Technology To Improve Pollination

Modern technology has Modern technology has
yet to improve on Nature's
way of cross pollination. way of cross polination.
Growers of squash, cucum-
ber, cantaloupe, watermelon ber, cantaloupe, watermelon
and pumpkin especially know and pumpkin especially know
this, but some still fail to
make sure make sure Mother Nature
has plenty of honeybes has plenty of honeybees
around. A Aome around. A home gardener
can do the cross pollination
by hand can do the cross pollination
by hand, but commercial
growers depend growers depend on availabil-
ity of bees. ity of bees.
Wild and Wiid and domestic honey-
bees are the vital link in the poellination process. When growers and gardeners leave
pollination to chance they a pollination to chance they are
very often disappointed very often disappointed
when fruit fails to form on their plants. There are several reasons
for failure of fruit to form for failure of fruit to form.
Members of the vine crop Mambers of the vine crop
family have male and ferale blossoms which develop, se-
parately on the plant. Pollen parately on the plant. Pollen
must be physically transfermust be physically transfer-
red from the male blossom to the female blossom so that pollination and fruit enlargement can occur. For
instance, when bees do not find squash plants and are unable to pollinate the blose-
soms, the plants will produce soms, the plants will produce
many tiny squash, but these many tiny squash, but these
will not grow into large fruit. The home gardener can
hasily easily conduect the pollination
process by transferring the process by transferring the
pollen from open male blos-
soms to the female blossoms.
Blossoms of these plants are ope for only one day, and it is best to conduct pollination in
the morning when the new the morning when the new
blossom opens. Wilted blossomsom or opens. Wilted blos-
some with closed
petals will not be petals will not be affected in
pollination. polilination.
