

Killing Freedom Of The College Press Flailed

THE American people are still democratic enough to view censors of the press with hearty disapproval. But there is no censorship more reprehensible to the Am-erican mind than the censorship of college

publications.

The fact was illustrated recently when editorial pages all over the country attacked Dr. H. Y. Benedict, president of the University of Texas, for his assertion of the right of the administration to "kill" all objectionable material. President Benedict said that a student newspaper had no "justification or authority to publish a newspaper containing political opinion and personal criticisms" since, as is the case of the Daily Texan, "the university is the only reason for the paper's existence."

ONE need not be a Milton to demolish Dr. Benedict's straw house. The great flaw in his argument, of course, is his assumption that a university is run for the benefit of the faculty and Dr. Benedict, particularly Dr. Benedict. The old guard university officials are so accustomed to an authoritarian attitude that occasionally the fact that a university exists in the interest of the student body seems to fade from their memory—a case of the absent-minded professor turned administrator.

A college newspaper is an organ of student opinion. Representing the majority of students, it has every right in the world to attack, praise, or condone whomever it wishes from the president of the university to the night watchman. There should in our estimation be no more independent publication than a college newspaper, since, when all is said and done, the students are the be-all and end-all of an educational institution.

IF in their own publication students are denied freedom of expression, it is their prerogative to demand it. Properly speaking, Dr. Benedict is the person who should be expelled.—Daily Northwestern.




