## More rain brings sprinkles of hope to area farmers

April showers came a little late, but were still met with a warm welcome by many area farmers. Now that the rainfalls are spilling over into the month of May, it looks like it may be a good year for cotton.

This past Wednesday and Thursday, Muleshoe received 1.15 inches of rain, according to J.K. Adams of Muleshoe. Combined with rain received earlier this month, the total rain count for May so far is 2.1 inches.

Adams said as of April, Muleshoe had received just 1.25 inches of rain.

"That was the driest spring I can remember," Adams said.

"We have had more rain in May than all year since January," Adams said. Since

January, Muleshoe has received a total of 4.50 inches of rain.

After the last string of rain showers this week, William Tibbitt, manager of Pleasant Valley Cotton Gin in Muleshoe said, "It (the rain) will increase and help the dryland areas and probably has been beneficial up to this time on irrigating."

Tibbitt estimates that about 50 percent of the cotton crop in Bailey County has been planted.

Areas surrounding Bailey County, including Lubbock, were under severe weather watches on Thursday and there were reports of flooding. However, Bailey County was

## Mules stop Friona; clinch playoff spot

The Muleshoe Mules won when they had to Friday, beating Friona 8-3 to clinch a spot in the Class 3A playoffs before a large partisan crowd at Mule Field.

The win gave the Mules the runner-up spot in the District 2-3A race. Muleshoe finished the regular season 18-8 and 7-

3 in the league. Tulia, which won 9-1 at Dimmitt Friday, finished 8-2 in the district and 16-11 overall.

The Mules are scheduled to play District 1-3A champion Sanford-Fritch Friday (May 20) at 5 p.m. at Jaycee Park in Plainview in the bi-district round.

It will be the second time in three years Muleshoe head coach Ted Leps has led his team to the playoffs. As the District 2-3A champion in 1992, the 17-10 Mules lost to Childress in the bi-district round.

Andy Perez scattered five hits and struck out eight in beat-

ing the Chieftains. The Mules backed Perez with 10 hits and eight earned runs off two FHS pitchers, starter Tony Cuevas, and Cory Hamilton, who relieved in the fourth.

## Low-interest loans available for housing

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Senator Phil Gramm has announced the award of a \$465,120 low-interest loan to the City of Muleshoe Housing Authority.

The funding, provided by the Farmers Home Administration, is for construction of 16, one-bedroom apartments to accommodate senior citizens.

It operates a broad range of low-interest lending and grant programs designed to protect and develop watersheds, to finance waste disposal projects and to improve the economic climate of rural communities.

## First of agriculture mini-summits scheduled to be held in Lubbock May 16

LUBBOCK - The role agriculture should and will play in 21st century America will be the topic of discussion here May 16 in the first of five Agricultural Mini-Summits being held this month across Texas.

Consumers, environmentalists, crop and livestock producers, agribusiness leaders, government officials and educators will take part in the

conference from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the University Center at Texas Tech University.

"All of these groups are stakeholders in the future of the nation's natural resources and its food and fiber production," said Dr. John R. Abernathy, resident director of research at Lubbock for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Abernathy chairs the Texas

Agricultural and Natural Resource Summit Leadership Council which is coordinating the five conferences. In addition to the Lubbock session other "mini-summits" will be held May 18 at Temple, May 24 at Dallas, May 25 at Weslaco and May 26 at Odessa.

They will continue the discussions from the Texas Agricultural Summit held last fall on the Texas A&M University

campus in College Station. That session identified five major issues:

- \*Protecting the environment and natural resources;
- \*Competitiveness of Texas agriculture;
- \*Public policy for agriculture and rural areas;
- \*Education and information needs of consumers, and
- \*Agricultural leadership for the 21st century.

"We hope our diverse clientele from all the stakeholder groups will take part in these mini-summits to talk about the future and continue the process of finding the most desirable solutions to these issues," Abernathy said.

The Lubbock conference will open at 9 a.m. with a welcome and comments from Dr. Robert Lawless, president of Tech, Dr. James R. Clark, head of the

Division of Agriculture at West Texas A&M University, Canyon, will be master of ceremonies.

A video presentation will look at changes facing Texas. Then Dr. Zerle Carpenter, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will review that educational agency's long range planning process which

difference.



### Business questions reasons for proposed closed school campuses

Dear Editor:

As the co-owner of the Snack Shack, my husband attended a school board meeting a couple of weeks ago. He went to voice our opposition to the possible closing of the junior high and DeShazo school campuses.

It was explained at that time, "the closing was for the safety of the children. The children are placing their lives in danger by crossing Highways 84 and 214." I agree. I think most people will agree that the safety of our children is and always will be first.

Neither business is located on these highways. In fact, we are located in the school zone. The speed limit is posted at 20 miles per hour and vehicles must yield to pedestrians. So

the safety of the children is not any higher than crossing from the junior high to the cafeteria.

According to the news article in the Thursday, May 12 Muleshoe Journal, the school is estimating 100 more junior high students and 30 more high school students.

Our estimates from the Snack Shack alone is between 250 and 300 students. Of the 130 students, the school is projecting, 30 were from high school.

So, in effect, they realize that the majority of our business comes from junior high and the Snack Shack cannot survive on the high school revenue alone.

When a business is forced to close, the loss of revenue to the community also must be

considered. The loss of sales tax revenue will cost our community when it comes time for the City of Muleshoe and Bailey County to get their allotted revenue amounts.

If more businesses are forced to close their doors, where will the needed money come from but increased taxes to everyone.

Seven people will also be affected by the loss of their jobs. That's another loss of revenue for our community. Seven people who live and work in Muleshoe.

Other businesses in Muleshoe will feel the effect when the added income is no longer spent in Muleshoe.

With all of this in mind, suddenly "Itza Pizza" comes into being for the cafeteria. Come on people... "for the safety of the children?"...Really!

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## Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- \* the value placed on your property
- \* any exemptions that may apply to you
- \* the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal
- \* the taxable status of your property
- \* the local governments which should be taxing your property
- \* any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

### Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 104 E. Ave. C, Muleshoe, TX 79347  
Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

### Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive

Mildred Williams has been chosen as artist of the month for May by the Muleshoe Art Association.

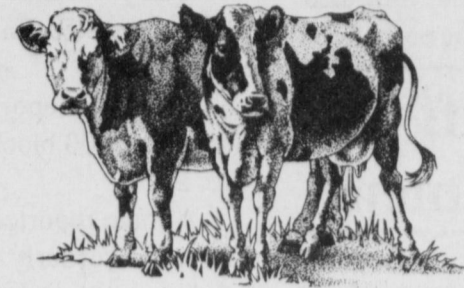

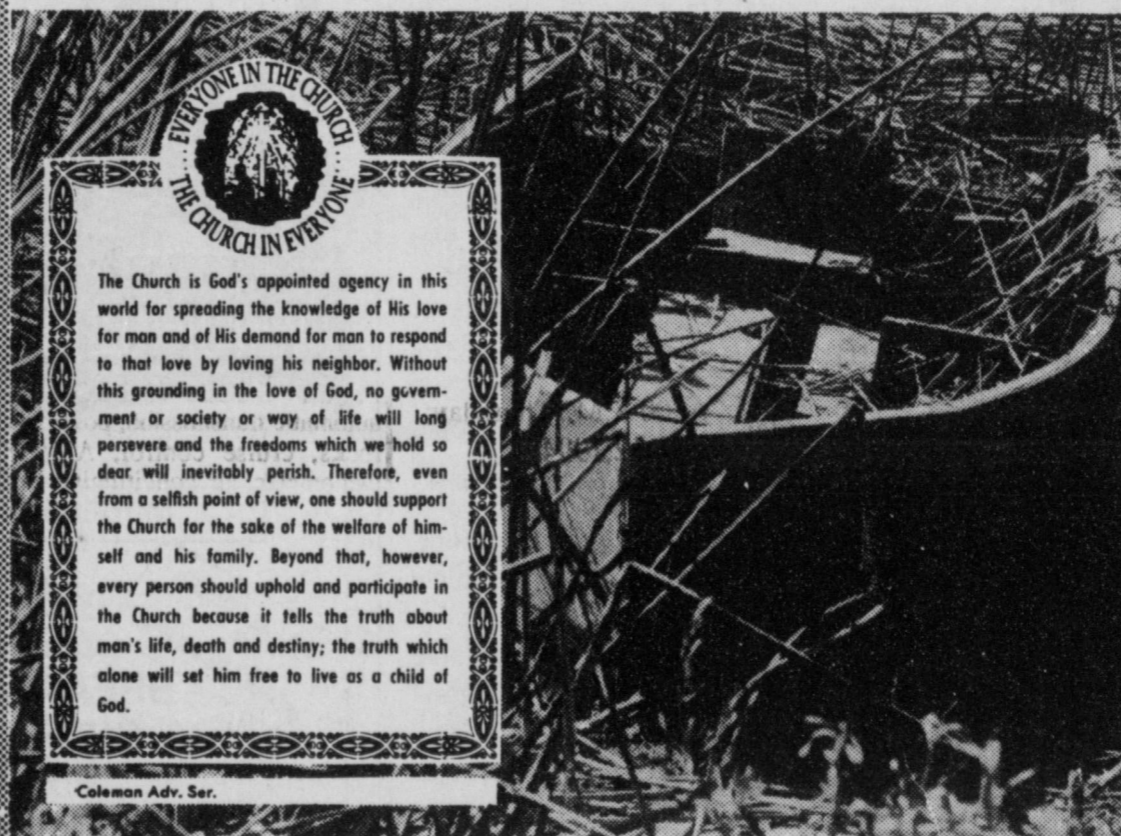
