El Salvador la Tiniest Nation of the Americas

El Salvador is one of the most pro-gressive and most intensely cultivated countries in the Western hemisphere, according to a bulletin of the National

Geographic society.

Although "Salvador," as the of the country is generally a of the country is generally abbre viated, soldom appears in the news. It is distinctive in many respects among the republics of Central and South America. El Salvador is the smallest country, independent or dependent, on the mainland of either North or South America, and, excepting Haiti, the smallest nation in the Western hemisphere. It is the only country between Canada and Colombia without an Atlantic as well as a Pacific seaboard, and it has the dens-Pacific seaboard, and it has the dens est rural population on the mainland of the Americas. In an area about

of the Americas. In an area about equal to that of Maryland live nearly 1,500,000 people.

Although it is fringed with rich troptcal forests along its Pacific seaboard, and with volcanoes around its inland frontiers, the greater part of the country is situated on a healthful, well-watered and fertile plateau about 2,000 feet above sea level. Coffee is the chief crop, comprising about 80 per cent of the exports of the country. The most unusual export of El Sal-

The most unusual export of El Sal-ador, however, is the misnamed The most unusual export of El San-vador, however, is the misnamed "balsam of Peru." Balsam, which is used for medicinal purposes, is the sap of a tree native to El Salva-dor. But the early Spaniards shipped the sap to Peru, where it was re-shipped to Spain.

Cakes of Salt Used as Money in Asia, Africa

Salt as a standard in the history of commerce antedates the gold standard. As a medium of exchange salt was widely used in many ancient countries. The Mogul conquerors of India made decrees hundreds of years ago regulating the standard of salt that was used for money. In Asia and Africa cakes of salt were frequently used for money.

Besides being used as money, salt in days gone by was a powerful developer of commerce. Being essential to life and unavailable to tribes remote from the sea, from which the substance was obtained by evaporation, trade routes were early developed to provide the transportation of Salt as a standard in the history of

salt. For hundreds of years a caravan route was maintained between
Palmyra and Syrian ports. Even today much of the caravan traffic in
Sahara is largely in this precious
commodity.

The oldest road in Italy is not the

Despite Various Insects,

They Are Easily Placed

To identify every insect is beyond the capacity of the wisest entomologist who ever lived, so many kinds there which entomologists have scientifically named and described. Even if all of them were caught and preserved, and assembled in one place, with the best facilities for studying them, it would be impossible for the human brain to remember the fine details of structure, color and pattern which distinguish each kind from all the others. However, it is not as hopeless a task as it may seem. In a few days one can learn the great important groups of insects that are called there which entomologists have scien tant groups of insects that are called "orders," so that 10 per cent of all the insects can be placed in their proper

order.

First of all, the orders are: The Coleoptera (or beetles and weevils); the Lepidoptera (butterfiles and moths); next, the Hymenoptera (the ants, bees, wasps, etc.), Following these are the Diptera (files, mossibles except the Linguisters (the true and the content of the t quitoes, etc.); the Hemiptera (the true bugs); the Orthoptera (grasshoppers bugs); the Orthoptera (grasshoppers and criciets, etc.); the Odonatra (dragon flies, etc.); the Mallophaga (the biting lice); the Anoplura (the blood-sucking lice); the Neuroptera (the netted-velned insects). Ninetyniae per cent of all the insects which you encounter, will ordinarily belong to one of these orders.

The Sphinxes

Like the pyramids, it isn't known
who built or carved out the sphinxes.
Their approximate age, however, can
be traced to the dynasty in which they
were built. The most celebrated and
remarkable of the Egyptian sphinxes
is the Great Sphinx of Gizeh, lying
among the pyramids as a guardian of
the necrocalls. Inscriptions found on the necropolis. Inscriptions found on this famous monument when the dust of the ages was cleared away from the front of it in 1816 indicate that it the front of it in 1810 indicate that it was built in the Fourth dynasty, possibly 3750 B C. To the Egyptians such figures were artistic conceptions of an imaginary animal believed to be a favorite incarnation of Ra, the sun god. The Pharaohs were held to be the descendants of Ra, and his representatives on earth. For that reason the face of a sphinx was modeled after that of the reigning monarch, or sometimes from that of the queen. Numbers of smaller sphinxes have been found in the sculptures of Assyria, Babylonia and Phoenicia.

The famous Danube river is the second longest river in Europe and passes through or touches six nations as it winds its way from the Black Forest of Germany to the Black sea, where it empties. The river is formed by the confusion of two analysis of the sample mountains. confluence of two small mountain streams, the Brigach and the Brege in Baden, at an elevation of 2,264 feet above sea level. By the time the river reaches Vienna it has dropped to 500 feet above the sea. The total length of the Danube is 1,740 miles. Chinese, Egyptians and Persians Loved Flowers

China shows the carliest record of the use of plants and flowers for dec-oration. Flowers and religion are the use of plants and flowers for decoration. Flowers and religion are closely united in all their early history, so the Chinese used to offer flowers as presents to their gods and to the departed relatives they worshiped as part of their religion. The way these racts are determined is by the paintings on old tapestries, vases, and potteries which symbolized the actions of the people. The predominating flower in the early history was undoubtedly the peony, as it is found depicted on nearly all the works of art.

In Egypt also, the history of flowers was closely bound to that of religion, for here, too, the people placed flowers on the altars and made certain towers sacred to certain deitles. The part

sucred to certain deities. The part that plants played is learned more eas-ily than from Chinese history because the Egyptians clearly depicted their Although the use of plants in Per-

Although the use of plants in Persia was largely influenced by the Chinese and Egyptians, the Persians still maintained a distinct character. The hanging gardens of Babylon may have constituted the most famous piece of landscape work of ancient times; this so-called wonder of the world was secomplished by terracing a steep lilliside; the ultimate effect was that of many gardens hanging on the hillside. As Persia is a hot, sandy country, their decorative plantings had three their decorative plantings had three main features in landscape design: wa-ter, trees, and grass, With them, flowers and color were relatively unimportant.

Faustin Elie Soulouque Ruled Haitian Republic

Faustin Elle Soulouque, who reigned as Faustin I from 1849 to 1858, was a full-blooded negro. He was elected president of the Haltian republic by mulatto politicians who believed he would be a pilable tool. He was sixtythree years old, and though he bore three years old, and though he bore the title of general he was a man of no prominence. Shortly after his dec-tion Soulouque amazed his sponsors by manifesting entire independence, and then surprised the world by formally proclaiming himself emperor and pro-viding a gorgeous and extravagant cor-onation for himself and his wife, "the Empress Adelina."

Solouque was a man of meager Lidlity and was decisively defeated in two wars against the neighbor republic of Santo Domingo. After he was dethroned in 1838 and exiled to Jamaica the republic was re-established. Soulouque was eventually permitted to return to Hall to die. turn to Halti to die.

The first emperor of Halti was Jean

The first emperor of Haiti was Jean African savage and brought to Haiti as a slave. He completed the liberation of Haiti begun by Toussaint Touverture and reigned as Emperor Jacques I from 1804 to 1806. The only other Haitian monarch was the much abler Henri Christophe who scorned the imperial title and ruled despetically but beneficially as king.





"Summing up the situation as we move into a new crop year and a continuation of the adjustment program," Farrel continued, "the carryover had been reduced by the drouth and acreage retirement from its former staggering size of 389,000,000 bushels to about 260,600,000 bushels. For the crop marketing during the last year the farmers have received average prices which, plus benefit payments, brought returns for the domestically consumed portion of the crop very close to parity levels.

"It is also significant to note that the short crop of 1933 totaling only \$27,000,000 bushels had a farm value of \$357, 550,000 not including adjustment payment while the large crop of 1932 totaling 726,000,000 bushels had a farm value of only \$228,305,000. In other words 200,000,000 bushels less wheat was worth \$119,000,000 more and including benefit payments \$217,000,000 more

fit payments \$217,000,000 more than the 1932 crop.

The program for the 1934-35 crop year is planned on the same basis as the one just completed. The benefit payments have been announced at 29c per allotted bushel; processing tax for the present remains the same and the amount of reduction will not be more than 15 per cent of the basis." 
