### King Saud Gives Brother Control Of Government

CAIRO (AP) — King Saud has turned over to his brother, the pro-Egyptian Crown Prince Feisal, full control over the oil-rich Saudi Arabian kingdom's foreign, financial and internal affairs.

Cairo's press, reporting this Monday, said Feisal presented his elder brother, Saud, with a list of strong demands which, if authentic, might indicate Feisal is emerging as the kingdom's strong man.

The Saudi Arabian delegation at the United Nations confirmed the transfer of internal and domestic power to Feisal. Arab sources at the U. N. said Feisal now will have complete authority over the Saudi Arabian armed forces, but that Saud intended to remain head of the state.

### Governors Press Ike

AUSTIN (AP) — Twenty-two governors, who last summer asked President Eisenhower to limit oil imports, Monday again pressed for "prompt action" in reducing imports.

Gov. Price Daniel said his office sent a telegram to the president urging him to limit petroleum imports to the 1954 ratio.

"Many of us have asked Congress to require mandatory limitation of foreign oil imports, but the President does not have to wait for additional authority," Gov. Daniel said.

### Russia Speaks

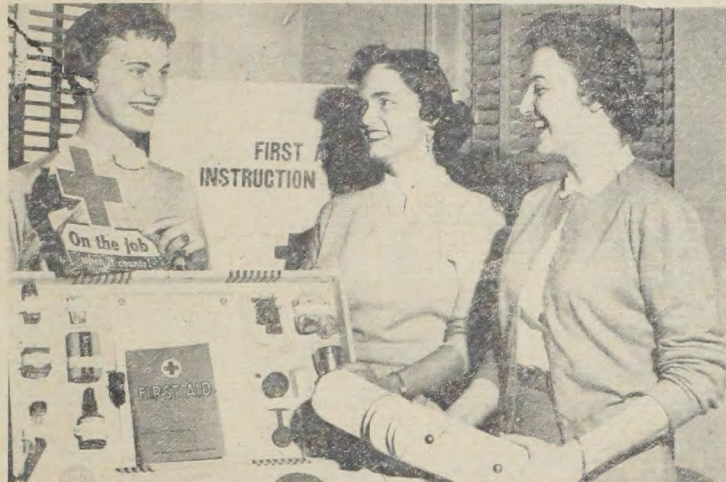
WASHINGTON (AP) — Russia broke its silence Monday and produced a formal reply to a U.S. demand to say what kind of a summit conference the Kremlin wants.

The reply was handed U.S. Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson. It was being translated in Moscow for transmission to Washington.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — America's rock 'n' roll idol held up his right hand today and took the oath that made him Pvt. Presley, Elvis A., serial No. U.S. 53310761.

Presley, 23, goes to Ft. Chaffee, located in northwest Arkansas. There he and other draftees and volunteers sworn in at the same time will have eight weeks of basic infantry training.

THE 14 DRAFTEES and 7 vol-

unteers left for Chaffee, riding in a chartered bus. Presley was appointed "private in charge."

The nation's celebrated draftee, whose voice hit a rock 'n' roll jackpot of more than 22 million records in less than three years, turned up half an hour early to begin his Army career.

## Illinois U. Fencers Take NCAA Title; Tech Ties for 12th

The University of Illinois captured the 14th Annual NCAA Fencing Tournament, held on the Tech campus last weekend.

Texas Tech tied Texas A&M for the top spot among teams from the Southwest.

The 23 points scored by Tech and A&M was good enough for 12th place in the tournament which had a total of 25 teams participating.

ART SCHANKIN, led the Illini with 22 points. He won each of his 22 matches to become the only undefeated fencer in the tournament.

The 47 points of the Illini was four more than second-place Columbia and five more than third-place Yale.

Yale Capt. John Norton, a standout in the foil, was named the "Fencer of the Year."

HE WAS also awarded the Illinois Memorial Trophy, presented to the fencer showing the best sportsmanship, neatest appearance, finest conduct on the strip and best record in past NCAA tournaments.

Division titles in addition to Schankin's saber championships, were won by Bruce Davis of Wayne State and R. R. Womack of the U.S. Naval Academy.

# Chief Predicts New Lots Will End Congestion

"I believe when the improvements currently under way on the parking lots are completed our parking problems will be solved," stated Foy Addison, chief of police at Tech.

The lots being improved are: (1) behind the science building, (2) in front of Drane, and (3) at the new gym.

Addison added, "We are currently giving between 50 and 200 tickets to Tech students each day. The worst days are Monday, Wednesday and Friday, when class attendance is the highest. In addition to these tickets, the Lubbock City

Police also patrol and give tickets."

All of the following areas are restricted to parking and are the scene of much violation. The students park there and get tickets.

- (1) The grassy area next to the paved lot south-west of the Chemistry Building.
- (2) The grassy area across the street from the above-named places. New lots will be laid in these areas.
- (3) Along the ditches next to the track field.
- (4) Across the street from the greenhouse west of the Music Build-

- ing.
  - (5) Outside the red buttons located on the paved parking lots.
  - (6) The curved street leading to 14th Street.
- (All of these areas are restricted to parking.)

After three tickets, the car loses parking privileges on the campus for one semester. The owner has to sign a restriction blank which is kept on file. If the car is found on the campus it is towed away.

Cars parked in restricted areas are subject to being towed away. The owner is charged a fee of \$2.50 plus 50 cents

a day for storage. A towing firm located at 500 N. College is under contract to do the work. Cars may be picked up at that address.

To alleviate the parking problem, three new paved lots which will accommodate 500 cars have been approved. Contracts have already been submitted for bids. The street leading to 14th Street will be closed and re-routed to 15th Street.

Seven other officers assist Addison in the fulfillment of his police duties. All the men have had previous police experience. There work in the day time and the others take night duty.

**CAPT. FOY ADDISON**, head of the Security-Traffic Department at Tech, a heavy-set man in his late 40's, sat behind his desk, took his well-worn pipe in his hands and said—"Students parking in staff areas is our greatest problem here at Tech."

He went on to say that some students get as many as seven or eight tickets a year.

Students may get their parking permit suspended by receiving three or more violation tickets.

**WHEN A STUDENT** receives three tickets he is sent a letter which notifies him that his car has been suspended from the campus and that all parking privileges are void.

The student is given seven days to return the letter along with parking tickets and permit before his file is sent to the dean's office.

**IF THE STUDENT** fails to comply with this ruling he is called to the dean's office and must explain why, or give valid reasons why he should not be expelled from school.

In many cases students continue to park on campus after parking privileges have been suspended. In this event a towing

service is called and the car is towed off the campus. The student must pay a \$250 fee to regain possession of his automobile.

The Security-Traffic Department is composed of eight officers and two vehicles which patrol the Tech campus.

**ACCORDING** to Captain Addison, "The department needs 15 men to adequately cover all traffic operations at Tech. At present we have two men covering the parking areas where four men are needed to do a better job."

The Security-Traffic Department is authorized to give both parking and moving violation tickets.

## Rural Children Are Better Adjusted Mentally

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) Dr. George A. Constant, a doctor specializing in child psychology, says rural children are better adjusted men-

tally because they have been under care of a family physician all their lives.

This reasoning was advanced by Dr. Constant Monday in a panel discussion before the American Academy of General Practice.

**DR. CONSTANT** is associate professor of pediatric psychiatry of the University of Texas.

He is a resident of Victoria. The panel was headed by Dr. Andrew S. Tomb, chairman of the assembly liaison committee on mental health and also a Victoria resident.

Dr. Constant also said, "By the time children today become teenagers they are completely spoiled, lack respect for ordinary discipline and believe the world owes them a living."

**SPARING THE** rod, in most cases, means sparing authority.

"The child grows up too fast. He is allowed to make decisions for himself in many instances when he wants a decision made for him."

He wants to be told what to do in areas where he lacks self-confidence," Dr. Constant emphasized.

**ANOTHER PANELIST**, Dr. John G. Young, clinical professor of pediatrics, Southwestern Medical School, Dallas, said parents must know how to approach problems, what attitudes to take, how to help.

"The doctor should be consulted, for he can help with the physical problems," Dr. Young said. "No teen-ager suffering from acne or overweight will turn away from this kind of aid."

Dr. Constant said in an interview preceding the panel, that "unfortunately, parents treat their teen-agers with a double set of conflicting values."

On the one hand they treat them like kids, and on the other hand they expect them to act like

adults. Teen-agers don't know what to do."

Among other reports today: Dr. Daniel Blain, medical director of the American Psychiatric Assn., Washington, said many elderly persons with the appearance of sanity are suffering instead from severe reactionary depression and that a cure is relatively simple and treatment nearly always successful.

Dr. George A. Hallenbeck of the Mayo Clinic staff at Rochester, Minn., said that if various ailments of the elderly are known in advance of operations, surgery is as safe as for younger persons.

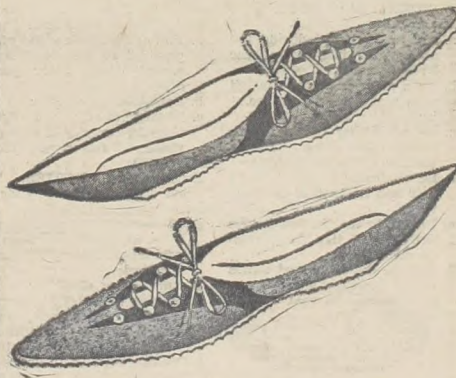

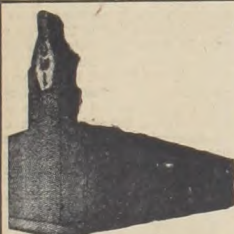

# Constitutional Revisions

Below are the proposed revisions to the present Student Association Constitution. Voting on the revisions will be April 16 at the general election. The publishing of the revisions is in compliance with the Constitution.

**PRESENT**  
Section 101: MEMBERSHIP. The Student Association shall consist of all undergraduate students who are duly registered in Texas Technological College. Any Graduate student shall be entitled to vote but shall not be entitled to hold any office.

**PROPOSED**  
Section 101: MEMBERSHIP. The Student Association shall consist of all undergraduate students who are duly registered in Texas Technological College. Any graduate student shall be entitled to vote but shall not be entitled to hold any office.

**PRESENT**  
Section 205. SECRETARY TO PRESIDENT. There is hereby authorized to be employed a secretary to the President who shall be appointed by the registrar of the college and the President of the Student Association. The secretary shall be appointed as soon as possible after the beginning of the fall semester and shall serve throughout the fall and spring semesters of the college year.

The secretary shall perform such duties as may be delegated by the President and shall, with the consent and help of the registrar, check eligibility of students in the registrar's office.

**PROPOSED**  
Section 205. SECRETARY TO PRESIDENT. There is hereby authorized to be employed a secretary to the President who shall be appointed by the President of the Student Association. The secretary shall be appointed as soon as possible after the beginning of the fall semester and shall serve throughout the fall and spring semesters of the college year.

The secretary shall perform such duties as may be delegated by the President and shall, with the consent and help of the registrar, check eligibility of students in the registrar's office.

**PRESENT**  
Section 207. DUTIES OF VICE PRESIDENT. The Vice President shall:

- Act as President during the absence or inability of the President;
- Be a member of the Council with a voice and vote therein;
- Be a member of the Publications Committee with a voice and a vote therein;
- Be chairman of the Student Life and Recreation Committee;
- Report to the Council on the activities of the above named committees;
- Assume the office and duties of the President should a vacancy occur in that office.

**PROPOSED**  
Section 207. DUTIES OF VICE PRESIDENT. The Vice President shall:

- Act as President during the absence or inability of the President;
- Be a member of the Council with a voice and vote therein;
- Be student chairman of the Publications Committee with a voice and vote therein;
- Report to the Council on the activities of the above named committees;
- Assume the office and duties

of the President should a vacancy occur in that office.

**PRESENT**  
Section 214. DUTIES OF BUSINESS MANAGER. The Business Manager shall:

- Keep an accurate and complete record of all payments, receipts, and expenditures of the Council;
- Keep an accurate and complete record of the income from the sale of activity tickets and the allocation of money received from such sales;
- Be Chairman of the Budget Committee as provided in Article VI;
- Pay all money authorized by the Council; such payments to be signed by the Business Manager, the President, and the College auditor.

**PROPOSED**

- Keep an accurate and complete record of all payments, receipts, and expenditures of the Council;

b. DIVISION OF FUNDS: The apportionment of the funds available for executive officers' salaries shall be on the basis of percentages established by the Budget Committee and approved by the Council, the percentage allotted to each salaried officer being specified and stated in the annual student activity budget before the spring general election.

c. INTERIM PROVISIONS: The four Student Association executive officers serving at the time of the adoption of this amendment shall each be paid salaries of twenty dollars a month for the months April and May, 1958.

Instead of burning the calenders in disgust, my friend would have to burn the women; instead of the magazines, the red-light; And who wants to burn women?

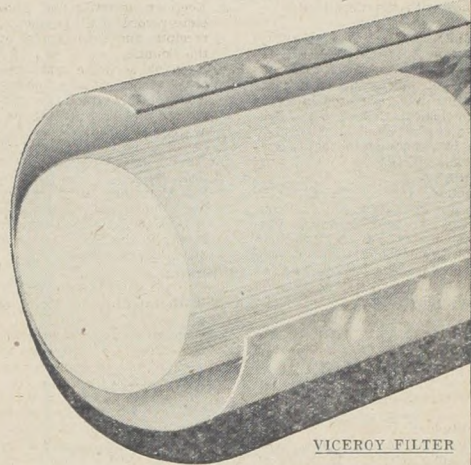
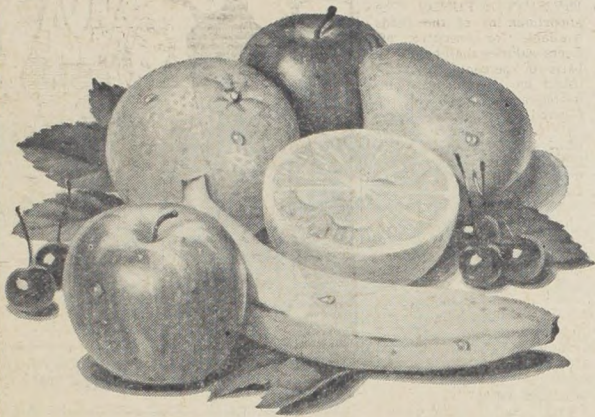

## Texas Relay Preparation Begins for Track Squads

Texas Tech's varsity and freshmen track teams began preparation yesterday for an appearance in the tremendous Texas Relays Friday and Saturday in Austin.

The varsity returned from Odessa late Saturday where they gathered but 16½ points in the West Texas Relays.

**THE RAIDERS** finished behind Texas (81 points), Abilene Christian College (51), SMU (36),

Houston (34), Baylor (22½) and North Texas State (19).

Raider finishers were E. H. Davis, fifth in the 100-yard dash; James Morris, fifth in the Broad Jump; and Dub Thornton, third in the high jump and James Leonard, who tied for fourth in the pole vault.

Tech's 440-yard relay team and mile relay team finished fourth and the sprint medley relay team placed fifth.

**THE HIGHLIGHT** of the meet was the performance of Andrews High School's relay teams. The Mustangs of Larry Shoemaker, Ray Ham, Tony Cain and Jerry Jetton ran a 42.6 in the preliminaries of the 440 Friday, then turned in a 42.7 on a wet track Saturday.

Their mile relay team, composed of Shoemaker, R. E. Merritt, Ronnie Brice and Jetton racked up a 3:22.5 Saturday. This was .2 of a second better than their preliminary time. Their sprint medley team also won with a 3:34.7.

Other headliners were, as usual, ACC's Bobby Morrow, winner of the 100-yard dash with 9.6; SMU's Bertil Holmgren, who won the high jump with a record-breaking 6 feet, 7½ inch jump; and Texas University's Joe Villarreal, whose 4:15.0 mile set a new record and Eddie Southern, who anchored the sprint relay team of Jimmie Holt, Wally Wilson and Drew Dunlap that set a new record of 3:23.0.

**HOUSTON'S JACK** Smyth leaped 24 feet, 4½ inches to set a new broad jump record.

Along with Texas in the University Division, East Texas State captured the College Division and Abilene won the High School Division.

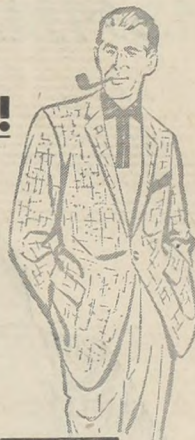

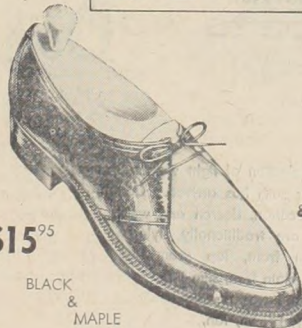

which there is no other provision made in this Constitution, and which may be deposited with an accredited investment agency with the approval of the Auditor and the Student Council.

**PRESENT**

Section 801. REVISION. Either by majority vote of the entire Council or by petition signed by ten per cent of the Student Association a proposal for constitutional revision may be submitted to the Student Association at the next general election. Adequate publicity must be given the proposal for at least three weeks before the election. Should the pro-

posal carry in the affirmative there shall be designated a constitutional committee consisting of three faculty members appointed by the President of the College, the President of the Student Association, and two other students appointed by the President. Revisions proposed by this committee shall be submitted to the Student Association for approval by the President of the College and a majority of the Council.

**PROPOSED**

Section 801. REVISION. Proposals to revise this Constitution may be initiated either by a majority vote of the entire Student

Council or upon application signed by ten per cent of the Student Association. Should the latter method be used, such application for proposal revision shall be approved by a majority of the Student Association at the next general election provided adequate publicity shall have been given to such proposed application for revision. If the application for revision be approved by one of the above methods, a Constitutional Committee shall be created consisting of three faculty members named by the President of the College, the President of the Student Association, and two other students named by the President of the Student Association. Revisions to the Constitution proposed by the Constitutional Committee shall be submitted to the Student Council for approval by a majority vote of that body, to the President of the College for his approval, and to the Student Association for its approval by a majority vote at a general election.
