





## Texas State Golden Gloves Enters Finals Tonight

LUBBOCK'S Golden Gloves delegation, with three Tech fighters included, go into the finals tonight in the state Golden Gloves tournament at Fort Worth.

The fighters arrived in Fort Worth Wednesday and were weighed in at the Golden Gloves gymnasium where approximately 125 fighters from all parts of the state registered for fights in all divisions.

Preliminary bouts found Roland Borger, Tech's flyweight, facing Abner Bedingfield of Dallas. Keith Kivlehen, featherweight from Tech, drew a fight with Henry DeLane of Orange. Rhea Mitchell,

Tech's light-heavyweight, who has made the same trip twice before, but as heavyweight each time, will meet Bill Anderson of Fort Worth in a preliminary bout.

**Other Lubbock Fighters**

Other Lubbock area fighters include La Vern Roach of Plainview who meets the renowned Roger Sanchez of San Antonio in the bantamweight preliminary. Tech's light weight contender, Buford Bradshaw, of Littlefield tackles William Clark of Tyler.

Roy Belk of Plainview meets Junior Montague of Wellington from the Childress circuit in the first welterweight fight of the evening. J. D. Kirkpatrick, Lubbock's middleweight drew a bye in the preliminary matches and fought his first fight last night.

J. G. Ward, Floydada heavyweight, on the Lubbock ticket, meets the famed Austin O'Jibway, Fort Bliss soldier originally from St. Ste. Marie, Michigan, who is regarded as one of the most likely contenders in the tournament.

**Thirteen Teams Added**

Thursday night's Golden Gloves battling started at Will Rogers coliseum with 13 additional teams brought into contention.

## Eligibility Question Hits On Red Raider Grid Squad

All over the nation controversies are arising between colleges advocating the eligibility of freshmen for varsity football and those opposed to it.

Heading the forces of those opposed to first year varsity eligibility is Wallace Wade, coach of the Duke Blue Devils, host team in the transplanted Rose Bowl game.

Wade argues that a year's seasoning is essential in order to cut down injuries. He also states that freshmen have a hard enough time adjusting themselves to college life, and with the speeded up schedule of most schools in lopping from six to eleven months off the time required for graduation, freshmen will be taking heavier

courses and football would detract from their studies.

On the other side of the fence is Dick Harlow, head mentor at Harvard, who foresees a necessity for freshmen of the varsity especially in the smaller schools. By mixing the better frosh players with the more seasoned, the standards of the game can be upheld, says Harlow.

Coming closer to home we find the Southwest conference divided on the question. University of Texas and Texas A&M lead the "nays" while Baylor and some of the smaller schools wholly approve of frosh participation on the varsity.

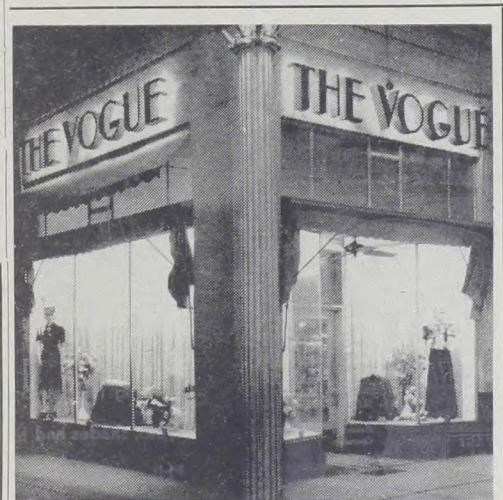
