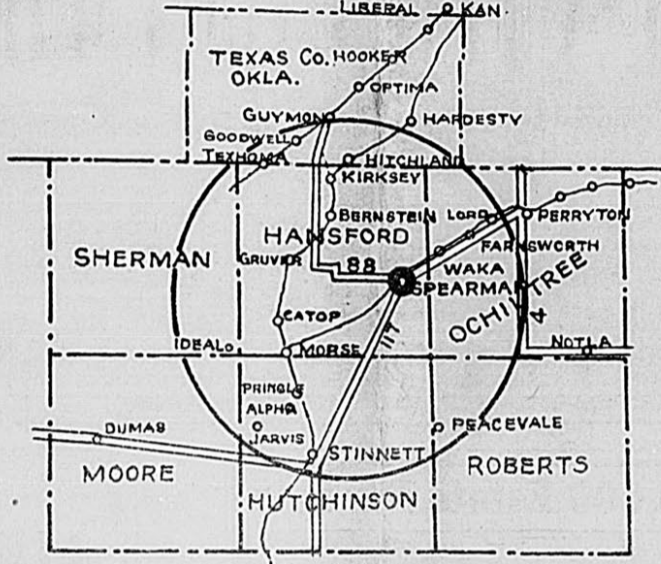

IMPORTANT MEETING ALLOTMENT BOARD FOR NOVEMBER 19.

Wheat producers of Hansford County are notified that an important meeting of the Hansford Wheat Allotment Board will be held all day Monday November 19th. Any wheat producer who has any complaint to register, or desires any information relative to the allotment is asked to meet with the board Monday.

The meeting was ordered by President of the Association A. E. Ferguson. The Board is very anxious to make a good record for Hansford county and they feel that this method will enable them to get in touch with the producers various problems.

IMPORTANT HANSFORD COUNTY TEACHER'S MEETING NOV. 21.

Notification of a county meeting of all teachers of Hansford county to be held in the study hall of the Spearman High School has been sent out this week. The meeting will be held the evening of November 21st.

A state-wide movement was begun early this year by state school officials to make a study of all curriculums in Texas schools. The movement has progressed to the point that teachers of every county in Texas are being organized for the study. In Hansford county J. B. Speer, Superintendent of the schools of Morse has been appointed county chairman.

The November 21st meeting will take the form of a special program to outline the work planned for Hansford county. Speakers on the program include Superintendent W. A. McIntosh, of Amarillo, who is chairman of the Panhandle district organization, Dr. Harris M. Cooke, West Texas State Teachers College, who is state deputy superintendent, has been invited to appear on the program here Nov. 21st. Deputy State Superintendent Bryon Dixon of Childress is also on the program. Supt. B. C. Shulke of Borger will assist in the Spearman program.

All teachers of Hansford county are urged to attend the meeting.

Additional Allotment Checks Received In Spearman Monday

Thirty four thousand five hundred and ninety eight dollars and forty cents was received in checks by the Hansford County Wheat Allotment Board Monday morning of this week for distribution to wheat producers of the county. This brings the total received and that for which the board have notification of receipt, up to above one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

President A. E. Ferguson of the allotment board has hopes that the entire 1933-1934 allotment will be received during the month of November.

WHY PROSPERITY MUST RETURN

This latest study brought about some basic conclusions which may be summarized as follows:

1. During the so-called "new era" of the gay twenties the United States was not living beyond its means.
2. There has been a tendency, at least during the last decade or so, for the inequality in the distribution of income to be accentuated.
3. Vast potential demands alike for basic commodities and for conventional necessities exist in the unfulfilled wants of the masses of the people, both rural and urban.
4. The United States has not reached a stage of economic development in which it is possible to produce more than the American people as a whole would like to consume.

GOVERNMENT WILL BUY 500 HEAD OF HANSFORD CATTLE

County Agent Frank Wendt received official notice this week that the Federal Government would purchase 500 additional head of cattle in Hansford county.

Listing of cattle for purchase was begun the first of the week by Mrs. Jimmie Jackson at the cattle buying office in the court house. One hundred and thirty six head of cattle were registered for purchase Monday and Tuesday of this week. County Agent Wendt stated that he did not know just when the government would send inspectors to Hansford county to complete the purchase of cattle. He is anxious, however, that all who desire to sell register their intention at the office this week.

COUNTY COURT OPENS DECEMBER TENTH

Aside from such civil cases as may be registered on docket of county court, several criminal cases are carried on the docket for disposal when County court opens in Hansford county December 10th.

Omar and Austin Cotter are alleged to have willfully killed domestic animals with the intent to injure owner, in an indictment returned by the District court grand jury and transferred to the county court.

Bill Johnson of Gruver is alleged to have carried a pistol unlawfully by a similar indictment of the district court grand jury.

Lloyd Andrews Buddie, McCloud and H. E. Larson are indicted on alleged stealing wheat charges by the same district court grand jury.

LEGISLATURE PASSES DELINQUENT TAX LAW

Those who owe taxes which were delinquent on August 1, 1934, will now have the opportunity to pay them without the penalties and interest which have heretofore accrued on them, according to advices from Representative B. L. Rogers at Austin.

The Pope law which was passed in the closing days of the Fourth Called Session, will be effective immediately as a result of a resolution which was passed after the bill was passed. When the bill was passed it did not receive the necessary two-thirds vote in the Senate to place it in immediate effect so the resolution was later passed in order to accomplish this purpose.

The law provides that all penalties and interest on ad valorem taxes which were due on or before August 1, 1934, are released if the taxes are paid on or before March 15, 1935. If the taxes are paid between March 15, 1935 and April 1, 1935, there will be added a penalty of two per cent. If the taxes are paid during the month of April there will be added a penalty of three per cent. If the taxes are paid during the month of May there will be added a penalty of four per cent. If the taxes are paid after June 30, 1935, there will be added a penalty of eight per cent, together with interest at the rate of six per cent per annum.

The law is mandatory on all cities, school districts, water districts, etc., up until March 15, 1935. After that date the law is optional and the governing bodies of political subdivisions of the State may adopt the provisions of the law by passing an ordinance or resolution to that effect.

Dodson Home Wrecked By Fire.

While the family was visiting in Texhoma the Dodson home was almost totally destroyed Sunday evening by a fire that had evidently been smoldering for some time before it was discovered. The alarm was turned in about 6:30, but before the fire truck could reach the scene the fire was well under way. Although the Fire department had the flames soon under control, and too, about 50 per cent of the furniture and clothing had been salvaged, actual damage had already taken its toll. Much of the clothes that appeared to be in good condition at the time proved to be no more than shreds when handled a bit. The cause of the fire was attributed to a defect in wiring.

Fortunately, Mr. Dodson carried sufficient insurance to cover most of his loss, but the furniture and clothing of Mr. and Mrs. Vaught, who were living in the house at the time was all a total loss. Mr. Vaught carried insurance, but it was on his home in West Spearman, where they have moved since the fire.

The Spearman Lynx breezed into the sectional championship when they handed the Perryton Rangers a 28-8 defeat Friday, November 9.

Scoring in the second and fourth quarters the Lynx showed an offensive power that astounded the local fans. Taking the ball early in the second period the Lynx swept down the field to their first touchdown. On the kick-off, Holton kicked the ball down to Perryton's two yard line, a 58 yard kick. Perryton tried to punt, but Easley, Lynx tackle, broke through and blocked it, and then fell on it beyond the end zone for a safety.

In the last quarter Perryton took the ball on the kickoff and went down the field for their touchdown, showing an excellent quality of offence. With the score 21-8, the Rangers tried desperately to get a man loose on a pass. They tried three in a row, all being incomplete. Ruben Deering, star end for the Lynx, intercepted the third. On the next play, Captain Patterson threw a long pass to Holton for the fourth and final Lynx touchdown, just as the game ended. The next game will be with the winner of the Panhandle-Groom game Friday, November 23, for the bi-sectional honors.

The Lynxettes are not at all daunted by the defeat but are going to play better basketball next time.

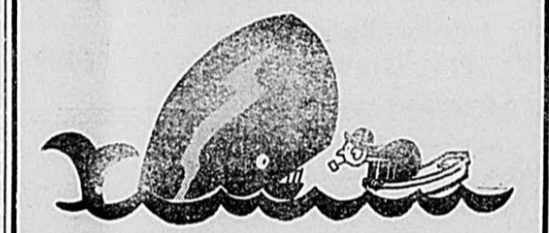
The second string Lynxettes also were defeated with a 28-8 score.

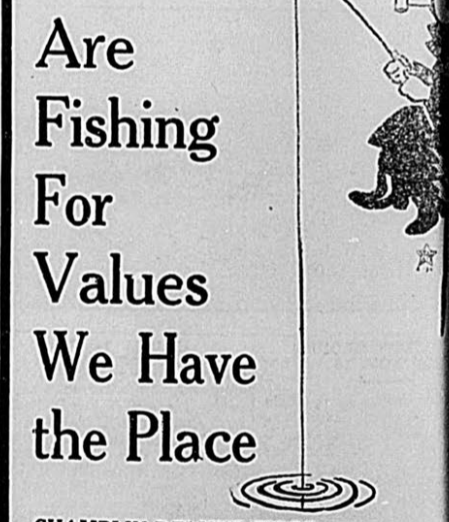

Within the last five years at the Methodist church these are some of the results that have been achieved. This is due to the loyalty of the members and friends of the church and the business-like way and concerted efforts of the board of stewards. They within the last month have accomplished the seemingly impossible thing, in coming out 100 percent on the salary. Too much praise can't be given them—for they have been tireless in their endeavor to have a full report on financial lines. They said we think we can put it over and over it went.

We leave for conference at Abilene today (Tuesday). But we go with the satisfaction of knowing that we have the friendship not only of the church and friends but of the entire community. We have cherished the fact that we have no enemies in this community and that you too are our friends. If we are returned for another year we shall be very happy. But if we are appointed to another field of work we shall try to do as we have done here—be a friend to all people and we know we will find many friends, too. This pastorate has been the most pleasant one of them all and we have a deep affection for everyone.

We had 160 at Sunday school last Sunday—which only lacked six of coming up to the record attendance. Three adults came into the church—one on profession of faith and baptism and the others by certificate. Three babies were christened. Three more adults would have come into the church if illness had not been in their home. At the morning hour we had to use our chairs to seat the crowd and at the evening the house was again filled. Keep the good attendance going.
