

## Packets Now Being Mailed to Students

Registration packets for the spring semester are still being processed and mailed, Don Renner, assistant registrar announced yesterday.

In answering students who have asked why they have not already received their packets, he said, "Careful filling out of the A&H Forms would speed up processing tremendously. Every blank that a student does not complete or fills out incorrectly delays his packet. "ALSO ADDING to the confusion is the excess use of duplicate A&H forms. Far too many students fill out one form, thinking they will be in one school, and then come into the registrar's office wanting to change his school

and fill out a duplicate."

Renner also announced that spring semester class schedules have been and still are available in the registrar's office with a limitation of one copy per student.

SPRING SEMESTER registration for regular day-time students begins Thursday (Jan. 30) at 8 a.m. and continues through the following Saturday. Late day-time student registration will be Feb. 5. No day-time registrations will be conducted between Feb. 1 and Feb. 5.

Students will register for night-only and Saturday-only classes Feb. 3, 4, 5 and 6 from 5 to 6:30 p.m. Late registrants in this category will register Feb. 8.

## Students Urged To Secure Exemptions

Texas Tech students who have become 21 within the past year or who will reach that age in 1958 are eligible for poll tax exemptions. A booth will be placed in

students Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The booth, in addition, sponsored by Alpha Phi Omega, men's service organization, will serve students and faculty who want to pay their poll taxes and faculty-staff over 65 who also wish to apply for exemptions, announced Bob Ford, APO member in charge of the booth.

## Jones Announces Tenure Committee

Tech President, Dr. E. N. Jones, announced that a five-man Tech faculty committee on tenure and privilege has been formed.

The committee includes Dr. Kline Nall, chairman; L. J. Powers, vice chairman; Dr. N. C. Eme, secretary; Dr. T. Earle Hamilton and Dr. Robert L. Rouse. Dr. Jones is an ex-officio member.

Tech Board of Directors authorized the committee on tenure and privilege in a policy approved last November 8.

The newly-appointed committee is responsible, along with the board and president, for a continuous study of pertinent problems and interpretation of the tenure policy and its application to individual situations.

Non-Lubbock County students who want exemptions must apply to their home counties. This may be done by writing the County Tax Assessor-Collector, who will give necessary data.

Deadline for all applications is midnight Saturday, January 31.

Officers to be elected include the governor, all other state officials, the United States Senator, U. S. Congressmen, all state representatives and some senators and a large number of local officers.

It is possible for a person who received an exemption last year to again receive one this year if he has not been 21 for more than 12 months.

## New Gym Now in Use; Pool Opening Awaited

Dr. Ramon W. Kirellis, head of the physical education department, refrains from announcing an opening

date for the swimming pool in the new gym since several dates had previously been announced but unexpected problems prevented it from opening.

All of the new gym is open except the swimming area and students may take advantage of the recreation period each day from 7 to 10 p.m. Once the pool is open any student may swim during the recreation hours at no charge. Qualified lifeguards which have American Red Cross Life-saving certificates will be on hand during the recreation time.

WEIGHT LIFTING is open to men from 4 to 5 p.m. as part of the recreation program. Eight sets of bar bells, dumbbells and pulley weights are available in the locker rooms.

Intramural basketball teams occupy the two basketball courts from 7 to 11 p.m. From 4 to 7 p.m. the freshman basketball team or the tennis team works out on the courts.

When the swimming pool opens, it will have a full schedule every day. Swimming classes will meet every MW and TT from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Varsity swimming practice is from 4 to 7 p.m. and recreation swimming follows that.

THE HEATED POOL is a regulation inter-collegiate pool, 72 by 42 feet with a seating area for 400 to 500 people.

Dr. Kirellis said that plans are being arranged for intramural swimming leagues next year. Also, plans are being made for intramural water polo in two years.

WOMEN WILL HAVE a try at intramural basketball next semester. Miss Ethel T. Rollo, instructor of physical education, announced

that the tournament is open to all women organizations and women students. Practice will be from 4 to 7 p.m. each afternoon and tournament games will be from 7 to 9 p.m. It will be sponsored by the women's physical education department.

Varsity and freshmen swimming team tentative schedules have been announced by Dr. Kirellis. The first home meet will be Feb. 1 when the freshman swim against New Mexico Military Institute.

Dr. Kirellis stated that he hoped a good crowd would attend this first meet.

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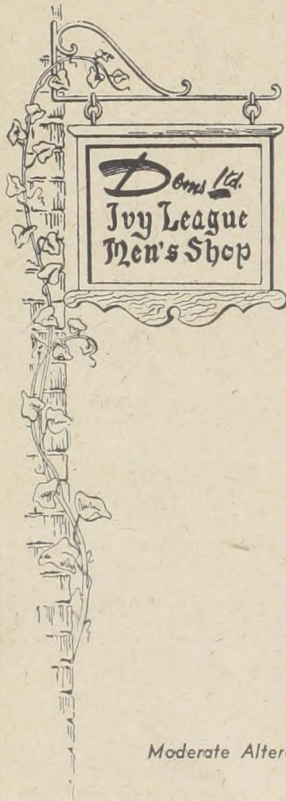

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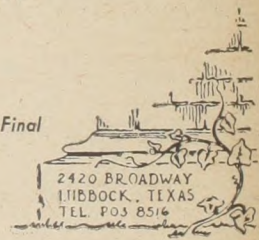

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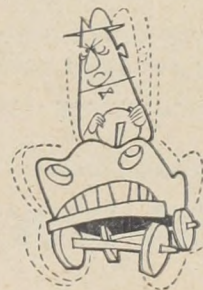
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## Athletic Committee Ousted at A&M

HOUSTON, Jan. 15 (AP) — The chairman of the board of directors of Texas A&M college today dissolved the board's athletic subcommittee.

"This action has been taken to clear up the confusion which has arisen concerning the responsibilities and authority of all concerned with the athletic program of A&M College," said Chairman W. T. Doherty of Houston.

His action followed by hours a demand by a prominent Texas A&M alumnus that five members of the A&M board of directors resign and Gov. Price Daniel's announcement he would ask for a full explanation from officials of the state-supported school.

MEMBERS OF the board's athletic subcommittee now dissolved are Jack Finney of Greenville, chairman; Herman Heep of Aus-

tin, L. H. Ridout, Jr., Dallas, and Price Campbell of Abilene. Doherty's statement, issued through college channels at College Station, also said:

"The athletic council of the college, made up of faculty members, has held and continues to hold the sole authority for recommending to the board through the president of the college, appointments to the coaching and administrative staff of the athletic department.

"The athletic subcommittee of the board was appointed to serve only in an advisory capacity to the athletic council and the president of the college.

It Tech can take advantage of the edge on the weaker teams, win their remaining games at home and post a win in either Fort Worth or Dallas they could take all the chips.

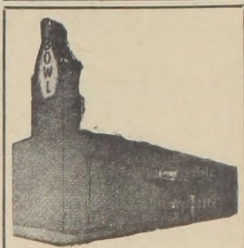

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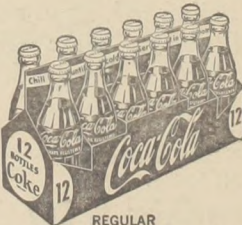
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
