 Editarial PageTake Down The Barrier, Boys

A shining example of an architectural blunder can now be seen located in the center of the entrance to
the small parking lot in front of the Journalism Building. It is a metal barrier erected to "discourage" parking in this lot.
This seemingly insignificant little structure has caused confusion comparable to that in Macy's Department Store on "bargain day."

Two immdiate problems have resulted. One is that since enough space has been left on each side of the barrier to allow ears to pass through, the lot has become so crowded that the entrances often are blocked and people wanting to leave are unable to do so

The other problem is that the structure has become a dangerous obstacle to drivers unfamiliar with its presence. An example of this peril can be seen in the picture on the front page of this issue. It was taken after an unsuspecting driver rounded the corner on his way to the Journalism Building and jumped the metal structure. A wrecker was needed to move the car.

If ears are going to be allowed to park in this area then some qualifications should be made and the barrier should be removed. As it is now, it serves no purpose and is causing more harm than good. Also, de signation should be made limiting the number that
The seemingly logical thing to do would be to open the lot exclusively to Journalism and Library personnel and give parking tickets to violators. No-parking signs have been distributed in the area but at present haven't been enforced

It is only a matter of time before the lot will be torn up and grass planted. Until then it seems feasible that the barrier should be removed and those personnel mentioned should be allowed to park in-the lot exculsively, thereby eliminating the present hodgepodge.
