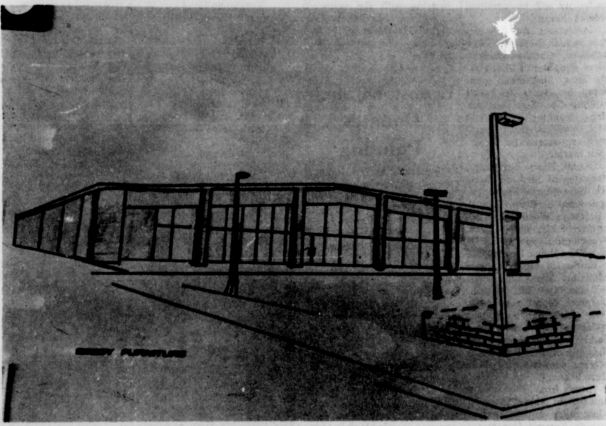

Annual Sidewalk Sale To Be Held

The annual sidewalk sale held by Spearman merchants and business firms as part of the Hansford Round-Up Celebration has tentatively been set by representatives of the Retail Merchants Association in Chamber of Commerce offices. Plans at this time call for sidewalk sale activities on both sides of Main Street and at other locations in the city from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. or thereabouts on June 4.

The sidewalk sale will be part of the celebration which has a parade theme this year of It's Child's World. Customarily during the celebration days, clubs, churches, and other organizations sponsor booths. Some booths are already scheduled for the June festivities and any clubs, churches or other organizations, in Spearman, Gruver or elsewhere, interested in sponsoring a booth are requested to contact the Chamber of Commerce office in Spearman for necessary arrangements.

Comptroller Bob Bullock has mailed checks totaling \$16.2 million to Texas cities and towns, representing the April rebate of the one-cent sales tax they assess, with Spearman receiving \$3,799,92 and Gruver receiving \$1,158.29, according to the announcement from Bullock's office in Austin. The net payment to Spearman is an increase of \$575.30 over last year. There was no change in the Gruver payment from last year.

Bullock said his office has remitted \$105.7 million in city sales taxes this year as of April 15, an increase of 21 percent over the same period in 1976. However, he explained, part of the increase is due to a change made by his office effective this month. The Comptroller's office has historically retained 4.76 percent of the cities sales tax collections to cover re-

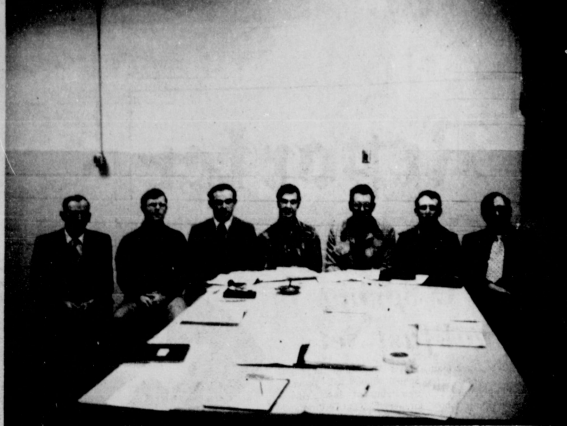
This is the first year that Spearman has hosted the district meet. There will be detailed results in the Sunday paper.

It was noted that there would be a \$3,000 Homestead Exemption for people over 65 years of age.

Approval was granted the school children for a trip to the Discovery Center in Amarillo and the Museum in Canyon.

Following the motion, approved, to pay the current bills, the Board was adjourned at 1:00 A.M.

Animal Control Clinic Set

The City of Spearman, prior to the enforcement of the city animal control ordinance, will be conducting an animal control clinic April 29-30 at the city fire station for giving anti-rabies and distemper shots and issuing tags.

Drs. Tom Latta and Glenn

Blodgett will be on duty for the clinic.

Clinic hours April 29 will be from 5 to 7 p.m.
Hours April 30 will be from 1 to 5 p.m.

An anti-rabies shot will cost \$4 and distemper will cost \$4. Tags will be issued

at \$2 per animal for all male dogs or altered female dogs and cats and \$5 for all female dogs or cats.

The city animal control ordinance will be enforced after the clinic and owners of animals with no tag or shot record will be issued a citation, it was announced.

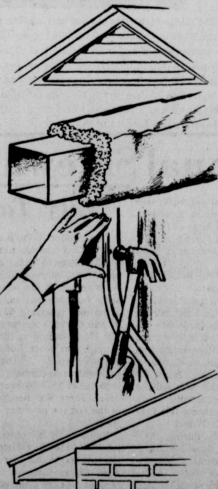

Corn Growers

Educational meetings for corn growers in an 18-county area of the North and South Plains of Texas have been slated in Dimmitt, Plainview and Dumas. Purpose of the meetings is to discuss pros and cons of a petition to the Texas Commissioner of Agriculture allowing for a referendum on assessing corn growers to finance research, educational and promotional programs.

The first educational meeting is in Dimmitt April 12 at 7:30 p.m. in the Courthouse assembly room in the basement area for growers in Castro, Farmer, Lamb, Bailey and Deaf Smith counties.

Another area-wide meeting is slated for Plainview, April 19 at 9:30 a.m. at the Hale County Agriculture Center for growers in Hale, Swisher, Floyd and Briscoe counties.

A third and final educational meeting will be in Dumas, April 26. A place and time have yet to be announced. This program is for corn growers in the North Plains counties.

In March, according to Billy C. Gunter, district agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Corn Growers Association petitioned the Texas Commissioner of Agriculture for certification to conduct a referendum on the proposition of whether or not corn producers in the designated 18-county area shall levy the assessment to finance "programs of research, disease and insect control, education and promotion, designed to encourage the production, marketing and use of corn."

The level of proposed assessment to be voted on would allow producer board members to annually set an assessment rate not to exceed one-half cent per bushel, which does not exceed the level allowed by the Statutes.

The collection of the assessment is proposed to be made at the point of first point sale or handling. The individual grain elevator firms will be consulted about the assessment and method of collection.

The area in which certification is requested is an 18-county area of the North and South Plains, consisting of Bailey, Briscoe, Castro,

Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hale, Lamb, Farmer, Randall, Swisher, Dallas, Hansford, Hartley, Moore, Ochiltree, Sherman, Carson, and Hutchinson counties. In 1975 the area described produced 725,000 acres of corn. In 1976, according to the High Plains Irrigation Survey, this area produced well over a million acres. The area described represents over 75 percent of the corn grown in the state.

Faith Lutheran Church, located on the corner of 11th and Bernice here in Spearman, will celebrate the retirement of its building debt this Sunday, April 24th. The celebration will begin with a morning worship service at 10:30 a.m. (according to the new time). Pastor Robert Cordes, pastor when Faith was organized, will deliver the sermon. Following the morning service there will be a catered noon meal at the County Barn for members of Faith and their guests. At 2:00 p.m. an afternoon service will be conducted back at the church. Pastors Andersen and Cordes will speak along with members from both Faith and Oslo Lutheran Churches. The young people of Faith under the direction of Mr. Ralph Bynum will sing. The afternoon service will climax with the burning of the financial papers of the debt. Organists for the two worship services will be Mrs. Myrna Biggers and Miss Tammy Bynum.

Following the afternoon service there will be refreshments and desserts served in the Parish Hall. This will provide a time for visiting among old and new friends. We at Faith want to take this chance to especially invite the people of the community and the surrounding area to come and join us for this afternoon social time. The people of this area are an important part of our lives at Faith and have been very helpful through the years. We ask you to come in the afternoon and help us celebrate.

In recognition of the special day at Faith the Oslo Lutheran congregation has canceled its worship service and Sunday School in order to attend the big celebration. From the very beginning and through the years the support and friendship of the Oslo community has been invaluable to the congregation of Faith.

Faith Lutheran Church began meeting as a group of worshipping Lutherans in February, 1964, at the Farm Bureau Building here in Spearman. Somewhat over a year later, in May, 1965, the land at 11th and Bernice was purchased and plans were made for the present building to be built. On June 10, 1965, Faith Lutheran Church was officially organized as an active congregation of The American Lutheran Church and the first Church Council was elected. Pastor Robert Cordes, pastor of Oslo Lutheran Church at the time, served the group as pastor during their formation and was called to serve Faith as well as Oslo in 1965. Pastor Cordes served Faith from 1965 through August, 1966.

Pastor William Hill was called to serve the single parish of Faith in October, 1966. He served until March, 1969. Pastor Swanson from Oslo and Pastor F.H. Schuster from Berger served as interim pastors from 1969 through June 1970, when Pastor Victor C.E. Andersen was called to serve both Faith Lutheran and Oslo Lutheran congregations. Pastor Andersen continues to serve both congregations to the present.

In September, 1975, Faith

and Oslo began to participate in the internship program of The American Lutheran Church. This program provides for a seminary student who is studying for the Lutheran ministry to have a year of experience within a parish. Bruce Loewenhagen

served as intern from September, 1975, to August, 1976. In September, 1976, Harvey Faltisek, began his year of internship at Faith and Oslo. He is currently the intern and will be completing his year in August of this year.

It was not until November, 1972, that the congregation of Faith began having a special Thanksgiving Offering which was set aside for the Debt Retirement on the building. At that time about the entire sum originally borrowed in order to build

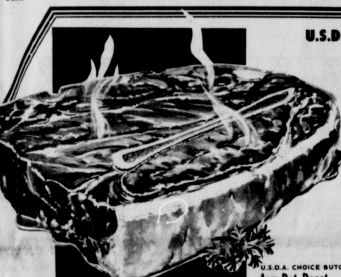

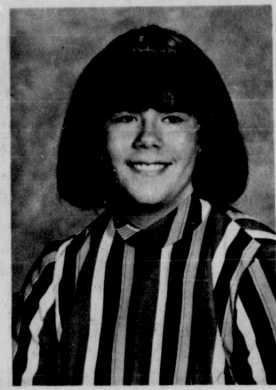

Ten tons of manure is a good substitute for 250 pounds per acre of anhydrous ammonia fertilizer on Pullman clay loam-if the price is right.

So say Drs. A.C. Mathers and A. Stewart, US DA Soil Scientists at the Agricultural Research Center at Bushland. In a 3-year study, sorghum produced 7000 pounds per acre where feedlot manure was incorporated 8 inches into soil with a moldboard plow. This compared to 6500 pounds per acre where anhydrous ammonia was chiselled into the soil. The researchers attributed the extra yield to increased water infiltration and during irrigation. Runoff water quality was not affected by either anhydrous ammonia or manure application. "If 10 tons of manure does not cost more than 250 pounds of anhydrous ammonia, it is the best way to fertilize irrigated soils in the Southern High Plains," the scientists said.

The two Agricultural Research Service researchers started their experiment in 1972 and continued through 1974. They applied anhydrous ammonia annually at 250 pounds per acre. This was compared to no fertilizer, annual manure application of 10 or 30 tons per acre, and a single application of manure at 30 ton per acre in 1972. Manure was applied each February and incorporated with an 8-inch moldboard plowing. In addition to preplant irrigation, three or four summer irrigations were applied to sorghum growing in the nearby field.

Manure obtained from a nearby feedlot each year contained from 1.1 to 2.2 percent nitrogen, up to 0.56 percent phosphorus, and about 10 percent manure. Irrigation water applied, time required for irrigation water to advance 500 feet, and runoff were measured. Water infiltration was calculated as the difference between application and runoff.

Runoff water from either rain or irrigation was analyzed for nitrate-nitrogen, phosphorus, and chloride ions to check water quality. The researchers found that 30 tons of manure slowed water advance about 10 percent.

Their calculations showed that all three manure rates increased water intake about 0.5 inch of each irrigation. This extra soil moisture increased sorghum yield while 10 tons of manure were applied annually or where 30 tons were applied the first year. "Yield averaged 6500 pounds per acre where anhydrous ammonia was applied, and a little over 7000 pounds per acre with the two manure treatments," Mathers said.

He also pointed out that yield was poor the third year where 30 tons of manure were applied annually. The high rate of manure increased salt content of surface soil and reduced sorghum germination and growth.

"When we checked quality of runoff water we were very pleased," the scientists said. In the 11 runoff events, water that ran from the field had nitrate, chloride, and phosphorus content similar to irrigation water applied.

If rain had come a few days later, water and the two salts would have infiltrated into dry soil. "Although nitrate and nitrate concentration was increased, it was not of practical significance," the scientists pointed out. Nitrate content was less than 30 parts per million, well below the 45 parts per million safety standard for drinking water. Farmers will not be affected because total nitrogen washed from the field was only 0.9 pounds per acre. Where 10 tons per acre of manure were applied, nitrate concentration was only 2.5 parts per million. Phosphorus content of water was not affected.

"In our experiment, runoff water quality was not reduced by fertilizer or manure application," Mathers said. "Our research showed a practical safe way to utilize from irrigation in addition to supplying plant nutrients. Farmers with clay loam and in the Southern High Plains can afford to pay the same price for 10 tons of manure as 250 pounds of anhydrous ammonia," they concluded.

Planting perennial grasses and alfalfa may be the only way to keep some erosion-prone Texas High Plains soils in Texas, says an Amarillo agronomist. In February and March, some farmers suffered heavy dollar losses when 60-sorghum mile an hour wind literally blew the sandier-textured soils into adjacent states eastward.

Not all farmlands were affected, says Dr. Frank Petr of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Primarily affected by the winds were those fields having heavy texture and topography and which did not have enough plant growth or crop residue to deter the eroding action of strong winds.

Petr believes perennial crops offer continuous protection from both wind and water erosion, plus a good source of income through livestock production. The Extension agronomist acknowledges that starting erosion-prone dryland areas to perennial grass is difficult, but that it sometimes is the best means available to remedy the problem. The reason for the difficulty is the limited number of grass and legume species capable of producing and producing economically adequate amounts of forage under dryland conditions.

"We've grasses grow very especially well for dryland or deep sandy soils," HE SAYS. "Switchgrass, lanagrass and bermudagrass do well also on the finer textured soils under dryland as well as irrigation. Bermudagrass is best in the best situations or low areas where surface moisture is available."

The agronomist says these warm season grasses should be planted in the spring when danger of hard frost is over. These warm season grasses do not become well established and are often killed by winter weather. He also advises having a firm, well prepared seed bed established in good stand and get ahead of weed competition.

"On sandy soils or where wind erosion is a hazard the grass can be planted directly into standing stubble which has been grazed to remove excess loose material," he explains. "A grass seeder is desirable to plant the correct amount of seed. Deep banding of the seed and the prepared seedbed before planting helps to regulate planting depth and using a roller packer again after planting establishes a firm seed bed of the seed and soil which hastens germination."

Petr says cool season grasses are more useful and productive than warm season grasses because they start growth early in the spring and continue to be productive until November.

Cool season grasses such as broom grass, orchard grass, fescue and the wheat-grasses establish best when planted in late August or September, he adds. Excessive weed competition and high temperatures are encountered when these grasses are planted in the spring.

"Fall planting is also best for establishing alfalfa," he recommends. "If it's necessary to plant alfalfa in the spring, a preplant incorporated herbicide such as Bal-an (benefin or benfluron) works well to control most annual broadleaf and grassy weeds. It's important to inoculate the alfalfa seed prior to planting. Alfalfa also requires about 100 pounds of phosphorus (P205/annually)."

Meeting Set For Beef Producers

A countywide meeting about the proposed Beef Research and Information Act has been called for 1:00 p.m. April 25, 1977 in the Spearman County Show Barn in Spearman by Mike Garnett, chairman of the Hansford County Beef Development Task Force.

Details about the upcoming beef referendum will be explained, the chairman has announced.

The educational program, which is designed for all beef dairy cattle owners of the county, will include two 1 1/2 hour presentations about the Beef Research and Information Act—one prepared by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service and the second by the Beef Development Task Force. There will be a period for questions and comments from producers.

Additionally, the BDT chairman, County Extension Agent Jim Kuykendall, and Extension Area Economist-Management specialist Dr. Ronon W. Sammons, will provide more detailed information about the forthcoming beef referendum.

The Beef Research and Information Act serves as enabling legislation and authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to conduct a referendum among beef producers to determine whether they want a beef development plan, developed by an industry-wide committee.

"The beef development plan is a proposed national checkoff program that would be financed by assessment as spelled out in the beef marketing order. If approved, the plan would provide some \$30 to \$40 million per year for beef research, consumer and producer information, promotion and market development," explains Garnett.

Expenditures, he added, would be directed by a 68-member board of cattlemen and representatives of live stock organizations.

To be eligible to participate in the beef referendum, beef and dairy cattle owners need to make two trips to their county Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation offices: The first trip to register, and the second to vote.

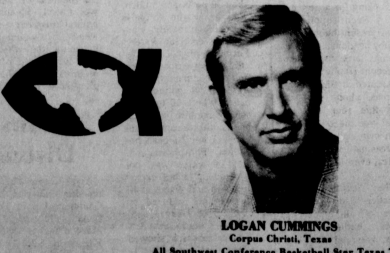
