Muleshoe's movin' on

Lady Mules stop Perryton for first-ever girls bi-district crown

AMARILLO—Fortherest of the 1993-94 basketball season, the Muleshoe Lady Mules will make history every time they take the court.

The Lady Mules won the school's first girl's bi-district championship here Friday at the Tascosa Activities Center, fighting off Perryton's Lady Rangers 48-39 before a massive crowd of MHS fans.

The Lady Mules will take on Graham in the area playoffs Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. in theScurry County Coliseum in Snyder. Graham defeated Denver City 41-36 in a bidistrict game Friday.

Displaying hard-nosed defense on one end and patience at the other, the Lady Mules gradually carved out Perryton's heart. At the end, the Lady Rangers were slinging NBAlength three-pointers in an attempt to make up ground under the deafening roar of the MHS crowd.

Defensively, Muleshoe held the Lady Ranger s' 6-2 postLindaPshigodato just two aged to hit 11 of 15 free throws halfcourt, the Lady Mules

to finish with 15 points. And though MHS coach Jim Gruhlkey had to dance gingerly around foul trouble all night, he said things went pretty well as planned.

"We felt if we were patient offensively and kept the big girl from hurting us inside, we would be all right," said Gruhlkey, whose team last week won the school's first girls district basketball title in 32

Pshigoda tried to shoot over the collapsing Lady Mules defense with little success. when she missed, MHS took care of the rebound.

Pshigoda was so frustrated at one point, she headed cross court to give a referee an ear full, bringing the volume of the MHS crowd to the ceiling.

Gruhlkey said his team's game plan was to run its offense and get into a groove. He gave them the opportunity to set the tone as well, and the Lady Mules took advantage.


