Astronauts riding high

SPACE CENTER, HOUSTON — Three excited Apollo 7 astronauts flashed into space Friday, whipped through critical maneuvers and set up housekeeping in the first test of whether America's newest, biggest spaceship has the stamina to carry men to the moon.

"We're having a ball," reported veteran Command Pilot Walter M. Schirra Jr. as he guided Apollo through the first of its 11-day voyage 163 times around the earth.

He took time out for a hot cup of coffee and grabbed a quick lunch with his two co-pilots, Air Force Maj. Donn F. Elsey and Walter Cunningham, each making his first space trip.

"It's a fantastic world up here," one of them exclaimed.

At about 6:30 p.m., Mission Control asked, "Does the spacecraft look good for 18 revs?"

Schirra answered loud and clear, "Eighteen revolutions a day."

With that, Mission Control gave them the go-ahead for another full day and they doffed their heavy space suits and bubble helmets and donned their light coveralls, breathing the oxygen in the cabin.

LBJ may recall Senate

WASHINGTON — President Johnson said Friday he may call the Senate back into special session to ratify the nuclear nonproliferation treaty rather than wait until the new session in January, as Senate leaders plan.

The President said delays could force the United States into a dire dilemma if new nuclear powers come into being before the Senate acts.

Johnson taped for radio and television use his new appeal shortly before Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., told the Senate the pact to halt the spread of nuclear weapons would not be brought up in the session now ending.

Mansfield said arrangements have been made for making the treaty the first order of business of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in the new session in January.

As for Johnson's consideration of a special session before then, Mansfield told newsmen, "We will cross that bridge when we come to it."

Olympics open today

MEXICO CITY — Mexico City, calm but under heavy guard, and gaily bedecked, stood ready Friday to give an enthusiastic welcome to the opening of the Olympic Games Saturday-first ever held in a Latin-American nation.

The riots and disturbances have subsided. The government has made it plain it will put up with no disorders. The 7,500 athletes from 124 nations-an Olympic record-are ready to go.

The first defection of the Games has occurred. Juan Antonio Diaz Campos, a Cuban tennis player due to appear in an exhibition here, asked for asylum, the interior ministry announced. It was granted. More defections may come.

Transplant patients ill

HOUSTON, Tex. — Louis J. Fierro, 54, used car salesman from Elmost, N.Y., who received a heart transplant on May 21 at St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital was readmitted Friday for observation and drug adjustment, doctors said.

A fast pulse, coupled with nausea and vomiting, was the indication for hospitalization, a St. Luke's spokesman said.

Everett C. Thomas, accountant from Phoenix, Ariz., who received a new heart on May 3 also has had such symptoms, the hospital said, and he was readmitted to the institution on Oct. 9.

The responses of both men, a spokesman said, are comparable to the episode suffered by Dr. Phillip Blalberg during July when he was readmitted to the hospital in Cape Town, South Africa.

Nine Cubans jailed

MIAMI, Fla. — Nine Cuban exiles were jailed here Friday on federal charges of plotting terror attacks on ships and planes of Spain, Mexico and Great Britain as part of a nationwide anti-Castro vendetta by the group calling itself Cuban Power.

The man indicted as the leader, Dr. Orlando Bosch, seemed triumphant after his arrest by FBI agents. While being taken to jail under \$50,000 bond, Bosch raised his handcuffed arms and made "V" with fingers of each hand as he shouted: "Victory for Cuban liberation."

Bosch and two of the nine were charged in the Sept. 16 cannonading of a Polish freighter in Miami. The attack became an international incident.

American trap fails

SAIGON — In a battle that swept through rice paddies and thick hedgerows, U.S. troops tried to trap 300 enemy troops on the northwest invasion corridor to Saigon Friday but most escaped.

The Americans, however, captured another big weapons cache.

The battle broke out Thursday when 400 U.S. 25th Division infantrymen came under heavy fire from enemy troops dug in among the hedgerows near Trang Bang, 27 miles northwest of Saigon.

About 600 U.S. reinforcements were flown in and attempted to throw a cordon around the enemy as fighter-bombers, helicopter gunships and artillery hammered the hedgerows.

Fighting flared through the night but when U.S. infantrymen drove forward at dawn they met only small rear guard action.

Raiders looking for win over Aggies

Big Red Team carrying 2-0-1 mark into gridiron battle on Kyle Field, could be SWC king-maker this year

With one circuit victory tucked neatly under their belts, Tech's Red Raiders will be looking for loop win number two as they invade Kyle Field tonight, seeking to dethrone the defending Southwest Conference champion Aggies of Texas A&M.

The Techsans carry an impressive 2-0-1 mark into the contest considered by many to be the SWC king-maker. One of the Raiders' victories came over conference foe University of Texas by a decisive 31-22 margin.

Colorado State University was the other victim of Tech's gridiron machine, falling to Big Red, 43-13, while the University of Cincinnati Bearcats escaped with a 10-10 draw.

TEXAS A&M enters its first SWC encounter with a less impressive 1-2 record following a tough non-confer-

ence schedule. The Aggies opened the season against Louisiana State University and were edged out by the Tigers by a mere point, 13-12.

The Farmers came back strong the next week and crumpled Tulane, 35-3, before taking a 20-14 licking at the hands of Florida State University.

Tonight's contest will be A&M's home-opener and will be Tech's first road game of the season. Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m.

ANXIOUS TO PLAY before a College Station crowd, A&M coach Gene Stallings remarked, "Gosh, I'll be glad to play one at home before some friendly folks and hear the band playing the 'Aggie War Hymn' and hearing our student body yelling for us."

Both teams possess potent offenses and experienced defenses. Tech coach J T King says of the Raiders' opponent,

"Texas A&M is a much better football team than it was a year ago. For one thing, they have more breakaway potential. But mainly, they have a much better defense."

TAILBACK LARRY STEGENT is the leading Aggie workhorse with 304 yards in 46 carries for a 6.1 yard average. Fullback Dave Elmendorf has fewer yards and carries, but a better average, rushing 24 times for 159 yards for a 6.6 yard mean.

Halfback Roger Freeman has been the big man in the Raider attack the first three games. His 187 yards in 42 carries is good for a 4.3 yard average, tops among the Techsans.

Fullback Jackie Stewart (4.2), halfback Jimmy Bennett (3.3), fullback Tony Butler (2.6) and quarterback Joe Matulich (2.1) round out the Raiders' list of leading rushers.

TONIGHT'S GAME will feature a pair of double-threat quarterbacks, both feared for their running as well as their passing talents. The Aggies' Edd Hargett, whose 15-yard touchdown scamper against Tech sealed the Raiders' doom in last year's 28-24 loss to A&M, has completed 26 of 65 aeriels this fall for 406 yards and two touchdowns.

Tech's Matulich has connected on 31 of 61 passing attempts for 351 yards and four TD's. He has had two passes intercepted, while Hargett has had four picked off.

THE AGGIES, as well as the Raiders, boast an abundance of topnotch receivers. Stegent leads the pack with eight catches for 96 yards, while teammate Bob Long has snagged seven passes for 154 steps and two touchdowns.

End Bobby Allen paces Tech's receiving corps with 12 catches for 172 yards and two touchdowns, followed by Freeman — seven for 72 yards and one TD — and David May — seven for 93 yards and one score.

A&M's leader in punt returns is Stegent with six for 53 yards, while Tech's Larry Alford, third in the nation in the department, has run 10 punts back for a total of 219 yards.

The Raiders' punter Kenny Vinyard also owns national recognition with a fourth place ranking based on his 43.4 kicking average.

IN A RIVALRY dating back to 1927, the Aggies have emerged victorious 17 times to the Raiders' eight. The teams have tied once.

In conference play, however, beginning in 1960, A&M holds only a slight edge with a 4-3-1 mark.

Next week, the Aggies meet their second SWC foe as they battle Texas Christian University in College Station. The Red Raiders will travel to Jackson, Miss., to play Mississippi State University.

Bush says Humphrey helping GOP cause

Representative George Bush, speaking at a Republican rally Friday night, said one of the main things Nixon has going for him is Hubert Humphrey.

He said he had never seen the Republican party so firmly united across the country. Bush said 45,000 people had turned out in Houston to hear Nixon, and crowds all through the country are enthusiastic because "Nixon has new answers to old problems."

SPEAKING AT Coronado High School, Bush said the poverty program simply isn't working. Offering a new solution, he said, "Let's give a man a tax credit to train a man to do a job." Handouts are not and will not work he said.

He said, "Hubert Humphrey has the old answers, and the other fellow is pointing his finger on the problem and offering no answers."

The congressman from Houston told the group, "A vote for Wallace is a vote for Hubert Humphrey in the House." If the election is thrown into the House because no candidate receives a majority of the electoral votes, each state will have one vote.

BECAUSE TEXAS has 20 Democratic congressmen and only 3 Republican congressmen, the Texas vote would go to Humphrey, even if he came in third in popular voting, Bush said.

However, Bush said he was convinced by results from several pri-

vate polls that "the American people are not going to want to waste their vote."

Bush, one of ten men selected to act as a stand-in for Nixon, said Nixon's main goal will be "a decentralized thrust to put power on the local level."

Post Office in anti-smut campaign

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dealers who mail pornography or pandering advertisements to American homes have become principal targets of the Post Office Department in a battle to protect the public — and particularly children — from smut.

Aided recently by a new federal anti-pandering law, the department has received 75,000 complaints from individuals since last April. Meanwhile, postal inspectors also have made significant advances in their fight against commercial smut dealers.

CURRENTLY NEARLY 60 dealers are awaiting trial in U. S. courts on charges of mailing obscene materials.

The Post Office says this figure represents the great majority of the dealers responsible for mailing materials deemed obscene by postal inspectors.
