

Rules Committee Appointed

Appointment of a special elections committee, Spring Festival plans and approval of a student insurance program were subjects of the Student Council meeting Tuesday night.

The special elections committee is made up of Council members not running in present elections. "The special committee was appointed to give a perfectly fair representation to candidates," said David Thompson, Council president.

THE APPOINTMENT of such a committee of non-participating Council members was recommended by the Tech Supreme Court last spring at a trial between the Council and a candidate over a disagreement on election rules.

"The purpose of the committee is to see that the election regulations, given to each candidate with petitions, are observed, and that they will be followed to the letter," Alexander said.

Any special publicity must be submitted to the Student Council in writing, Alexander added.

The committee will meet April 8, 5 p.m. to approve all special campaigning. There will be another meeting April 9 if needed, and after this candidates with unauthorized publicity will be automatically disqualified.

Committee members are Wick Alexander, chairman; Jacky McAninch, agriculture; Gerald Myers, Arts and Sciences; Lynn Elliott,

engineering; Carolyn Williamson, home economics.

EXPENSE ACCOUNTS are due in April 14, 5 p.m. Elections are April 16, and run-offs will be April 23.

The regular Elections Committee is investigating possibilities of holding a political rally prior to the election.

Also, the Pre-Law Club, in cooperation with the government department, is sponsoring speeches in government 233-234 classes by candidates giving their platforms. Speeches will be at the first five

or ten minutes of class periods. Forms with hours may be picked up at the Council office.

ALL MAJOR offices are contested. In president's race are Donnell Echols and Neal Pipkin. Running for vice president are David Steinman and John Offerle.

Business Manager candidates are Dan Howard and Roger Loter. Four contestants are running for secretary, with Gail Petersen, Mary Catherine Birkelbach, Rosa Elia Riojas and Leta Merle Roberts in the race.

With the cooperation of the Tech School of Agriculture, the Pavilion has been made available for the speech department's experimental effort of staging "Macbeth" in simulated Elizabethan setting.

The Pavilion was chosen for its resemblance to the renowned Globe Theatre in London where many of Shakespeare's plays were produced. The actual stage area will be patterned after drawings and models of the famous theatre and will feature double stages located at the east end of the Pavilion with seating area on the sides and in the "pit," similar to the arrangement in the days of Elizabeth I.

At Engineering Show

Atom Exhibit Featured

Tech's Engineering Show, to be held during the Spring Festival this year, will provide South Plains residents with an opportunity to see the possibilities of the peaceful atom.

The main attraction of the show on April 18 and 19 will be the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission's newest traveling exhibit, entitled, "Atoms for Peace." The exhibit will be located at the Naval Armory on the Tech campus and the public is invited to see the displays.

THE MAIN exhibit wall in the armory consists of 7,000 square feet of presentation space. There will be 80 panel displays, some animated. The displays will include developments in nuclear energy technology.

Children as well as adults will understand the exhibits easily. The visitor can push one button

and set off a demonstration of how a chain reaction works; another button lets him operate a 16-foot model of an atomic energy plant for producing electricity; a third button activates a visual and audible explanation of the use of radioisotopes in plant-fertilization studies.

THE ENGINEERING show will not be limited to the "Atoms for Peace" exhibit, however. Each department of the School of Engineering will sponsor an exhibit.

Civil engineering students will show visitors the dangers of quicksand, while students of chemistry will amaze onlookers with a magic show of scientific phenomenon.

One of the more beautiful exhibits of the show will be sponsored by the architectural engineers. They will construct an outdoor Japanese garden.

PROYOS, Tech rocket club, will display rockets of today and to-

morrow. Not only model rockets will be on exhibit, but with the help of the Army and Air Force, the club has been able to procure several atomic-powered rockets in use today, including the "Nike".

The art of fabric-dyeing will be shown by the textile engineers, and students of electrical engineering will operate a bus by remote controls.

THE FLUID Catalytic Cracking Process will be demonstrated by the chemical engineering department. This will be a model furnished by the Universal Oil Products Company and shows the process which changes oil to gasoline.

In charge of the Engineering Show are: Lynn Elliot, General Manager; Eddie Henson, Auditor; Kent Lawrence, Advertising; Gerald Seeman, Traffic Director; and Jess McIlvain.

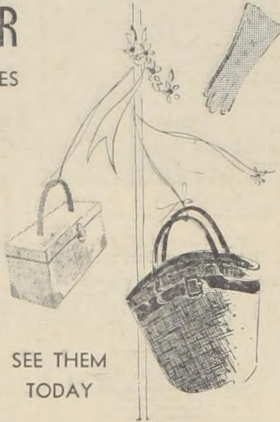
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Spring Pledges Chose Officers

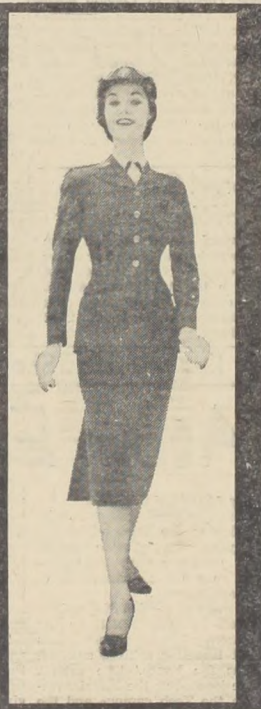

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Three To Attend St. Louis Meet

Three men will represent Tech at the American Personnel and Guidance Association meeting in St. Louis, Mo., March 31-April 4.

Dr. Robert P. Anderson, director of Tech's rehabilitation counseling training program, will be chairman of a session on academic and social adjustment of blind students.

Dr. James E. Kuntz, Tech associate professor of psychology and John Turner, graduate student in the rehabilitation training program, will also attend.

Turner will present a paper on current practices of colleges in training and educating blind students.

Tech's own graduate program in vocational rehabilitation counseling is one of two such programs in the state.

Raiders Compete In ABC Relays

Tech's thincads travel to Big Spring this weekend to compete in the ABC Relays, resuming competition with some of the track greats of the Southwest.

The Raiders' best performance in an event this year came at the Texas Relays last weekend when W. L. Thornton jumped six feet eight and three quarters inches to win the high jump event from the favorites Bertil Holmgren and Don Stewart of SMU and establish himself as a major high jump contender.

THE JUMP was the highest ever made by a Techsan and was only a fraction of an inch away from the meet record. Last year the Aspermont sophomore won the freshman division high jumps and won the same event in the SWC freshman meet.

The only other winner at Aus-

tin was the freshman mile relay team of Harold Donahoo, Charles Draper, Curtis Hart and Donnie Foster. The foursome clocked 3:18.2 to beat Texas and ACC.

Spring, Fan-Interest Mark Second Week of Softball

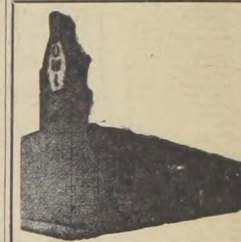
