Men's Dorm IV Wins First Prize In Yule Contest

Men's Dorm IV with its Santa and reindeer won first place in the Christmas decorations contest sponsored by Tech Chamber of Commerce. Women's Dorm IV took second place, with Women's Dorm III in third. Prizes were \$25 for first, \$15 for second and \$10 for third.

The winning dormitory has Santa's sleigh and reindeer on the ground near the door and old Saint Nick himself above the entrance, beside a lighted Christmas tree. Every window in the dorm has a wreath, candle, or some other lighted decoration.

In second place, Women's Dorm IV features three angelic carolers singing by the light of two street lamps and before a background of Christmas trees. The door is decorated with evergreen hangings and a wreath with red tinsel bells in the center.

Women's Dorm III took third place with its candy cane and "Merry Christmas." The huge peppermint cane, tied with a big red ribbon and a branch of mistletoe, hangs above the door, and is lighted by spotlights. A shiny "Merry Christmas" and colored lights surround the entrance.

Doak hall, too, has the Christmas spirit with blue spotlighted Christmas trees on each side above the door, lighted evergreens on the ground beside the door, and colored lights extending from roof of the building and surrounding the entrance. From a box below the blue trees, a "Merry Christmas" shines out behind red cellophane.

Sneed hall greets passersby with a "Merry Christmas" sign above the door and wreaths in all the windows on first floor.

Additional Dairies Said Supplement To Rural Farm Income In Meeting At College

An outline of the milk supply in Lubbock, together with the amount of money spent for dairy products outside the city milksheds, was given at an agriculture meeting Thursday afternoon in the aggie auditorium. Requirements for Grade A milk plus pointers on stock care were reviewed.

Dr. J. J. Willingham, professor and head of dairy manufactures, was one of the principal speakers. The meeting was called by County Agent D. W. Sherrill to stimulate interest in establishing dairies in the local area.

Sherrill said the meeting was called in an effort to get farmers of this area interested in dairy farming so that they might cash in on the thousands of dollars spent outside of Texas each month for milk coming into Lubbock.

Doctor Willingham discussed the milk supply situation here, and George Wilson of the Bell Ice Cream and Milk company told of the money spent in Lubbock for milk.

W. T. Hayden spoke on artificial breeding services offered in this region, and Walter Gardner of the city health department gave the requirements for Grade A products. Dr. P. G. Harbough, professor of animal husbandry, discussed diseases of cattle and how to avoid them.

"Much of the milk consumed in Lubbock daily is shipped here from as far away as Wisconsin, and Lubbockites pay the taxes as well as the price of the milk into the state," Doctor Willingham said.

Both he and Sherrill have expressed great interest in the establishment of small dairies in this region in order to supplement income of farmers who will perhaps have their cotton acreages cut next year.

"The city of Lubbock alone is consuming an ever-increasing amount of milk. There are big profits in the dairy business here if farmers will only take advantage of them," Doctor Willingham stated.

Two head of livestock are to be donated to the college in the near future for breeding purposes. A boar pig will be donated by E. S. Ballew, Hampshire breeder of Clarendon, and a quarterhorse filly is being given to the college by the Hess ranch of McLean.

Board Approves Tech Scholarship

Board of Directors approved a new scholarship, made available by Lubbock Bar Auxiliary, at its meeting Saturday Dec. 10, Ernest Wallace, chairman of the Scholarship committee, announces.

The scholarship pays \$80 annually, 50 per cent each semester, to a junior or senior woman student majoring in pre-law. The applicant must have and maintain a 2.0 or better grade point average. She must have a minimum of 30 hours in residence.

Mrs. J. O. Cade, representative for Lubbock Bar Auxiliary, negotiated with the college for the establishment of the scholarship.

The purpose is to encourage and assist young women of Lubbock in the field of law and to induce them to continue their studies in law.

Dr. Gene Hemmle, professor and head of music, is to conduct the choir and the Campusaires. Richard Richards, instructor in music, is to lead the glee club. The concert band is to be conducted by Prof. D. O. Wiley, director, and Joe Haddon, assistant director.

Plans Made
"It is our earnest desire to present an annual Christmas concert affording the student body of Texas Tech and the general public of Lubbock with an opportunity to hear the musical groups in performance in one single program.

"Plans are being laid for concerts presented by each of the major musical organizations within the department at Tech," said Doctor Hemmle.

The glee club will present "Lo, How A Rose E'er Blooming," an anonymous 16th-century melody harmonized by Michel Praetorius; "In Dulci Jubilo," an early carol; and "Angels O'er the Fields Were Flying," a Noel from France.

Choir Numbers Given
Offerings of the Tech choir are to include: "Dry Bones," "Soon Ah Will Be Done" and "Set Down, Servant," all Negro spirituals. Yuletide music by the choir will be: "O Come All Ye Faithful," the triumphant invocation of the Christmas festival; "Carol of the Bells," a Ukrainian folk carol; "Christmas Hymn," a German song; "Silent Night" and finally the "Hallelujah Chorus" from Handel's "Messiah."

The Campusaires' numbers will be: "Jesus, Jesus, Rest Your Head," a lullaby; "Waken, Little Shepherd" and "Rise Up, Shepherd, And Follower," the latter a spiritual.

Dr. E. N. Jones Answers Questions On New Cut System; Absences Counted

Questions have been raised concerning the new cut system, points out Dr. E. N. Jones, Tech vice president.

These are: (1) Who is to assess double cuts? and (2) Are instructors to report all absences including those that are excused?

If a student is absent before or after an official holiday, he is automatically assessed two cuts for each absence. This is a matter of bookkeeping which requires no discretion on the part of anyone, Doctor Jones explains.

The academic dean decides the effects of double cuts for freshmen and sophomores in keeping with the rule that 18 cuts may add the requirement of one extra credit hour for graduation.

Upperclassmen Exempt
A junior or senior student whose grade quality of work throughout the course has been good would not be held as accountable for absences, including double cuts, as would one whose grade quality has been poor, Doctor Jones states. This follows the principle that the same number of cuts does not necessarily result in the same penalty for all students.

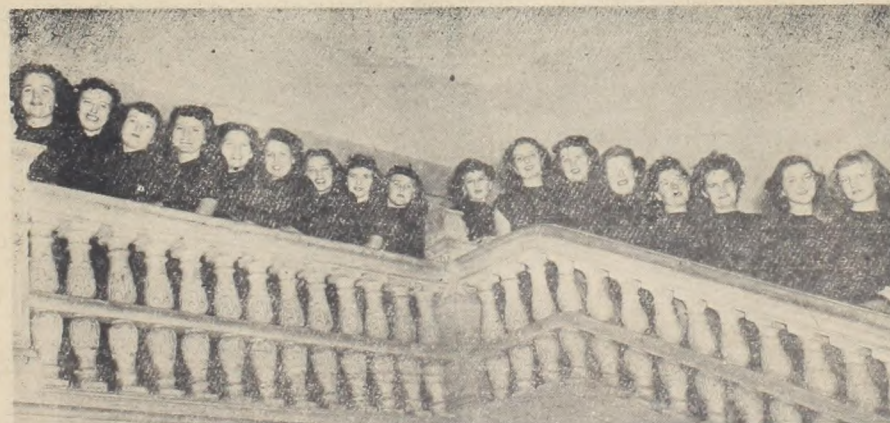
When judging the work of juniors and seniors, the discretion of the instructor comes into the picture with this knowledge of all

factors including the student's general attitude in the course, the punctuality with which assignments have been met, and the consistency of application in the course in addition to lecture sessions, explains Doctor Jones. A student who makes a specified number of absences would not automatically have his grade lowered from A to B or B to C, the vice president adds.

Student Cooperation Sought
Instructors are to report all absences including those that are excused. The total is to be indicated on the special IBM absence report card which each instructor will receive for each student near the end of the semester, Doctor Jones says.


In the case of freshmen and sophomores, the academic dean has a record of all excused absences. The instructor will know the total number of absences and the number which are excused for juniors and seniors. He will use his own discretion in determining the effect, if any, of the number of unexcused absences on the grade record of the student.

This follows the principle of attempting to inject into the student mind a spirit of doing the right thing, including class attendance, because he ought to do so rather than simply to evade or just keep within a regulation, Doctor Jones points out.

Henderson Will Meet Bertolino Monday In State Lightweight Championship Bout

Techsan Now Has Thirty Victories

Monday night in the Chapman fieldhouse Bill Henderson, youthful mauler from Level-land and Texas Tech, gets his chance at one of the highest honors to be gained in Texas boxing circles, the lightweight championship of the Lone Star state.

His opponent will be Eddie Bertolino, a Galveston product, who is the number one ranking lightweight in the state. Bertolino, in spite of his 21 years, is a veteran campaigner of the squared circle, and Henderson will have to go at top speed if he is to win the coveted crown.

Henderson, on the other hand, of pro fighting stands at approximately fifty won and only five lost. In his ring, Bertolino has beaten such men as Chief Gordon House, former state champion, and Keith Hamilton. Of the five bouts that he has lost, Bertolino has later reversed the verdict in return engagements in all five. Since the contract calls for a return bout in Galveston, should Henderson beat him, Bertolino places much stock in his ability to solve a fighter style.

Techsan Has Lost Only Two
Though Henderson's record does not embrace the class of fighters that Bertolino's does, he has compiled a very good record against some of the better competition in the state. In 32 professional fights, Henderson has lost only two and they were to the former French lightweight champion, Jean Mouglin. Among his victories, Henderson numbers such men as Manny Ortega, Jeep O'Neil, and Sammy Galvan.

Bertolino arrived Wednesday and went through a two round sparring session with Leonard Duncan, middleweight. He displayed a flashing right hand and a snappy left took mixed with a good left jab. Though giving away about 30 pounds, Bertolino used his ring savvy to handle the slower Duncan with ease on the inside, and was able to do some damage of his own at close quarters.

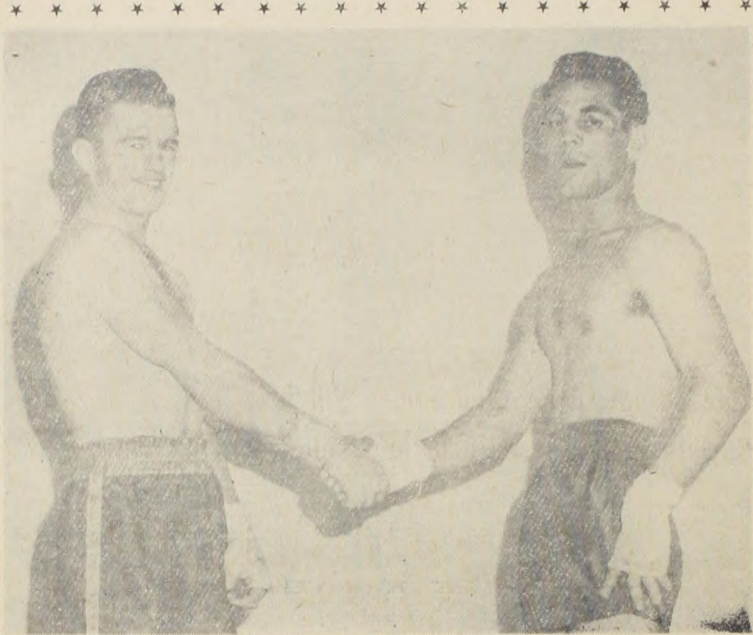
About Same Speed
Bertolino's record in four years is the slugger type fighter who likes to measure his opponent from long range, and blast away. He possesses a lightning left jab, and, as most of his victims can agree, murder in his right.

Both boys seem to be about equal in speed, and about the same size, with Bertolino standing just a little taller.

Promoter Edd Sides has announced that three bouts will support the 15-round main go. Duncan will meet Young Amado of El Paso in a rubber match. Amado holds the only win over the Hale Center middleweight, and in both previous battles they mixed it up freely.

In two four round events, Juan Herrera of El Paso will meet Enrique Morales of San Antonio, and Joe Chaplin of Shreveport will meet Jimmy Moreland, of Lubbock.

Tickets are scaled at \$4, ringside, \$3, reserved and \$2 for general admission. They are on sale at Hub clothing, Tech drug, and City Club, Lynn.

Raiders Gain Season's Third Win

Tech's basketballers, behind the sharp-shooting of Center Gene Gibson, chalked up their third victory of the season Tuesday with a stubborn Wayland Pioneer crew, the 88-60 victim.

The Raiders took an early lead and were never challenged until early in the second half when Wayland put on a scoring spree to pull abreast 33-31 and again 32-33. The Raiders then opened up and built up a margin that the Pioneers were unable to overcome.

Gibson's 17 points on 7 field goals and three tosses gave him the scoring honors for the Raiders. But scoring honors of the night

went to the Pioneer's Ed Billings who bucketed 19 points.

Verdell Turner turned in a top defensive game for the Raiders as well as tossing in 10 points to help out his team's cause.

The Raiders jumped into a 17-3 lead early in the game but Wayland staged a comeback late in the half to pull within 5 points at intermission. The halftime score was 26-21 with Tech leading.

Accuracy from the free throw line proved to be a leading factor in the Raider victory. Of the 18 free tosses awarded them, only 4 were missed. The Pioneers cashed in on 10 of their 15 charity shots

Sports Chatter

Friday morning Morley Jennings, athletic director, Dr. William Davis, president of the athletic council, Coach Morgan, and Sports Publicity director Clark Schooley left for the annual Border conference meeting in El Paso among the things they will discuss will be track, football and basketball schedules plus any matter that concerns the welfare of the conference.

The latter of which promises to cause some fireworks, if advance indications are correct. Hardin-Simmons university will be trying, as she did last year, to get the conference to change the present eligibility rule. What the whole rucus is about is the fact that H-SU has one basketball player, "Slats" Stagner, who she wants to be eligible for play this year. Under the present rule, he is ineligible. The aforementioned rule which was adopted in 1946 by an unanimous vote said in effect that any scholastic hours accrued while in the service would be counted toward varsity eligibility. This was done in an effort to have many returning servicemen eligible for varsity ball their first year rather than playing a year of freshman ball. Stagner was in this category, and as a result, used up his eligibility last year.

Now Hardin-Simmons is trying to get the rule changed, whereby Stagner will be eligible for play this year. What isn't being taken into consideration are opponents of Hardin-Simmons however is the fact that not only H-SU but just about every team in the conference has athletes in the same positions. We, for instance, have three or four boys who would fall under such a ruling. Dan Pursel is one of them, and we would certainly like to see a two time all-Border conference selection return for another year. Still we don't believe that the rule should be set aside, now that the boys have received all the benefit from it that they are going to receive. What is sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander, to coin a phrase.

By a vote of eight to one, Hardin-Simmons being the only dissenting vote, the conference voted at the last meeting to retain the old rule. It is expected to retain the rule again this year, but not without a fight by the Baptists.

The all-Border conference made its appearance Wednesday, and to be different than the rest of the sports scribes in this area, we are somewhat surprised, agreeably of course. We actually expected to see only Marshall Gettys and Dan Pursel on the first team. We thought that if anyone deserved it, End Conley did, but nevertheless we thought he would be left out.

The fact that only four men out of the championship team were selected is a good indication of the team play that Tech is noted for. Some people argue that it would be better if we had an individual star to act as a sparkplug. The only thing wrong with that is what usually happens to a team that has its sparkplug stopped. It usually comes apart at the seams. On the other hand it is somewhat disconcerting to opposition scouts to report back that his team must stop not one or two men but nine or ten. That is the situation that existed here at Tech this year.

For instance look at the other backs in addition to Cal Stevenson and Conley — Tim Hatch, J. W. Thompson, Earl Jackson, Herman Bailey, Ike Stuver, Bobby Close, Eural Ramsey, Bill Lyman, Milton Rathbone, Ernest Hawkins, and Walter Maloney.

We were disappointed that more of the linemen didn't get mentioned such men as John Andrews, Bobby Williams, and Jerrell Price are hard to beat, but with a two platoon system like the Raiders employ it is to be expected.

The Los Cams won the battle of the touch gridiron, but they feel that they have lost the battle of the publicity. We are sorry boys if you feel that your names should be in print more often, but we have almost 6,000 students to serve here at Tech.
