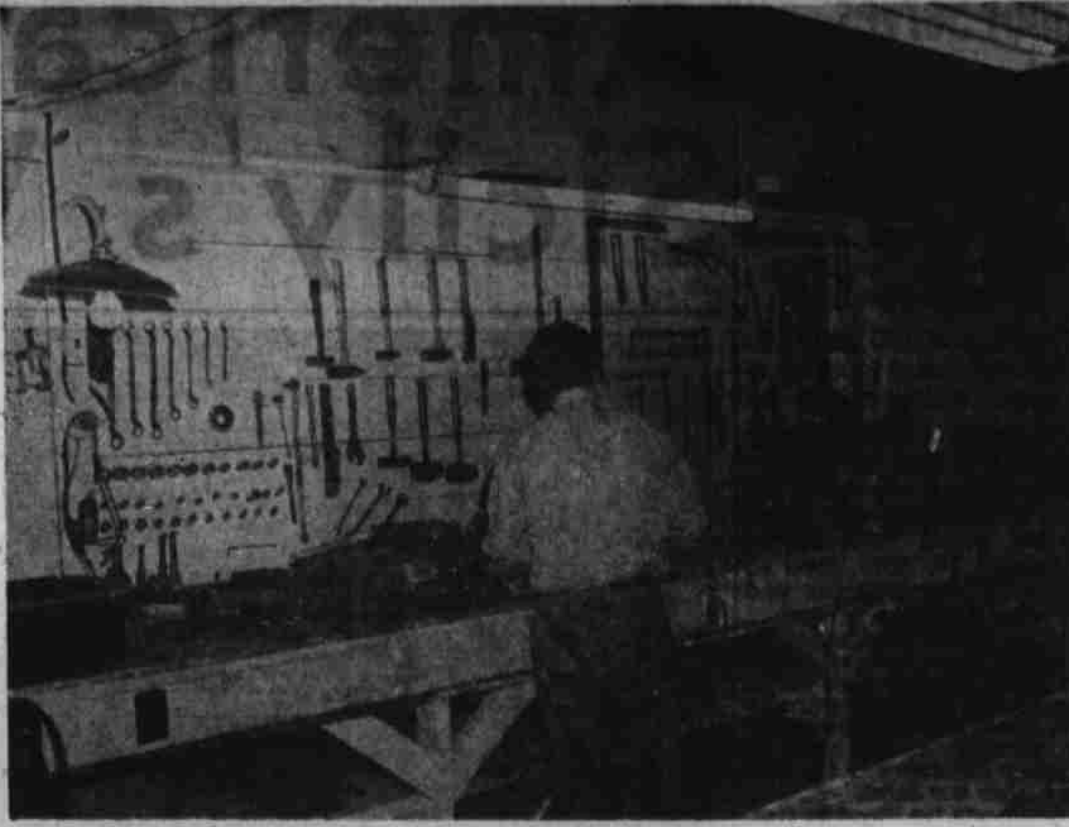

1 cup cooked peas (fresh)

¼ cup diced celery  
1 tablespoon minced onions  
¾ hard-cooked eggs, diced  
¼ teaspoon salt  
¼ teaspoon paprika  
¼ cup boiled salad dressing  
Mix and chill ingredients  
Serve in crisp lettuce or cabbage cups.

Honey Nut Bran Bread (With Dried Fruits)  
3 cups flour  
1 teaspoon soda  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
¼ teaspoon salt  
¼ cup chopped salted peanuts  
¼ cup chopped washed, dried prunes  
¼ cup sour milk or buttermilk  
1 teaspoon grated orange rind  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 egg or 2 yolks (unbeaten)  
¼ cup shortening, melted  
¼ cup honey  
Mix ingredients and pour into loaf pan, lined with waxed paper. Bake 1-4 hours in a moderately slow oven (300) F. If unsalted nuts are used add 1 teaspoon salt to this recipe.

Bettina Custard Pudding (Corn syrup sweetened)  
1 cup boiled rice  
3 eggs, beaten (or 4 yolks)  
1-4 teaspoon salt  
1-4 teaspoon vanilla  
1-4 teaspoon lemon extract  
1-4 teaspoon almond extract

1-3 cup light corn syrup  
3 cups milk  
Mix ingredients and bake 1 hour and 10 minutes in pan of hot water in a moderately slow oven (300).

Bacon will quickly become rancid if allowed to stand long out of a cold place. So peel off just enough strips to be used for cooking and return the rest to a cold spot.

Iron For Summer Pep (Point-rationed foods are starred)  
Liver Piquant  
1 pound sliced beef liver  
4 tablespoons flour  
1-4 teaspoon salt  
1-8 teaspoon pepper  
4 tablespoons French dressing (other kind)  
1-4 cup boiling water  
2 sliced tomato (unpeeled)  
2 thin slices onion  
1-4 cup chopped green peppers (optional)  
Soak liver 5 minutes in boiling water to cover. Drain, wipe dry and sprinkle with flour, salt and pepper. Brown on both sides in fat, heated in frying pan. Add water and lid. Cook slowly 10 minutes. Top with rest of ingredients and sprinkle with seasonings and dressing. Garnish with parsley.

Garden Salad  
3 cups sliced crisp cabbage  
2-3 cup grated crisp raw carrots  
1-2 cup sliced radishes  
1-3 cup diced celery  
1-8 teaspoon paprika  
4 tablespoons French dressing  
Pile up the cabbage on shallow dish, top with rest of vegetables and sprinkle with seasonings and dressing. Garnish with parsley.

Raisin Ring  
1 cake compressed yeast  
2 tablespoons lukewarm water  
3 tablespoons sugar  
1 teaspoon salt  
¾ tablespoons shortening  
1 cup milk  
1 egg, beaten  
1-2 cup raisins  
1-2 teaspoon vanilla  
1-4 teaspoon grated orange rind  
3 1-3 cups flour  
Mix yeast and water in large bowl. Add sugar and salt. Heat shortening and milk and cool to lukewarm. Add to yeast blend, add egg, raisins, vanilla, rind and 2 cups flour. Beat until smooth. Stir in rest of flour and mix thoroughly. Cover with cloth and set in room of average temperature (72 F.). Let rise until doubled in bulk (this will take about 3 hours). Place the dough in a greased ring mold. Or toss roll onto floured board and roll into a "rope" about 1 1-3 inches thick. Then arrange in circle on greased shallow pan. Cover with cloth and let rise until doubled in bulk—about 1 1-3 hours. Lightly sprinkle top with 1-4 tablespoons sugar mixed with 1-4 teaspoon cinnamon and a speck of salt. Bake 25 minutes or until well browned in a moderate oven (350).

## Meat Alternates Prove Valuable

Many homemakers are wondering about the difference between a meat alternate, sometimes referred to as substitute, and a meat extender? Eggs, cheese, peanuts, dried beans, and soybeans are meat alternates because they provide about the same type of nourishment found in meat.

Meat extenders include such foods as dressings, gravies, cereals and vegetables which stretch meat bulk and flavor which do not actually take the place of meat in the diet.

Good examples of meat extenders are found in the following recipes furnished by Rheba M. Boyles, county home demonstration agent:

**Meal-in-One-Dish**  
1-3 lb. hamburger meat  
1-3 medium sized onion  
3 tbs. bacon drippings  
or other fat  
1 cup tomato pulp  
2 medium size potatoes or 1 1-3 cups cooked rice  
4-5 carrots  
Season to taste  
Salt, pepper, celery salt  
Worcestershire sauce  
Note:—Left-over meat or left-over vegetables can be used in preparing this dish. Left-over meat stock or gravy can be added to good advantage.

Cook hamburger and onions in bacon drippings until red color is gone. Add salt and pepper, meat sauce or other seasonings to taste. Place left over vegetables in casserole, cover with seasoned meat, top with tomatoes and bake in moderate oven 30-40 minutes. Serve while hot.

**Stuffed Meat Loaf**  
Dressing: (1 cup cornbread, 1 egg, 1-4 cup stock, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons chopped pickles, 1 tablespoon chopped onions, break cornbread into small pieces, add egg and other ingredients and mix well.)  
Meat: (1 lb. ground meat, 1 egg, 1-3 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons

## Labor Importation May Be Limited

MEXICO CITY, July 21 (AP)—A possible future need to restrict the number of Mexican harvest workers permitted to go to the United States under contract was foreseen in two moves here yesterday.

One was the announcement that a representative of the Agrarian department would be added to the commission which selects workers permitted to emigrate. The government newspaper El Nacional said the step was taken "in view of the necessity of foreseeing when the movement of the workers to the north will have to be reduced to a minimum."

**Bombardiers' Exploits Are Disclosed**

WASHINGTON, July 22 (AP) — The war department today released the story of a Texas bombardier who though wounded remained at his Flying Fortress bomb sight until his bombs were dropped on Bremen, gave aid to a wounded navigator, then revealed his own injuries.

He was S/Sgt. Lewis Fletcher of Sulphur Springs.

A burst of flak ripped through the fortress's Plexi-glass nose and sent steel splinters into Sgt. Fletcher's leg as the bomber approached its target.

Disregarding pain, Fletcher maintained his post, called "bombs away," then turned to aid the navigator, 2nd Lt. Bryan B. Boschma, Springfield, S. D.

Later, 20 to 30 lacerations were found in Fletcher's thighs.

WASHINGTON, July 22 (AP) — First Lt. Howard L. Glick, navigator-bombardier of Galveston, Tex., crawled through a Marauder's cockpit and along a slippery catwalk high above the Mediterranean to release four clusters of fragmentation bombs caught beneath his plane.

The story of his exploit was released today by the war department.

Fighting its way back to North Africa from a raid on Sicily, Glick's B-26 Marauder carried its unrelaxed bombs.

Lt. Glick, the war department said, knew there was grave danger of the bombs exploding directly beneath the plane and that in event of a crash landing they would destroy the plane and kill the crew.

With a pair of pliers he crawled to the bay, cut wires engaging the bombs, allowing them to drop free. Then he crawled back to safety.

The plane, pierced by some 75 flak and bullet holes, landed safely.

**Here Are Some Reasons Why You Can't Get Beer**

By JAMES MARLOW and GEORGE ZIELKE

WASHINGTON, July 22 (AP) — Suds are scarce (as though you didn't know). Americans have been drinking rivers of beer. So on the surface the story looks simple:

If Americans drank less beer, they'd have more beer to drink. But there's more to the story:

1. Beer production has fallen off.
2. Some brewing sources say between 20 and 25 percent of the beer produced is going to the armed forces.
3. More people have more money now than ever before to spend on cooling their throats.
4. Brewers have troubles; short ages in corn, hops, even glass bottles. Transportation is another pain.

That is why the corner store-keeper sometimes has to tell you: "Sorry, we're all out of it."

Beer production may pick up but on a wide scale brewers have been rationing their products to retail outlets.

Some of the largest breweries have limited the distance they will deliver their beer. This helps cut the nation's freight load on train and truck.

For that reason: Various areas must get along with more of the local brand than formerly.

The War Food Administration points out: 70 percent of the nation's beer is made in states east of the Mississippi river and north of North Carolina.

Therefore that heavy beer-making section would have more beer than any other section.

But since population in that section is densest, supply there may not always appear so abundant.

The south, WFA says, has been complaining of a beer shortage for more than three months.

Beer production in 1942—67,700,000 barrels—was the greatest in this country's history. Until last spring, 1943 production was running 10 percent ahead of 1942.

The production drop started in May.

**Unusual! Strawberry Mint Pie**



ENHANCE the delicate flavor of your next strawberry pie with a little fresh mint. You'll be delightfully surprised with the result. This recipe for Strawberry Mint Pie is a sugar-saver, too, for it uses glassed syrup as part of the sweetening agent. To fill one pie-shell:

3 cups strawberries  
4 to 6 sprigs mint  
1-2 cup sugar  
1-2 teaspoon salt

1 baked pastry shell  
1 1-4 cups cold water  
1 1-2 tablespoons unflavored gelatin  
3-4 cups glassed syrup (red label)

Wash and hull strawberries. Drain well. Bruise mint, add sugar, salt and one cup of the water. Simmer this mint mixture slowly for 10 minutes. Soak gelatin in remaining one-fourth cup water. Strain hot mint mixture over the softened gelatin and stir until thoroughly dissolved. Add syrup and mix well. Pour the mint gelatin mixture over the strawberries and cool until it begins to set. Then pour entire mixture into a baked pastry shell. Chill thoroughly, serve with sweetened whipped cream and garnish with tiny sprigs of fresh mint. (To whip 18 per cent cream, add one tablespoon of lemon juice to one cup of chilled cream. Sweeten to taste.)

"A" book holders must have second official inspection by September 30; "B" book holders, third inspection by October 31; and "C" book holders third inspection by August 31; "T" book holders, second inspection within 6 months of last date of inspection or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first.
