A Heritage Is Left

(An Editorial)

A CADET bugle corps blew taps when the Texas Aggies departed from the ranks of America's undefeated football teams.

Aggies departed from the ranks of America's undefeated football teams.

But when Texas Tech went down 14-19 to New Mexico Saturday, it was reveille for the Red Raiders.

For it was on that shadow-shrouded football field in Albuquerque, hard by snow-capped mountain peaks that Texas Tech college of Lubbook fully awakened.

A heritage as hearty as the Notre Dame victory march was born November 30, 1940 in the unabashed tears and cheers of a throaty Three Hundred. Three times New Mexico State police stuffed those students back into the stands, but as New Mexico scored its third touchdown, they boiled over the bleachers for a fourth and final effort.

In a roar that always rose, never subsided, they pioneéred a precedent that will live long after your names and mine are buried in musty alumni records. Not once has a Red Raider team been so coaxed from the closet of defeat. Never before have they wearily glanced to the soggy-turf sidelines and seen their student body screaming as though they were winning by 19 points.

THAT sight did something to a team that hadn't bee

THAT sight did something to a team that hadn't been able to get going. They were electrified into 15 minutes of the greatest comeback football a team ever made. And when the final gun found them still six points behind, they were swamped by a rush of students, who hoisted them above the field of play, above the 19-14 defeat by New Mexico—to higher heights than Red Raider spirit ever rose before.

In those two hours at Albuquerque Saturday and in Monday night's spine-chilling pep rally at La Fonda dormitory, Texas Tech left a heritage to every student who files past College Avenue at Broadway.

And throughout the years, this school will be recognized from coast to coast as the student body who overflows its grandstand to the very sidelines of a field where defeat seems inevitable. The cry that rang at Albuquerque will be hurled from Double T stadium at home, to the concrete colliseums of Los Angeles and Chicago:

The chances are that in none of these successive steps of secondary education has the student been instructed in, or impressed with, the fundamental purpose of education, which is the acquisition of ability thru the acquisition of knowledge. Ability, in this sense, means more than mechanical, professional or artistic ability—the wherewithal to gain an independent livelyhood. It includes ability to understanding the ability to aid in solution and disposition of the problems.

Students who slide through college courses with passing marks in order to get a degree that symbolizes the possession of knowledge and the facility to apply it miss the boat, for the symbol in itself is a lie and a misrepresentation. They don't know, and never will know, why they are attending college.

These unguided souls are the ones who bring to college the idea that fraud, swindling, is perfectly legitimate in pursuit of the symbol which identifies them as persons of higher education. Yet, they cannot be entirely blamed, since nobody tried to convince them that they swindle only themselves.

Increases and enhances a feeling of self-reliance in the student. It dispenses with the idea that cheating is "a way of getting through life." It creates greater pride in achievement and stimulates the competitive instince. In general, it enables colleges to turn out more worthwhile citizens of greater honesty and responsibility.
