Vandenberg For Better Support Of Nationalists

CLEVELAND, Jan. 11. (AP)-Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich) urged tonight that the United States shift its China policy to encourage the non-Communist coalition backing the new constitution there.

Secretary of State Byrnes at the same time said he is more confident than ever before that "we can achieve a just peace by co-operative effort" by perfisting with "firmness."

Their joint billing at the final session of the council on world affairs had dramatic contrasts. In the Republican-dominated Senate, Vandenberg has gained new power in foreign affairs-the time of his greatest influence probably is just ahead. Byrnes, having finished the first phase of treaty-making, is retiring-he will be succeeded by Gen. George C.

He differed with Byrnes on at least one point by insisting that a Pan-American conference on defense problems be called without delay.

Byrnes' last scheduled address as Secretary of State appealed for the United States to remain strong in military arms and forces until its strength can be reduced equally with that of other powers. This, he said, is necessary for world peace.

Vandenberg proposed, in effect, that the United States should abandon its policy of treating the Communists on a basis of equality with the Chinese Nationalists, and instead should throw its backing to the Nationalists, and other groups under the

Judge James T. Brooks, upon whom the community had conferred most of its honors during his 40-year residence here, died of heart attack at 10:15 p.m. Friday in a local hospital.

Funeral will be held at 3 p.m. today at the First Methodist church with the Rev. C. A. Long, pastor, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Gage Lloyd of the First Presbyterian church, and the Masons will be in charge at the graveside in the Masonic cemetery.

Death of the veteran public official and attorney came as a shock, although he had been under treatment for the past two weeks for heart involvement. He apparently was making steady progress and was in good spirits until a new attack claimed his life suddenly. During his two score years in + *

Big Spring, James T. Brooks held several public offices including that of mayor, county attorney, county judge (on two occasions), district attorney and district judge. In addition, he was active in a host of other civic and fraternal affairs. Born in Brown county, Judge

Brooks lacked only six days of attaining his 69th birthday. He was reared in Ellis county and began his career as a school teacher, continuing several years in the profession before studying for and being admitted to the bar.

He interrupted a career of private practice and public service here on Aug. 5, 1917 to be mustered in with a company (D, 117th Supply Train, 42nd division) composed largely of men from Big Spring and surrounding area. He was promoted to rank of captain of his company, which had arrived in France within three months after it had mustered, and led it through three of the major offensives in World War I and for five months in the army of occupation at Arwiler, Germany. Many of the men whom he commanded ustil May 15, 1919, and later met with at the annual reunion, will be here for the services.

Returning to Big Spring, he resumed his practice and soon was back in public life. When the 32nd special district court was crested, then Gov. James V. Alired appointed him to be judge. Following his term in office, he returned to private practice until 1942 when he returned for a secend time to the office of county judge, succeeding W. S. Morrison, who had resigned to enter the army in World War II. Just prior to leaving office, he was stricken with a heart attack.

Brooks was a past commander of both the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion chapters, a Knights Templar in the Masonic Lodge, was active in the Knights of Pythias and other business and fraternal organizations. At one time, he headed the

Legislators Are Preparing For Packed Session

Clamor Looms For Increased Appropriations

AUSTIN, Jan. 11. (AP)-The 50th general meeting of the legislature in Texas' 101 years of statehood convenes here at noon Tuesday for a session packed with highlyexplosive potentials.

It will be the first general session since the close of World War II and postwar problems rooted deep in the life of every citizen face it on every hand.

It will be one of the youngest legislatures in recent years, with many of its members World War II veterans in their 20s. There will be 84 new members

Lewis Assails His Contempt Conviction

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11. (P)-John L. Lewis and the United Mine Workers told the Supreme Court today that "public hysteria and political expediency" led to their contempt convictions and \$3,510,000 fines in the soft coal strike.

Both the union and the government filed briefs outlining arguents they are to present orally Tuesday.

In the briefs, Lewis' counsel asked the Supreme Court to cancel contempt findings as well as the fines, while Attorney General Clark argued they should be sustained.

The Lewis brief maintained that the \$3.510,000 fines are "excessive." "A diligent search of the authorities fails to disclose that a fine of the tremendous magnitude here involved has ever been imposed by any court for any contempt, civil or criminal," the union The government countered that

Solons Moving To Wipe Out **Suits By Unions**

Other Labor Plans Are Slated For **Early Attention**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11. (AP)-Bills to wipe out some \$4,000,000,000 of union portal-pay suits got a head start over other labor legislation today as a Senate Judiciary subcommittee set hearings for Wednesday.

Seven other major bills, among 30 or more dealing with unions already introduced, are slated for early attention but the House and Senate labor committees have not yet set to work on them.

Harold E. Stassen, former Minnesota governor who is seeking the Republican nomination for President in 1948, said today there is "some danger of going too far" in labor legislation.

Three of the seven major bills are sponsored by Senator Ball, also a Minnesota Republican. Stassen told a news conference all three "go too far." He was talking about bills by Ball which would outlaw the closed shop and industry-wide bargaining, and the Ball - Taft -Smith bill which is a revised version of last year's Case bill.

Stassen's own labor programs centers around amending the Wagner Act but avoiding compulsion as far as possible. Stassen is not

Senator Capehart (R-Ind.), sponsor of one bill to offset portal-pay claims, will be the first witness before the Judiciary group. Chairman Wiley (R-Wis.) of the Judiciary Committee has introduced another measure.

Senator Donnell (R-Mo.), subcommittee chairman, announced the hearings will be public. He told reporters that witnesses will be required "so far as practicable" to file written statements covering their proposed testimony a day in advance of their appearance. The other subcommittee members are Senators Cooper (R-Tenn.) and Eastland (D-Miss.).

The seven bills which so far seem to be getting the most atburned to the ground. An ambu- tention aside from the portal-pay measures are: -House-

1. The new bill by Rep. Francls Case (R-SD.), a huge omnibus measure that would revise the Wagner Act, delay serious strikes 60 days, give the government legal power to halt the most serious strikes even after that, and do many other things.

2. The Smith bill, another big measure, by Rep. Howard Smith (D-Va.), designed to rewrite the Wagner Act. It would ban the closed shop, prevent strikes in public utilities or industries affecting public health or safety, and many other things.

3. The "Public Rights" bill by five Republicans, designed to protect the public against strikes that endager health or safety by compelling both sides to arbitrate. -Senate-

1. The Ball - Taft - Smith bill, by Republican Senators Ball (Minn.), Taft (Ohio) and H. Alexander Smith (N.J.). This would delay serious strikes 60 days, outlaw jurisdictional, sympathy, and organizational strikes, require unions to make financial reports, and do other things.

2. The Ball bill to break up industry-wide bargaining.

3. The Ball bill to outlaw various forms of the closed shop. Senator Byrd (D-Va.) also has introduced an anti-closed shop bill, but he is not on the labor committee and Ball's version probably will get more consideration.

4. where to pave. Next will come the matter of how to go about There is every reason to believe that the next big program in Big Spring will be by the contract route. strictly voluntary basis could be developed. Finally comes the question of when. That is the reason cognizance should be taken of the present interest in the matter. Paving cannot be done at the snap of a finger. If it is to start as soon as weather conditions are favorable, first steps should be taken now .

His Country's Interest Involved

By FRANK GRIMES

First business session of the new congress uncovered a rush to tap the nation's till for war veterans. One proposed bonus bill would cost an estimated 4 billion dollars. Another would run maybe 15 billion. A third would provide for immediate cashing of terminal leave bonds, estimated at nearly 3 billion.

The nation has a very large obligation to its veterans, and should not be niggardly in discharging that obligation. But cash bonuses, in the face of serious commitments to veterans in need of hospitalization or permanent pensions, could easily get out of hand

The suggestion for immediate cashing of the terminal leave bonds has obvious merits. Officers got theirs in cash. Enlisted men were scheduled to get nothing, but congress passed the bond plan, under which bonds would be cashable in five years, to keep from upsetting the budget. If immediate payment isn't possible for all, maybe congress will provide for immediate cash payment to veterans who are unemployed or who can show real need.

Another meritorious bit of veterans' legislation is the proposal to lift the present \$200 ceiling on allowances for on-the-job training. When VA reversed established practice and cut such pay-and-allowance combined total to the present ceiling, it caught many a veteran out on a limb, with heavier obligations than he could carry., The ceiling should be lifted for at least one year, to allow veterans in training to get out from under unwieldly commitments, then reimposed if deemed necessary.

It is the declared policy of this government and its people to take care of its veterans, especially those disabled in combat or by disease, and to care for the widows and orphans. At the same time, we have another great obligation toward the warriors and their families, and to all Americans of whatever degree, to-wit: To make certain that we don't have to send the next generation into an-

Already open and bitter attacks are being made against our military establishment under the guise of economy. Our armed services have been cut to the bone, but the cutting process will be speeded up and carried to the point of national disaster if the economy wave, as has always happened in the past, results in stripping the nation of its defenses.

We have a national debt of 260 billion dollars to discharge. Every unnecessary expense chargeable to national income is a threat to the hope of paying off that debt.

It would be tragic if congress, spurred on by the hope of making votes for itself, was swept into an orgy of spending to satisfy the demands for additional heavy bonuses. It comes down to a contest between the generation that fought the last war and the generation that will have to fight the next, if heavy expenditures for bonuses make it impossible to maintain an adequate military establishment and to pay off the debt of the last war.

The nation let the veterans down in respect to housing. That monumental failure isn't going to be rectified by a new bonus. Bonus money is soon gone, but the need for hospital care, housing and a multitude of other direct obligations to the veterans goes on and on. What the veteran really needs is a house to live in and a job to work at. Individually, that is about all he asks for.

The veteran, more than any citizen, is interested in a peaceable world in which his sons won't have to endure the hardships and privations that it was his lot to bear. He knows from experience what it is to face a deadly foe unprepared. He knows enough about modern war to know that the next one will involve this country in a grapple to the death, with our cities and fields catching what the

right of sacrifice and investment of time and energy. His own welfare and the safety of the country should not be jeopardized by unwise political maneuverings.






