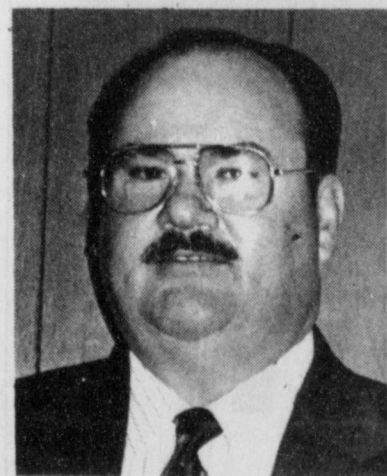

Muleshoe's movin' on Lady Mules stop Perryton for first-ever girls bi-district crown

AMARILLO— For the rest of the 1993-94 basketball season, the Muleshoe Lady Mules will make history every time they take the court.

The Lady Mules won the school's first girl's bi-district championship here Friday at the Tascosa Activities Center, fighting off Perryton's Lady Rangers 48-39 before a massive crowd of MHS fans.

The Lady Mules will take on Graham in the area playoffs Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. in the Scurry County Coliseum in Snyder. Graham defeated Denver City 41-36 in a bi-district game Friday.

Displaying hard-nosed defense on one end and patience at the other, the Lady Mules gradually carved out Perryton's heart. At the end, the Lady Rangers were slinging NBA-length three-pointers in an attempt to make up ground under the deafening roar of the MHS crowd.

Defensively, Muleshoe held the Lady Ranger's 6-2 post Linda Pshigoda to just two field goals all night. She managed to hit 11 of 15 free throws

to finish with 15 points. And though MHS coach Jim Gruhlkey had to dance gingerly around foul trouble all night, he said things went pretty well as planned.

"We felt if we were patient offensively and kept the big girl from hurting us inside, we would be all right," said Gruhlkey, whose team last week won the school's first girls district basketball title in 32 years.

Pshigoda tried to shoot over the collapsing Lady Mules defense with little success. When she missed, MHS took care of the rebound.

Pshigoda was so frustrated at one point, she headed cross court to give a referee an ear full, bringing the volume of the MHS crowd to the ceiling.

Gruhlkey said his team's game plan was to run its offense and get into a groove. He gave them the opportunity to set the tone as well, and the Lady Mules took advantage.

Gruhlkey sent his team into a defensive mode at the opening tip, conceding the advantage to the 6-2 Pshigoda. But when the Lady Rangers crossed halfcourt, the Lady Mules

February is national American Heart Month

Heart disease is responsible for more deaths each year than all forms of cancer combined, but somehow manages to keep a lower profile. In an effort to highlight this discrepancy and educate the public on ways they can treat and prevent heart disease, the American Heart Association (AHA) has once again named February American Heart Month.

During American Heart Month, the AHA encourages people to make sure their heart is healthy by having their cholesterol level checked, decreasing the amount of saturated fat in their diet and beginning or maintaining a regular program of physical activity. The AHA is so sure that a

regular program of exercise can have a positive effect on people who already suffer from cardiovascular disease and those who do not that it has issued the following statement:

"Regular aerobic physical activity increases capacity and plays a role in both the primary and secondary prevention of cardiovascular disease. Inactivity is recognized as a risk factor for coronary artery disease."

Stated in the official AHA Statement on Exercise, this excerpt was prepared by some of the most knowledgeable physicians and researchers in the country.

Muleshoe managed a 22-14 halftime lead.

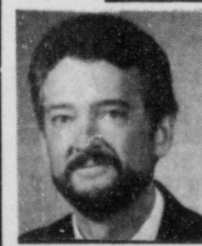
The Lady Mules led by 10 points three times in the third period, including a 33-23 margin going into the final period.

Grulkey said his sophomores, Allyson Field and Mandy Cleavinger, both did a good job of coming off the bench and giving the Lady Mules a lift when they needed it. He added that Brooke Sinclair played extremely well.

Last week, I shared with you that we had decided to buy a new (used) car. I explained that we dreaded the process and that we were reluctant to

of profit and profitable dealers. We want the dealer we do business with to make a profit so they can provide service when we need it. We just don't want them to make this month's profit entirely from our pur-

sponds. "Well how about \$3.49?" I offer.

"I'll ask the manager," the clerk responds as he strides away. In a few minutes the clerk returns. "I'm sorry, but we have to make a little profit," the clerk says. "Couldn't you go a little higher?"

"How much higher?" I ask. "Well, we could fix you up with a payment plan," the clerk answers.

"I can't afford that much," I reply as I replace the bottle on the shelf.

A silly example, but that is exactly the routine we endured at not one, but four dealerships. Not once did we get a direct answer to the question, "How much is it?" Even when we found the ideal car at a solid dealership with an excellent reputation, we couldn't get a firm price.

Finally, we entered into the game. We were ready to buy a specific car and were prepared to write the check. We made a serious offer.

Obviously, our first offer was too low. The CATS - Customers Aren't Too Smart - sales system teaches that every customer is good for three "bumps" or "ups," that is, price increases.

We couldn't solicit a counter offer. The response was "we couldn't possibly, etc." So we "bumped" our first offer about a week's pay. It wasn't enough.

We'll never know if we were \$200 or \$2,000 apart. We never did get a firm price. We walked and we won't be a "be-back." We won't be a "grape" or a "lay down" either.

A better way? It looks like we'll spend a few hundred more on the old cars and be patient. Someday, somewhere a dealer is going to come up with a better way. A truly customer-oriented dealer will choose not to insult customers whose IQs are over 40. Then I'll get in line - and there will be a line - and buy my car of choice and go home happy.

Or maybe I'll get into the

car business myself. I believe with a calculator I could determine the mark-ups to cover costs and profit. We would need to raise money.

I wonder if David Glass, Paul Carter or any of the other folks at Wal-Mart have ever considered getting into the car business? Would any of you readers like a no hassle deal from Tay-Mart Motors.

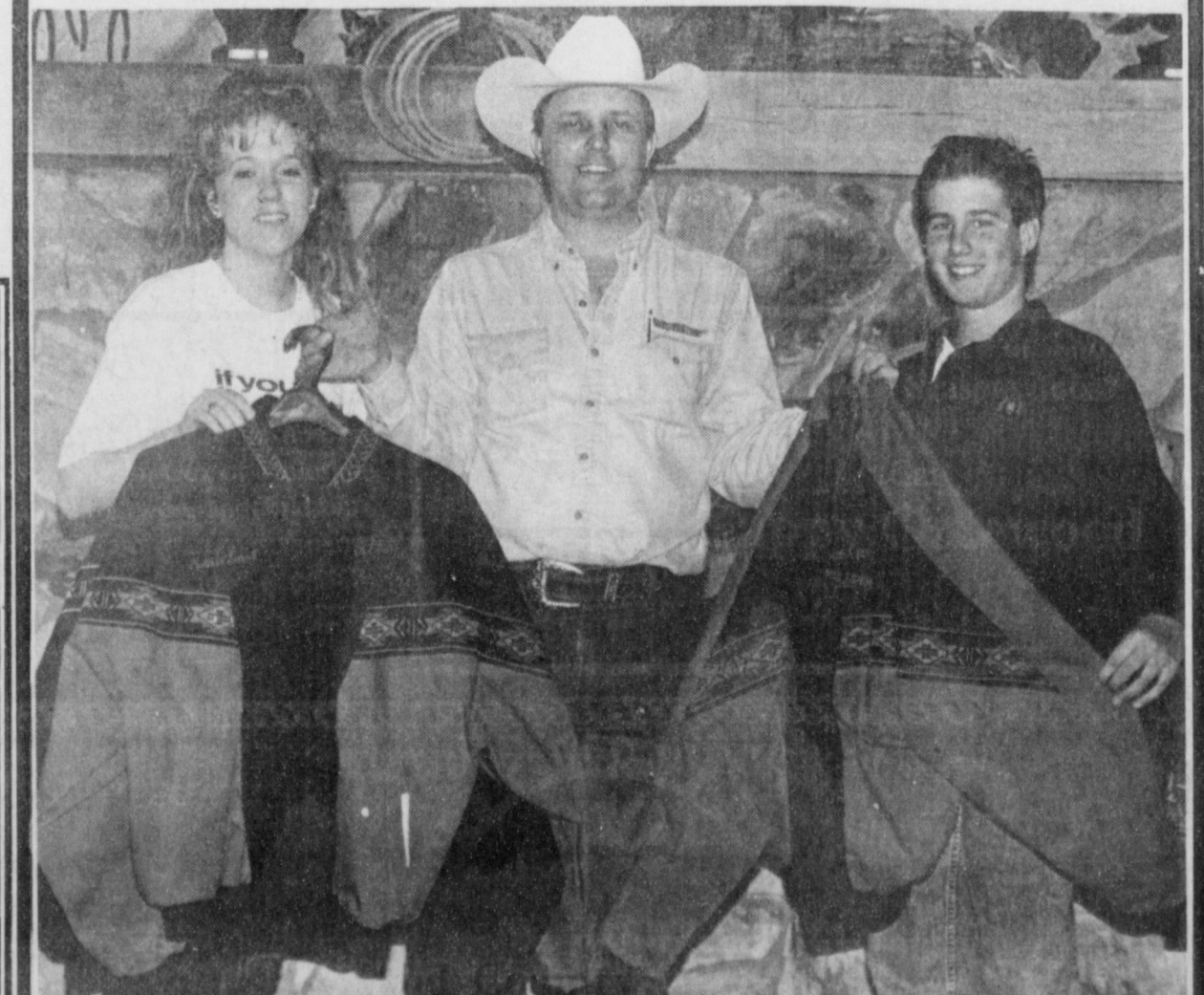
