

President Gives Challenging Speech

Big Crowd Attends Tech Convocation

Before an estimated crowd of 3400 attentive students at the All-College 'Convocation' Wednesday, Dr. E. N. Jones presented a challenge; "Are you going to be the victim of the Atomic and Space Age or a comfortable participant, or a master?"

"There is no room for those who will not make good use of their college education," he stressed.

"We are in the midst of a technological revolution equal in importance to the Industrial Revolution of 1750-1850, Dr. Jones explained. Industries are in competitive races to conquer the frontiers of space. There will be no letdown in man's search for further knowledge, and new inventions will be our salvation or destruction.

STUDENTS AT TECH have the privilege and responsibility to develop their potentialities 100% for the advancement of this new age. We must work diligently at this task, he concluded.

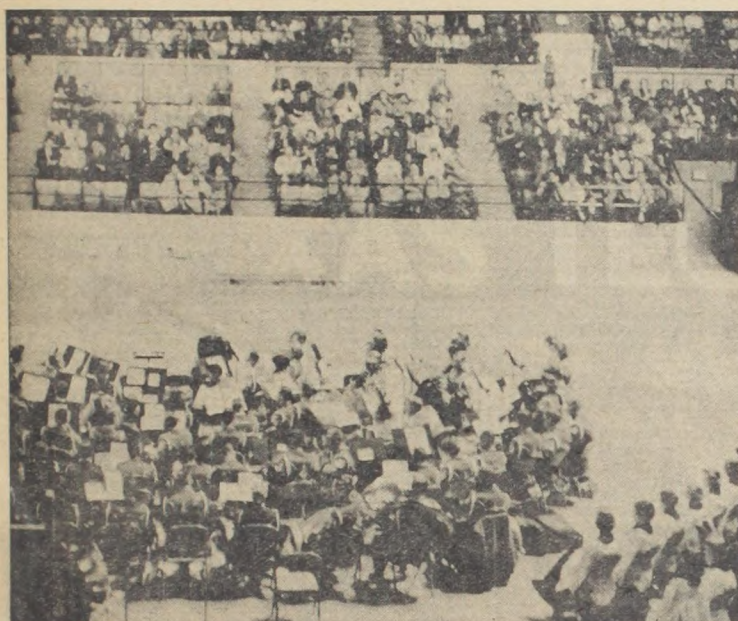
Opening the assembly was the Tech Band, playing "Chorale Prelude in E Minor." Dr. A. W. Young, sponsor of the Student Religious Council, gave the invocation, and "The Kingdom of God" and "Praise to the Lord" were sung by the Tech Choir.

DEAN James G. Allen introduced the president, citing this as his eleventh year with Tech, and his seventh as president.

"O College Mother Beautiful," with words by the first Tech president Dr. Paul Horn, and "The Matador Song" were sung by the student body.

DONNELL ECHOLS, president of student associations, spoke briefly on "What is a College Education." He then introduced the officers of the student council and representatives from the schools of Agriculture, Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Engineering, and Home Economics.

In separate class meeting class officers were nominated. The Tech Union served free coffee and cokes following the convocation.

Tech Day Tomorrow At Fair

Texas Tech students will get a chance to contribute their share tomorrow night to an expected total attendance record of 200,000 for the Panhandle South Plains Fair.

THIS NIGHT has been designated as Tech night with all Tech students admitted free on presentation of I.D. cards. School nights honoring other area schools have helped boost attendance to a point 5,112 above the mark set at the same time last year.

Fair attendance through Tuesday night totaled 76,285, compared with 71,173 for the first two days last year.

Top attraction at the fair thus far has been the Water Follies, drawing a crowd of 2,107 Monday night and 1,991 Tuesday night. Tech students will get their chance to view this act tomorrow at 8 p.m. Saturday's performance will be a matinee at 3:30 p.m.

TRIP DEADLINE FRIDAY

Lacks 175 Tickets

An estimated 200 to 225 tickets have been sold to date for the annual out-of-town trip to Fort Worth for the Texas Tech-TCU tilt Oct. 11.

DAVID STEINMAN, Student Council vice president, pointed out that the deadline, which is Friday afternoon, must be met before final arrangements can be made.

Ticket sales are going along at a normal pace, but may need that extra boost, Steinman added.

He said some tickets may possibly be available at a later date, but a minimum of 375 tickets must be sold by the Friday deadline.

Dan Howard, Council business manager, said ticket sales were turned in at a meeting yesterday and that some are still out.

TICKETS, priced \$14.25, may be purchased at a booth in the Tech Union from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. until Friday afternoon. All Council members and girls' dorm vice presidents also have tickets.

Students planning to make the trip must make arrangements with

their instructors concerning absences since the Dean's Council approved the trip, but did not approve excusing absences, Dr. G. E. Giesecke, academic vice president said.

THE RED RAIDER band will go on the train and there may be a combo for dancing, D. O. (Prof) Wiley, Tech band director announced.

The 12-car train will include a baggage car and a concession car sponsored by Kappa Kappa Psi music fraternity.

The train is scheduled to leave Lubbock at 10 p.m. Oct. 11 and arrive in Fort Worth at 6:30 a.m. Oct. 12.

A pep rally will be staged before continuing to Dallas where students will have the day to spend at their discretion.

A Broadway musical, the annual Texas-Oklahoma football game, and the State Fair will be among the amusements in Dallas.

At 6 p.m., the train will leave Dallas and arrive in Fort Worth about 7 p.m.

A call was received yesterday from a TCU representative that TCU students will meet Tech at the train and transport them in busses to the game. After the game the same busses will take Tech students to an after-the-game dance and then return them to the train, which will leave Fort Worth at 1 a.m. Oct. 13, for Lubbock.

Drama Department Presents 'Antigone'

RONALD SCHULZ, director, stated that two performances will be given at the internationally famous Margo Jones Theater which will be known as the Higher Education Center at the fair.

Tech is one of 17 Texas colleges asked to present plays during the fair. All plays will be given from the arena-type stage, with the audience seated on four sides of the stage.

Schulz, is commenting on the production, stated that the stage will present special problems to the cast, most of whom have never acted on that type of stage.

"Antigone" was first presented in France during the German occupation in World War I. It was later brought to the United States with Katherine Cornell and Sir Cedric Hardwick playing leading roles.

Texas Epsilon Chapter of Phi Delta Theta captured two first places and two second places out of four awards presented at the National Convention, Asheville, N. C., last month.

The Tech Phis won the Headquarters Trophy and the Spiritual Life Trophy, while placing second for the Harvard Trophy and the Community Service Day Trophy.

THE HEADQUARTERS TROPHY is awarded to the chapter that is most the prompt and efficient in answering all official fraternity correspondence, and is a reward for general excellence in the field of chapter-General Headquarters relations.

The Spiritual Life Trophy is given to the chapter showing a sincere and dedicated approach to the spiritual side of campus life. Before the close of the second semester each competing chapter submits to General Headquarters an essay report, the details of which must be certified by the chapter adviser, probosc president, deans of religious life, and local pastors. A panel of judges then studies the reports and the winner is chosen on the basis of variety and originality of spiritual activity.

The Harvard award, created in 1924, and donated by the Phi Delta Theta Alumni Club of Harvard University, is a large silver loving cup to be held by the chapter of the fraternity which shows and all-around excellence as designated by a point system.

Buy Tickets Now For Train Trip

ONE OF THE biggest events of the year is awaiting Tech students in the very near future, and it will be the greatest of its kind ever offered Techsians.

Plans for the annual Out-of-Town trip have been carefully planned by the Student Council, and now the members are selling tickets as rapidly as they can to insure the success of it.

Many students have been in the Council office asking for details about the trip, and what it has to offer. Here are the details.

First, Tech students will board the train at 10 p.m. Friday, Oct. 10, and leave for the first leg of the journey, to Fort Worth.

On this initial hop, students can enjoy many kinds of recreation including dancing, card games being with their girls or boy friends, and numerous other unique devices that Techsians cook up.

When the train arrives in Fort Worth, there will be a bang-up pep rally to let the Cowpokes know that Texas Tech has arrived. After this short, but boisterous affair, students will climb back aboard the train and head for Dallas.

In Dallas, the biggest event of the year for all of Texas will be unfolding — the gigantic State Fair of Texas.

The activities will include the Broadway hit, "The Music Man," the Texas-Oklahoma football game, an automobile show and hundreds of other colorful happenings.

After a full day at the fair, the train will return to Fort Worth for the Tech-TCU game, which will no doubt be a whale of a contest.

There are several things about the trip which one should keep in mind, one being that there will be approximately an even ratio of girls and boys on the train; and boys, you had better take advantage of this fact, because it only happens once a year.

Tech students, it is up to you now to keep one of Tech's best traditions going. Buy your ticket right away so the first deadline can be met.

The Tech Victory Bells have sounded their melodious tones as many times already in this year's young football season as they did during last year's entire season—twice.

IF THE RAIDERS football team continues at its present pace, the freshmen are in for several busy Saturday nights, ringing the victory bells, which is one of Tech's oldest and most sacred traditions.

That is, some of the freshmen will be busy on Saturday nights. Another tradition, that of independent-minded, non-conforming freshmen working and worrying themselves sick thinking up ways to escape having to ring the bells, began forming soon after the bells were installed in 1936.

OVER THE YEARS these hardy freshmen have developed a wide range of methods used in evading upperclassmen who are intent on seeing freshmen do their duty.

The simplest method used is just locking dorm room doors, but this is very hard on the door when upperclassmen know there's a freshman behind it. Some freshmen climb in their cars and drive until the 30-minute ringing period is past.

"I'LL GO TELL them to come back," the freshman answered, and sped out the gate, across the campus, into his dorm room, and locked the door.

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Tape Recorders Aid Language Students

A new media of studying has been opened to foreign language students for the first time at Tech this semester.

Twenty individual tape machines have been installed in the basement of the Administration Building. Nine of the tape machines also have tape recorders for recording.

THE TAPES are used mainly in connection with correcting pronunciation. When used in connection with the recorders, it is possible for the student to listen, repeat the words and play back what he has recorded to check his own pronunciation.

Asst. Prof. Harley D. Oberhelman, who came to Tech this year from the University of Kansas, is in charge of the laboratory. Robert H. Lee is his assistant and helps the students with operation of the tape machines.

Tapes which the department has now are only for beginning French, German and Spanish students. They may be used by advanced students for review.

THE LAB is optional but all foreign language students are urged to attend.

In a few weeks tapes should be available for advanced courses. It is planned that each professor will make his own tapes for the use of advanced students. An extensive library, covering all courses, is also planned.

THE ADDITION of tape recorders for all 20 booths is planned as soon as funds are available.

The machines were installed this summer by a Washington D. C. firm specializing in the manufacture of tape recorders for educational institutions.

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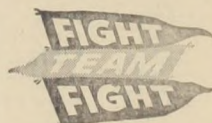

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Braves Stun Yanks 4-3 Behind Warren Spahn

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Billy Bruton stroked a line drive single to right against fireballing Ryne Duren to give Milwaukee's Warren Spahn a 4-3 victory over the New York Yankees Wednesday in a tense 10-inning opening World Series game.

Benched at the start because left-handed Whitey Ford was pitching for the Yanks, Bruton came in as a pinch hitter in the ninth but fanned.

GIVEN ANOTHER chance after singles by Joe Adcock and Del Crandall in the 10th he came through beautifully with a drive that probably would have been good for two bases if more were needed.

A year ago Bruton was in the hospital undergoing a knee operation while his Milwaukee mates were upsetting the proud Yankees in seven games. He didn't get back into action until midseason and even now still has trouble with his knee.

SPAHN GOT better as he went along, justifying Manager Fred Haney's move in starting him over Lew Burdette, the three-time winner of last year.

In one stretch from the sixth until the 10th, Spahn retired 14 straight Yankees. Ford, who had the edge in the early going, stumbled in the eighth when he tired and gave way to Ryne Duren.

DUREN WAS the hard-throwing speedster of early season when he first replaced Ford in the eighth. But the Braves kept after him and finally got to him in the 10th.

Hank Aaron, perhaps the Brave most feared by the Yankee staff, struck out, opening the 10th. Joe Adcock ripped a single to center and the fat was on the fire.

IT WAS an appropriate ending for the roaring crowd of 46,367 who watched this opening game on a chill, sunny afternoon. They were slow to warm up to the excitement of the game but loosened a throaty roar when Bruton came through.

Spahn, beaten by Ford in last year's opener at Yankee Stadium lived up to his season .333 batting average as well as his 22-11 pitching record.

WHEN FORD suddenly ran into trouble in the fourth on a first-ball hitting flurry by the Braves, it was Spahn who stroked the single to center that scored Crandall with the tie-breaking run.

Again in the ninth Spahn tried to start his own rally with a single to right. He got as far as

second when Duren walked Red Schoendienst but both were left when pinch hitter Franke Torre and Eddie Mathews failed.

IN TODAY'S second game, Burdette, the Yankee killer of '57 will try to make it two in a row for the Braves. The 20-game winner who has been brilliant since the all-star break, will be opposed by another right hander, Bob Turley. Turley was the Yanks big winner with a 21-7 season.

Tech Eleven Hopes To Stop Longhorns

Coach Joe Kerbel said Wednesday, "I think that our game with Texas will be the Raider type of game that will make us proud of all the boys. We're not going down there to lose."

The staff, as well as the team, felt good about the West Texas win, but they realize that there is still a lot of room for improvement.

For the third week in a row, the varsity has looked less than

good, but the latest poor showing has the coaches worried.

Coach Weaver and Coach Kerbel both agree that the Longhorns will not look past Tech to Oklahoma.

THE TEXAS GAME will be our hardest test so far," Kerbel remarked, "but we do not look upon it as the supreme test. We have seven other games on our schedule."

The cold weather has bothered the Raiders, but has not slowed down the practice sessions. The team ran through a hard drill Wednesday. Work starts to taper off today.

Barring injuries, the line-up against Texas will remain the same. So far, the Raiders have had no major casualties and expect to field a sound team Saturday night.

STATISTICS after two games show halfbacks Floyd Dellinger and Ronnie Rice leading the Raiders. Dellinger leads in rushing with 85 yards and in total offense with 109. Rice, the leading ground gainer against West Texas, now has 61 yards on the ground and 39 through the air. Both boys have perfect passing records with Dellinger connecting on four attempts and Rice on three.

TECH is averaging 173 yards rushing and 48.5 yards passing, compared with 116 yards rushing and 122 yards passing for opponents.

The Raiders have scored wins against Texas A&M and West Texas State.

YOU KNOW the best thing that could happen to the Raiders Saturday night would be for halfback Floyd Dellinger to fumble the kickoff.

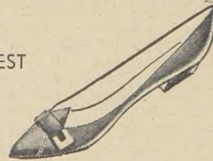

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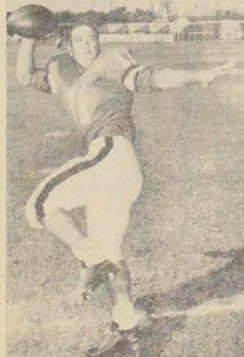
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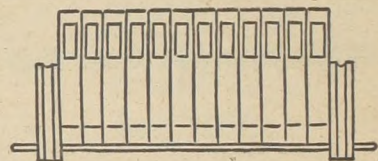
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
