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## Enrollment Statistics For Last 2 Years Show Interesting Results

Last Saturday afternoon enrollment in the Texas Technological college reached a total of 1760 students as compared with the 1389 students at the close of the second week of the year before. Of the 1760 students enrolled, 1015 are men and 745 are women. Of the 1389 students enrolled at the same date last year 867 were men and 522 were women. This shows a total increase of 391 students, or an increase of 148 men and 223 women. The enrollment according to schools and classes is as follows:
