Keys to solving racial problem noted in Wednesday speakout

Education and cooperation are the keys to solving the racial problem according to the majority of the people attending Wednesday's speakout on "Racism" in front of the Union.

Most of the people agreed that both black and white students should attend the same school at an early age. If they are sent to an all-black or all-white school at an early age, they learn racism.

"Cooperation can only be achieved by the desegregation of schools and community life," commented one spectator. Most of the crowd nodded their approval.

"TO ACHIEVE EDUCATION and cooperation we (blacks and whites) need enlightened teachers which must come from enlightened universities," said Eddy Huff, SOUL member. "Tech is not such a university."

Huff said it was the goal of the Student Organization for Unity and Leadership (SOUL) to enlighten Tech.

One black said there were both good and bad black people, and the good were never recognized. "The press hurts everyone. The press plays up the militants, and that is all anyone wants to read.

Most of the blacks and some of the whites were in agreement that riots are the answer to all the black peoples' problems.

"How does the burning of your own homes help the black people?" one white student

HUFF SAID BY BURNING their own homes they get better housing. He said the government comes in and rebuilds the black peoples homes which are better than their old ones.

He also said the riots brought economic progress and gave attention to the black

A white student said the black people in Lubbock were being descriminated against. He claimed that while he was helping with voter registration in east Lubbock, a paddy wagon and several police cars arrived. He said he walked over to the driver of the paddy wagon and asked him what he was doing. He claimed the driver said, "I'm going to get a load of niggers."

There were approximately 125 people trying to listen to the discussions, but most of them could not hear because of the passing cars and other noises.

Two representatives of Tech will attend Scientific and Industrial Research Organization (CSIRO) in Australia.

Of primary interest to both will be discussions of solar distillation which can use the sun's energy to convert brackish water into good water. West Texans have been urged to seek new irrigation sources in the area's abundant quantities of salt water

Solar distillation will be one of several Australian Petroleum Exploration subjects considered by the conference where scientists from all continents will present papers. Other topics are: a world survey of solar energy; radiation measurement, processing, solar simulation and photobiology; commercial uses of solar energy; solar energy for building and agriculture; general research and high temperature processes.

Immediately following the conference. Bradford will tour the Murrumbidgee Irrigation Area and inspect the CSIRO Division of Mechanical Engineering solar field station where evaluation tests are performed on solar stills, water heaters and air heaters.

V-P race gains another contender

Because of the significance of the current campus elections, some evaluations should be made of the vice-presidential race.

People tend to underestimate the importance of the position. In reality, the job is crucial to the performance of the Senate. Naturally, the vicepresident of the student association (or president of the senate) cannot raise the efficiency of the senate above the quality of the senators, but the man must be capable of utilizing the potential from the people elected. Nothing will kill the senate's effectiveness faster than a vice-president who cannot objectively run the senate. The senate president can retain his personal views and stands, yet work for ideas of more significance than a particular preferrence he may

If next year's senate will achieve any status, and interests to fulfill the needs of the jobs they desired. Second, success will come only with a senate president who can insure fair consideration of various proposals.

As in the presidential race, there is a candidate who is considered a shoo-in. Larry Meyers, currently a senator, is hard-working, conscientious, and believes in the significance of student government. He has long experience in the senate and is by far the man to beat in this race.

Robin Cash has filed and is running an admirable race based on issues, but she has exactly no experience in student government at Tech, and if she were ever elected, would lose most of the term in office just trying to get her job figured out.

What is needed is a good, solid write-in candidate to give Meyers a race. There's one man, Graduate Senator Allan Soffar who would have a prayer against Meyers. One indisputable fact about Soffar is that he is one of the hardest working senators to have held office at Tech.

The current senate president said Soffar was a man who spent "22 hours a day" working for Tech and the

We urge supporters of Soffar to get behind him in a write-in campaign based on sound issues, many of which he has already raised in the senate.

It's not up to the University Daily to tell you who to vote for. You've got a good selection between Soffar and Meyers. Meyers could be an excellent vicepresident and is miles ahead of Soffar in the race, but students still have to make up their own minds about who should do the job.
