### Deputy Superintendents Asked To Compile Full Vote On State Race

(This is the third of a series of articles—Editor.)

AUSTIN, July 12.—One way the taxpayers' money goes into the proverbial rathole is through the political door.

"It is axiomatic," observed a recent Travis county grand jury, "that state employees cannot efficiently and faithfully perform their duties when they must spend the good portion of their time in an effort to retain their jobs. The result is that the service of the state is neglected and the money of the taxpayers is in fact unofficially appropriated to political activities."

All this sounded as if the grand jury had been reading the report of the last legislative investigation of the department of education. In its report, dated January 23, 1939, the committee included a letter mailed out to deputy state superintendents who work under L. A. Woods, the state superintendent. The letter, addressed to deputies in the field, and signed by Assistant State Superintendent Edgar Ellen Wilson, was as follows:

report. In some instances, it may be necessary for you to get the information from the county clerk's office.

"In getting this information, when possible we would appreciate your making notation opposite a box that went against Mr. Woods the reason for same. He feels that this information will help him in the school program. Naturally, we would like to know where people have been dissatisfied, and if possible, we will find a way to adjust the situation. As near as possible we would like to have the name of the political leader or advisor in each voting box, and especially the name of one person in each box who is a friend of Mr. Woods.

"You may think this is quite an undertaking, but when you consider the matter thoroughly, I believe you will agree with me that the information is needed. When you want me to do something for you, please call on me and I will do my best, just as I am sure you will in complying with this request."

The work necessary to carry out the instructions in the above letter, the legislative investigating committee reported, would entail "an enormous expense that would be impossible to calculate."

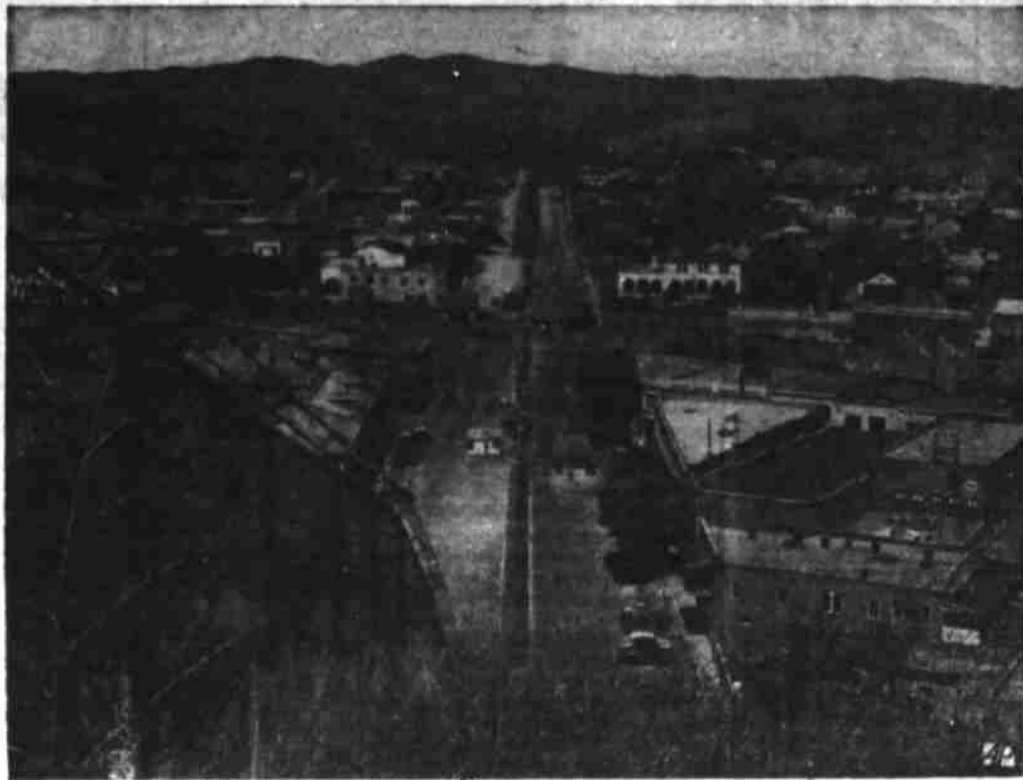
**NYA Project Open To 20 In This County**  
Twenty Howard county youths will have an opportunity to participate in the NYA resident project at Inks dam near Burnet, Orris N. Coby, Abilene, area supervisor, said Friday.  
The project provides a training schedule for youths and pays them enough that they may care for room and board, laundry, medical attention and have approximately \$12 per month left for their personal use, said the supervisor.  
At the present time there are around 350 young men in the program at Inks dam, studying various vocations such as woodwork, radio, metal work, machine tooling, auto and airplane mechanics and all types of construction work.  
Coby said that up to 20 youths from Howard county could be placed almost immediately. Young men who are out of school and unemployed and who are between the ages of 18 and 25 are eligible. They may make application at the county welfare office, the Texas State Employment Service office or at the city hall.

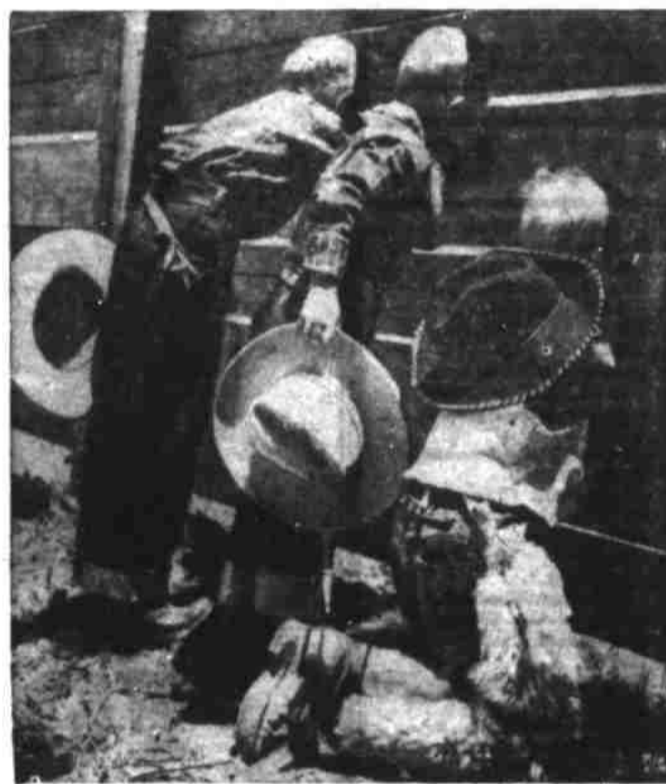

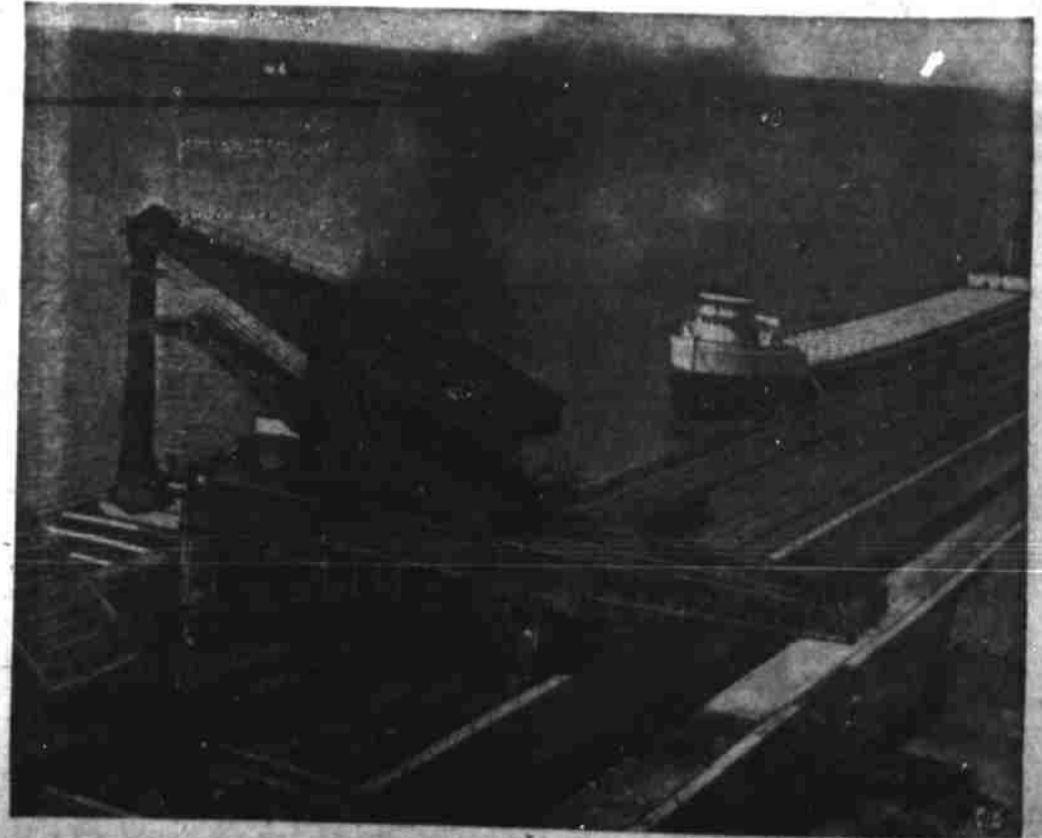
