



Denise Schmandt-Besserat's theory that writing Denise Schmandt-Besserat's theory that writing had its origin in 8500 B.C. in the Middle East (rather than in 3500 B.C.) is based on her study of the early uses of clay. By 8500 B.C. anall clay tokens in a variety of shapes were used as an accounting system for transactions. Later, shapes of the tokens were incised on hollow clay envelopes (builae) which served as bills of lading and in which tokens were sealed. The builae-token system was which tokens were sealed. 
