and of sound mind.

Be not therefore ashamed of the testimony of our Lord, nor of me his prisoner; but be a partaker of the afflictions of the gospel according to the power of God.

Who hath saved us, and called us with a holy calling, according to our works, by the giving of us grace, which was given us in Christ Jesus before the world began.

But is now made manifest to all eyes, that because of our Saviour Christ, who hath abolished death, and hath brought life and immortality to light through the gospel.

Whereunto I am appointed preacher, and an apostle, and teacher of the Gentiles.

For which cause I also suffer these things: nevertheless I am not ashamed for I know whom I have believed and am persuaded that he is able to keep that which I have committed unto him against that day.

Hold fast the form of sound words, which thou hast heard of me, in faith and love which is in Christ Jesus.

That good thing which was committed unto thee keep by the holy Ghost which dwelleth in us.

Golden Text: Give diligence to present thyself approved unto God a workman that needeth not to be ashamed rightly abiding the word of truth.

INTRODUCTION The second Epistle to Timothy is the last letter that Paul ever wrote, and it is in many ways the tenderest of all his Epistles.

It was written a few months before the great Apostles' death at the hands of Nero, about 66 A. D. and it was dedicated to an amanuensis from the Mamertine Prison in Rome, John Calvin said of this Epistle for my own part I know that this Epistle has been made more profitable to me than any other book of Scripture, and still is profitable to me every day; and, if any person shall examine it carefully there can be no doubt that he will experience the same effect.

An Apostle of Jesus Christ It was his joy to realize himself as just this - the faithful apostle of his Lord: it filled him continually and at once with a new quickness and a new energy, animating him for the thousand common days and burdens of the day. He belonged to another and in that subtle fact was involved at once a repose and motive inexhaustible. And now once more, close to the

grave, old, and worn out, and in the persecutors' final grasp, he calls himself with the old title and rests with all his weariness upon it. He will never found another church, nor ever plan another tour of inspection and development. He has but to bid farewell and to die, yet he remains to the last in the unaltered possession of the same Sender.

TIMOTHY The first mention of Timothy was near the beginning of Paul's second missionary journey, about 41 A. D. when Paul was traveling west with Lystra, a small rustic town of Lycaonia raised some fifty years before to the dignity of a Roman colony.

When Paul came to Lystra on his second journey Timothy already appears as a disciple and it may be concluded that Timothy came to know the Apostle Paul on his first missionary journey. Timothy was attracted to him at the time of the healing of the impotent man, no doubt witnessing first the attempted worship of the Apostle, and then the terrible stoning of Paul, by which he almost lost his life.

Timothy's father was a Greek, but his mother Eunice was a Jewess. Timothy was associated with the Apostle Paul through a longer period of time than any other co-worker of whom we have ever read.

Paul's Tender regard for Timothy I thank God whom I serve from my forefathers in a pure conscience, how unceasing is my remembrance of thee in my supplications, night and day, as the cheerful slave and open upon him as he lies waking the night; as he sits thinking alone or with Luke, when the pale light shines again; he is continually telling the Lord about Timothy, and asking him for mercy and cheer and the drying of a tear. That Paul may see him once again and yearning heart.

With that instinct of retrospect which is frequently so strong in dying men, he reached back to his fathers and feels their spiritual oneness with himself before their God. Thus, thinking of his fathers, he expresses now a yet tenderness affection towards his dear child. His own soul is faint with a home sick yearning.

Paul's Supreme Faith For I know whom I have believed, and I am persuaded that he is able to guard that which I have committed unto him against that day. The word here translated "committed" always implies the situation of one who has to take a long journey and who deposits his money and other valuables with a friend, trusting him to restore it on his return. The committing is always that of the depositor; the duty of the friend is to guard. Thus Christ on the cross committed his spirit to God his Father, and we commit our souls to a faithful Creator. The day here referred to is of course the day of the Lord's return. The sufferer elaborates no fine drawn theory of his own safety. It lies just in this: HE IS ABLE to guard my deposit, to guard myself and my life all along and always. Though life be hard he will guard you through death, and unto that day, that unnamed day when at length he will see his Guardian face to face.

Tri-State Fair Opens At Amarillo Saturday

AMARILLO, Texas, Sept. 12— Saturday of this week marks the opening of the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo.

Then follows seven days packed with excitement and entertainment, ending Saturday, September 21.

Horse races, a daily feature of the exposition, start a day earlier, Friday, September 13.

From every standpoint, fair association officials predict, this year's exposition will be the most interesting, instructive and intriguing ever held in the Southwest. With no stat fair this year at Dallas it will be the largest.

All exhibits with the possible exception of a few livestock herds from distant states, will be in place when the fair opens.

"Every effort will be made to have the exposition as complete on the opening day as on the closing day," said Wilbur C. Hawk, president, who predicts more and better entries and a larger attendance than during any of the 12 previous years.

In addition to thrilling races every day, there will be other major attractions.

Sadler's three-ring circus, featuring Jack Hoxie, screen star, who will appear in person at each performance, will be at the fair beginning Monday, September 16.

Beckmann & Gerety, owners and operators of the largest midway shows in the United States, will come direct from Detroit and probably will open a day before the fair.

There will be other amusements, too.

O. L. "Ted" Taylor, secretary-manager, declared every department of the exposition would be complete, revealing the best in agriculture, industry and art in the Southwest.

"Livestock exhibits especially will be unsurpassed anywhere," he said. "Visitors to the Tri-State Fair will see the same noted herds entered at the America Royal in Kansas City or at the International in Chicago."

Many of these herds are sent to the exposition by foremost breeders from distant states.

"Make arrangements now to attend the Tri-State Fair and spend more than one day on the exposition grounds if possible," suggests Mr. Hawk. "The Tri-State Fair is too large to be seen in one day, particularly if you want to view all of the exhibits and attend some of the many attractions."

Many visiting delegations, accompanied by bands, will come to Amarillo during exposition week.

These delegations will come by special train and motor caravans.

"Nobody left in Groom but the city marshal" is the slogan of that town for its day at the fair.

Other towns have issued official proclamations setting aside certain days to visit the fair.

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P. A. LYON TELLS HIGH-LIGHTS OF FEDERAL FARM LOAN SHORT COURSE

The sectional short course of the Farm Credit Administration held at West Texas State Teachers College, Canyon, Texas, September 6 and 7 was a great success, according to P. A. Lyon, Secretary-Treasurer of the National Farm Loan Association, who, with L. W. Rosenbaum, one of the directors of the association has just returned from the meeting.

All who attend had an opportunity to learn more of the operation of the various units of this large financing system for agriculture that has, through its operations, helped thousands of Texas farmers and ranchers to carry on through the period of emergency.

Among the principal speakers at the meeting were A. C. Williams, President of The Federal Land Bank of Houston and General Agent of the Farm Credit Administration of Houston, who spoke on the work of The Federal Land Bank in making on its own behalf loans and as Agent for the Land Bank Commissioner. Mr. Williams also told of recent legislation which permits Land Bank Commissioner loans to be made to worthy tenant farmers to enable them to purchase farms of their own.

The objective of the Farm Credit Administration of Houston in coordinating National Farm Loan Association and Production Credit Associations was discussed by Mr. Williams. Of this he said: "Our goal is to have credit centers accessible located where farmers and stockmen can secure both long and short term credit service according to their needs. In these local credit centers the National Farm Loan Association and Production Credit Associations should be linked together as closely as administratively feasible in order to render the maximum service at the minimum cost. Problems related to credits collections, management, territory, and improved services to borrowers will be worked out on a basis of mutual advantage to both systems."

Virgil P. Lee, Vice-President of the Production Credit Corporation of Houston, told how production credit loans are made at a low rate of interest through Production Credit Associations to aid farmers and stockmen in the production of crops and livestock. T. P. Priddy, Jr., Vice-President and treasurer of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank, which discounts the notes of farmers and stockmen on loans made by various eligible lending agencies. Jno. B. Jones, Secretary-Treasurer of the Houston Bank for Cooperatives, spoke on the various types of loans made to farmers cooperative associations in Texas.

Another interesting feature of the short course was a practical demonstration of farm land appraisal by land bank appraisers. This was conducted by P. W. Chunn, Chief Appraiser of the Federal Land Bank of Houston, and A. E. Aday, Reviewing Appraiser of the Farm Credit Administration, Washington, D. C.

D. B. Sauls, Supervising Inspector for the F. I. C. B. of Houston presided at a special meeting of Intermediate Credit Bank inspectors in the Panhandle territory.

H. H. Fennell, Regional Director of the Soil Conservation Service, Dalhart, spoke on terracing to conserve moisture or to prevent damage to the soil from wind erosion.

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Agriculture was the subject of P. D. Hanna, District Agent of the Extension Service A. & M. College.

Miss Viola Jones, County Home Demonstration Agent of Wheeler County talked on the subject of What the Home Demonstration Agents are Doing to Make Farm Life More Attractive.

Monday night an open forum was held with short talks by a number of speakers, including R. S. Rogers of Lubbock and S. P. Britt of Shamrock, directors of the F. C. A. of Huston; Homer D. Wade, Secretary of the Texas Cooperative Council, and L. T. Haynes, President of the Texas Cooperative Council. At this session, two girls an dtwo boys, Gold Star winners in 4-H Club work in Wheeler County, were presented by Miss Viola Jones, home demonstration agent of Wheeler County, and Jake Tarter, County Agent of Wheeler County. These boys and girls told of the demonstrations in which they won the Gold Star honors.

Saturday, the first speaker was S. R. McWhirter, Field Coordinator of the F. C. A. of Houston, who spoke on the coordination of National Farm Loan Associations and Production Credit Associations.

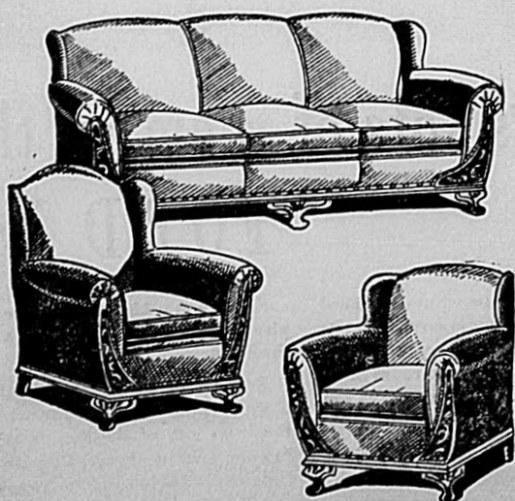

TAKE GREAT CARE IN GETTING SEED WHEAT

Because this is the first year several that wheat farmers have had a really favorable condition for seeding, it is urged that care be taken in the selection of your seed wheat. Germination tests, the County agent continued is a good practice every year, but is particularly important this year because there have been some complaints of poor germination this year. A farmer Mr. Boykin explained that he can make his own germination test by taking a known number of seed wrap them in heavy cloth, and keep them warm and moist. Germination usually will begin in three to five days. By simple counting the farmer can determine per cent of germination. It is very important to keep seeds moist.

HOME TOWN GROCERS

MARVIN JONES ARRIVES HOME FROM CONGRESS

SAYS GOVERNMENT SPENDING WILL SLOW DOWN. Declaring that in his opinion federal spending is not necessary for the future on the same scale as in the past months, Congressman Marvin Jones returned home yesterday after one of the busiest sessions of Congress in history.

Mr. Jones, who has directed the major farm aid acts of the Roosevelt administration said he considered payments to farmers as necessary to tide them over the depression.

General conditions now how ever are improving and, in his opinion it will not be necessary to continue appropriations on a large scale as in the past.

"The session which has just adjourned enacted a great deal of important legislation," said Mr. Jones.

"It has been my privilege to handle the legislation affecting the farm program.

I believe this legislation has meant much to our section and to the country generally. Stricken as it has been with the worst and most protracted drouth in our history, it is difficult to see how the people of the Plains could have bridged over this period without this part of the program. It is doubtful whether either the farmer or the business man could have withstood these conditions but for the sums that came to our counties in wheat payments, in the cattle program in the farm mortgage refinancing and in production loans.

I do not believe it will be necessary to continue the large appropriations made. Business conditions are now definitely turning for the better, and it is hoped that we are practically through the period of distress.

Congressman Buchanan, who is the head of the committee which handles these matters has declared that retrenchments will begin with the next session of the Congress, with a view to balancing the budget.

I am in thorough accord with this course. While adequate pro-
