## Purina Research Fellowships Open To Tech Students

Eligible Tech students may apply now for Ralston Purina company research fellowships of \$1440 which are to be awarded annually to seven individuals.

## Smiling Lion, Caesar Provide New Touch For Ancient Story

A simpering Caesar and a friendly lion put a new light on the ancient story of Christian martyrs in Rome, written by the late George Bernard Shaw and presented in memoriam to him by the speech department at 8 p.m. through Friday night in the Speech auditorium.

"Androcles and the Lion," the second play to be presented this semester, is directed by Miss Cecilia Thompson. Frank Burton turns in a remarkable performance as Androcles, the timid tailor with a love for animals. The lion, Jack McCabe, roared and growled convincingly as a lion but won his audience with a charm no lion ever possessed.

Jo Simmons, alternately a flirt and an outstanding Christian martyr, injected into her part a humanness not expected of Lavinia in her romance with the Roman Captain, ably portrayed by Warren Forsythe.

Although written in a half-serious vein, this fable of Shaw's contains all the elements of good drama and comedy as well, with Jake Sitters as a cowardly Roman and Richard Alexander playing a mar-

tyr afraid of dying in his sleep and therefore not getting into Heaven. Carl Pool as Ferrovius, a huge man with a terrible temper who makes Christians of unbelievers with his inhuman strength, is a competent characterization.

An arrogant ox-driver, played by Gerald Wayne Tippett, was a bit part that lifted the first act completely off the shoulders of more featured players.

But the real show was stolen by the simpering, girlish Caesar, played by Red Wright, who lifted up his robe in fright at the sign of the playful lion and screamed for his men to see his bravery after Androcles had completely subdued the dreadful beast with baby talk and calm words.

Others in the cast include Anita Pope, Jim Choate, John Southall, David Blackburn, Ivan Chiles, Archie Muncy, Tommy Carnahan, Helen Brown, Hattie Oblenbusch, Margaret Bourland, Don Thompson, Dilly Jo Price and Charles Anderson.

Excellent acting, direction, lighting and costumes make "Androcles and the Lion" one of the best productions ever presented by the speech department.

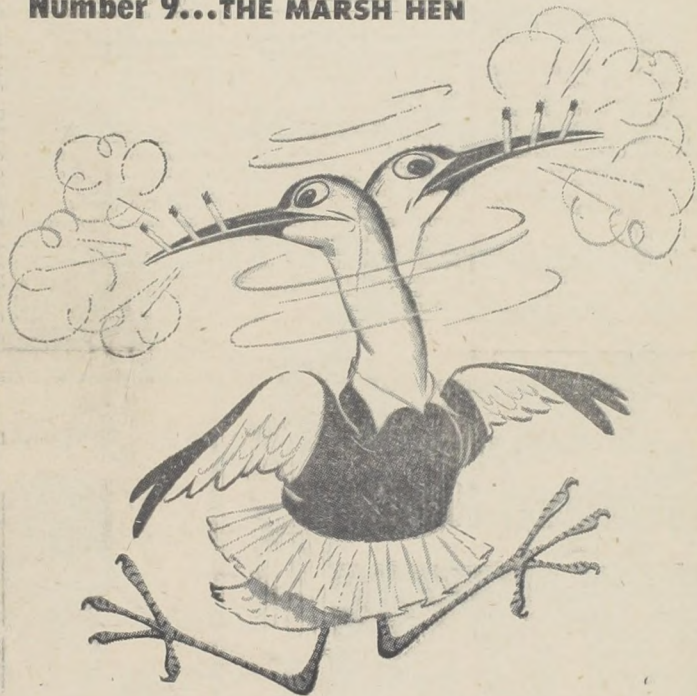

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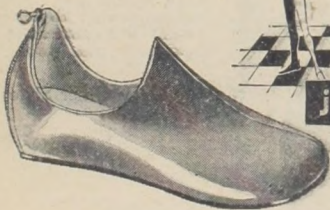

### TEACHERS' WAGES

Doctors Wiggins is attending a meeting in Austin this week which may mean an improvement in standards for teachers at Tech.

The Gilmer-Alkon law has standardized salaries for elementary and secondary teachers, but state colleges have been more or less isolated from the action. The Austin meeting will, no doubt, result in some sort of plan to help college instructors, and we hope it does a good job of it.

Instructors are by no means paid starvation wages at Tech, but they are expected to keep up a high standard of living on the sum they do get. Instructors with families probably have some amount of trouble getting the budget to balance—a budget which must cover not only food, housing and clothing, but a multitude of other expenses connected with the profession of teaching. Books, professional publications, concerts, professional organization dues and many other cultural efforts must be paid out of the instructor's salary. Even though such professional dues may be deducted from income tax, the expenditure must be made anyway.

Tech has many outstanding instructors, but more of them would be given an incentive to go away for additional study, then return to Tech, if salaries were scaled by experience and education. Other outstanding instructors might also be encouraged to come to Tech if an assurance of satisfactory wages were given him.

### ANONYMITY

Several letters have come to the editor to be published in the letters column. But the letters could not be run because the writer did not sign his name. In two cases,

the letters were signed, but the student directory and Lubbock telephone directory failed to contain the writers' names. As has been stated in The Toreador, all letters must be signed, though a request may be made to omit the names when the letters are published.

One writer went so far as to make up a fictitious name and address. When the registrar's office could not find such a person enrolled, we decided to try to call upon the person at the address he signed. The address turned out to be a vacant lot, so the writer of the letter gained nothing at all by authoring a letter on a controversial subject. Besides choosing an anonymous name and address, it looked as if he signed the letter left-handed.

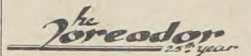

Possibilities of scholarships, the field of fashion careers and Tobe Coburn school will be topics of discussion by Miss Lunt.



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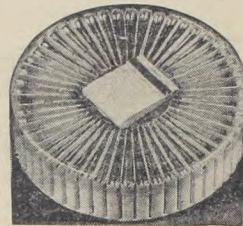
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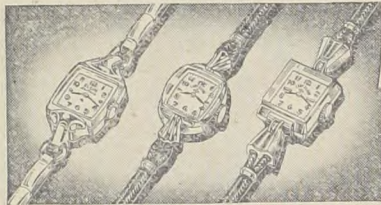
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### Baptists Rank First In Tech Enrollment With 34 Per Cent; Methodists Second

#### Army Reservists Receive Extension

War news isn't all bad. This is brought out by the announcement made Wednesday by Colonel C. M. Culp, chief of the Texas Military district, concerning Army reservists.

Reservists who have received orders to report to active duty stations during the holiday season are authorized to delay their departure until Jan. 5, 1951, Culp said. All individuals receiving active duty orders are being notified.

This extension does not concern reservists ordered to report to embarkation ports for duty overseas. These are required to comply with the original orders.

It does apply, however, to reservists previously ordered to duty who had been given authorized delays that would require them to report during the holidays. They may further delay their departure until Jan. 5, the announcement said.

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### Sports Slants

In many respects, football is just like war.

When the leader of one group falls, or loses support of his backers, the whole group tumbles, just like a string of Alpine mountaineers.

So, with Dell Morgan's resignation comes the customary conclusion that his staff likewise, must seek greener pastures.

When a new coach is hired, it is generally foregone that he receives not only a handsome financial offer, but also the privilege of hiring his own assistants. It might be well here to note the importance of assistants to a winning football team.

It's been said, and probably rightly, that the head coach no longer is a coach in the strictest sense, but rather is an organizer, who must be part psychologist and public relations expert. Then, and usually mentioned last, he must have a good background in football.

Under such a setup, the assistant coaches actually build the team and serve as teachers, giving their men not only fundamentals, but drilling them in the particular strategy mapped out by the head coach.

This is not to detract from the greatness or near greatness of the nation's top mentors, nor to minimize their job in any way. We merely illustrate, perhaps much too simply, the importance of a competent assistant coaching staff.

Only freshman coach George Scott was available for comment, but he has no immediate plans for the future. He also intimated that his associates on this year's staff are likewise undecided.

Coach Scott, whose record incidentally is quite enviable, did make some other observations.

He pointed out that while his freshman team this year was short of linemen, they would definitely help the varsity next season. Prospects for backs and ends look better than for the usually brawnier positions.

This, of course, will be true only if the boys are not wearing army khaki next fall. Scott feels that probably 75 per cent of his freshmen this year will be in service then.

Such a situation is not all bad, he said, remarking that at least it would even things up. All colleges, regardless of their magnificent recruiting machines, will have only 17 and 18 year olds, and a few 4-F's.

Not a very pretty picture, we'd say, but true, none the less.

There were 116 applications for the coaching positions left open in 1941 when Pete Cawthorn and three other coaches announced their resignation.

## Raiders Stomp Mountaineer Five 74-38 In Friday Tilt

Paced by the shooting of guard Jack Alderson and center Paul Nolen, Tech's Red Raiders coasted to a ridiculously easy 74-38 victory over Colorado Western's hustling Mountaineers at Tech gym Friday night.

Raiders pulled from behind a 4-3 lead taken by the Mountaineers in early moments of the game and worked steadily to pile up a comfortable 31-22 halftime lead which was never seriously threatened.

Towering Paul Nolen starred once again for the Tech courtmen. Grabbing rebounds almost automatically the Raider pivotman proved responsible for a large number of Tech scores by starting fast breaks and tapping in follow-up shots.

Alderson pushed Nolen for scoring honors. Again finding the jump shot which last year was so valuable to him, the Raider guard poured 20 points through the hoop, second only to Nolen's total of 25. Other high scorers for the Tech-

sans were forwards Virgil Johnson and Verdell Turner with 11 and 10 points respectively.

Tremendous improvement in defensive work and general ball handling was evident in Raider work. Spectacular defensive jobs were turned in by guards Jim Eddins and Jack Little.

Each of the sophomores repeatedly stole the ball from Western players. Little swiped the show as well with his pesky work in late moments of the game.

Eddins, who ordinarily never shoots, was more evident on the offensive against Western. Though credited with few points, Eddins took more shots than usual, opening to conjecture the idea that he may be being groomed for the contested starting guard position.

Raider forward Verdell Turner again turned in a steady performance, filling in with field goals where teammates failed and grabbing rebounds missed by Nolen.

Most noticeable improvement in the team was the increased workability of plays. Nolen's increased ball handling efficiency left teammates open for more scoring attempts.

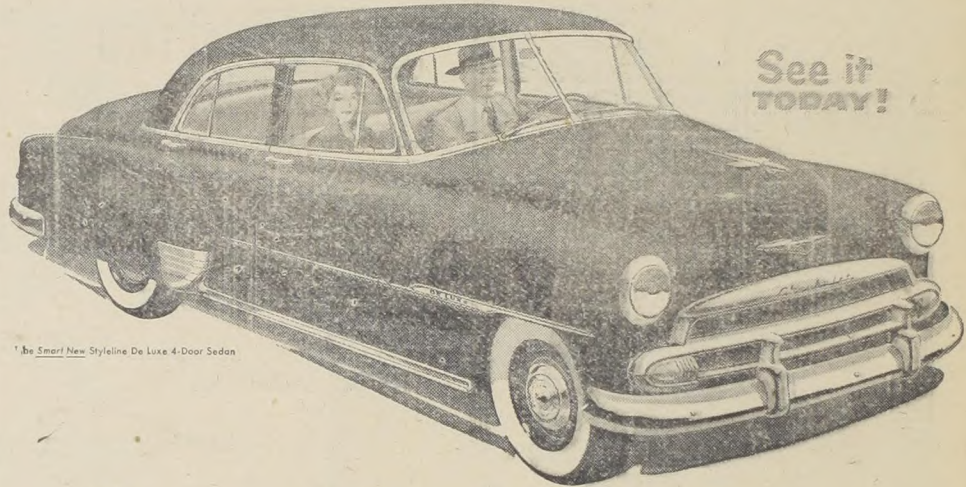

A game between Sneed west and Dorm III, also scheduled for the same day, was postponed.



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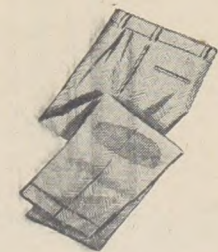
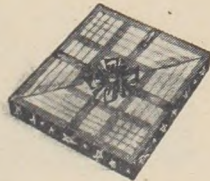
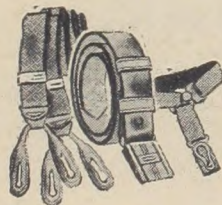
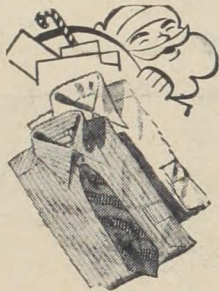
