

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
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

THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE PRESS is to print the news. To learn to do this in a fair and accurate manner, many of us who are associated with the Toreador have gone to school here for two, three, four years. We think we have learned our lessons fairly well.

So, when someone accuses us of being part of a political machine, we naturally get slightly upset, and we have been accused.

Since Thursday, there have been some who are quite convinced that this paper is part of a political plot.

On Thursday, we carried a story on the emergence of a write-in candidate for vice president. The story was straight, factual reporting of an event of interest to the student body and the campus in general. But some didn't see it as such.

The editor was visited by a fraternity delegation backing the regushed some light on these rather lar vice presidential candidate. They were very unhappy, to say the least. Then, later in the day, the Toreador staff became acquainted First, there seems to have been with a 1.5 G.P.A. hold-over pledge.

He called us twice during the day and said the same thing both times. He called the editor first to protest our alleged political affiliation with a "move to break up the Johnny Walker forces." (We just wonder how a vice presidential race can affect the business manager race.) Though it was obvious that Walker did command quite a 'force'' (his advertising work was done by a professional agency as a favor to him), most of us hadn't really thought about it. Then the pledge called again.

Late Thursday afternoon, he apparently heard that the write-in candidate might withdraw, so he called to ask about it. We refused to divulge the information because the "candidate" requested we not release the information 'til Friday. We informed the pledge that everyone would find out at the same time Friday morning, upholding our ethical promise. He then went on a tirade

He claimed that there was a political machine on campus and the legality of the placing of election Toreador was either part of it or being subverted by it. He also claimed that the publicity given the recent mock trial was a political campaign maneuver by the "anti-Walker forces." > To him, let us say this. We doubt if any candidate could be stupid enough to engage in so flagrant a violation of the rules. But we are not so sure the same can be said for his supporters, for whom, it must be admitted, a candidate is responsible.

It calls to our mind the presidential campaign of 1964, when some people were afraid to vote for Barry Goldwater because they feared his supporters (i.e. KKK, Birch Society, etc.). As it turned out, Goldwater, too, suffered because of his supporters.

While it's the material was placed under the not so bad for cheerleader candidates to raise such a ruckus (after all, they are supposed to be good at that), there should be a limit. One person wanted to land a helicopter in Memorial Circle and another wanted to place an outhouse there, and the amazing thing about the former is that candidate actually got school approval for the stunt, but couldn't get permission from the Civil Aeronautics Board

Which brings us to the financial limits placed on campaigns by the Student Senate. While they may seem ridiculous (\$50 for executive candidates, for example) in light of the obvious expensive campaigns, we still think they are a good thing. Judging from the above examples, there is no telling what someone might try if there was no limit on

But there is a definite need for change. If there are going to be rules, there should be some method of enforcement. The only one which exists at present is the check provided by zealous opposition. Sara Cox, chairman of the Elections Committee, thinks we should have an investigative body of some sort and tighten the rules governing the reporting of finances and campaign actions. 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



bill recommended by the Johnson viewpoint. administration, automotive spokesman John S. Bugas urged it be improved "so that it provides effective and forceful governmental machinery for setting vehicle safety standards without delay.

Bugas, vice president of Ford Motor Co., was flanked by executives of the three other auto manufacturers as he outlined the revised industry position to the House Commerce Committee in a jammed hearing room.

"Even where the principal U.S. manufacturers cooperate to formulate and observe a satisfactory voluntary standard for a major safety characteristic of appropriate concern to the secretary of commerce, we believe the secretary should establish this voluntary standard as a legally binding federal standard," Bugas said.


Karate Team Places Second In Tourney

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
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Reds Blast Whites 42-16 In Football Battle
