Bobby Brown Will Discuss Chilean Life And Politics

"How does it feel to be the only capitalist in a room full of communist university students?"

This and other similar questions will be answered by Bobby Brown, Lubbock's Community Ambassador to Chile, when he presents "Chile con Brown" tonight at 7 p. m. in the Tech Union Workroom.

Brown, senior government major from Lubbock, will share his experiences of eight weeks in Santiago, Chile, in an informal program featuring a short introduc-

tory talk, slides and a question-answer session.

THE PROGRAM is sponsored by the international Interest Committee of the Tech Union.

While in Chile, Brown lived with the Samuel Goldstein family. "The family was not too different in their way of life from the typical American family," Brown said.

Goldstein works as a contractor and his wife is in charge of scholarships for the University of Chile. They have two children—a boy, Hernan, and a girl, Irene.

BROWN, who will show slides on his travels, said of the country, "Chile itself is very beautiful, as

one can always see the snow-covered Andes mountains in the distance. It has an even climate, summer and winter."

According to Brown, Chile has many things in common with America besides family life. Their basic democratic organization and democratic spirit are very much like that of this country. Brown commented, "Chile is very friendly to the United States as a whole."

ONLY IN the smaller ways do the differences in cultures stand out. For example, drug stores in Chile are usually outlets for medicine and do not have soda fountains and do not sell the numerous articles that U. S. drug stores sell.

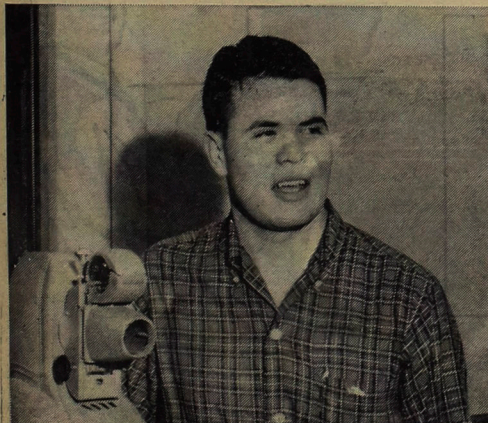
The political parties of the countries are somewhat different. Chile has six main parties, presently split up into two coalitions. Three right-wing parties, all favorable to this country, are presently in power.

The one thing that impressed Brown the most about Chile was the friendliness of the people and the way he was well received by the people.

BROWN WAS AMONG the ten Community Ambassadors from the U.S. to visit Chile. The ambassadors traveled together but lived with different families.

Besides the eight weeks he spent in Chili, Brown visited Lima, Peru, and LaPaz, Bolivia, each for a week.

The Lubbock Community Ambassador program, sponsored by Lubbock Civic clubs, is in conjunction with an international program which works on an exchange basis. This allows ambassadors from other countries to visit America in an experiment in international living.

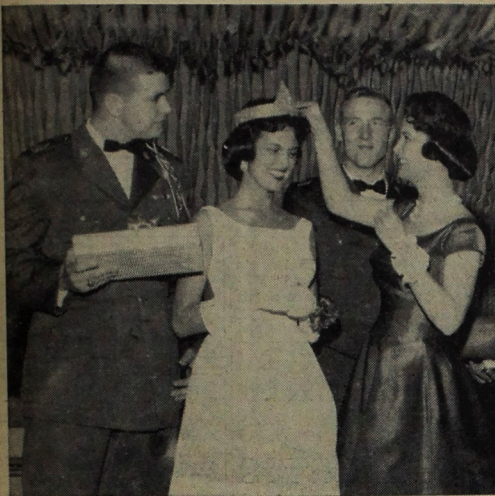

STARTING IN left field will be Cagle Davis. In the center field position will be Bob Flanigan.

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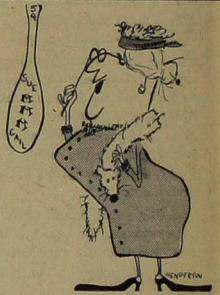
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Army Opens Drills With 80 Candidates
