President—HAROLD BRANNAN, junior from Dimmitt:

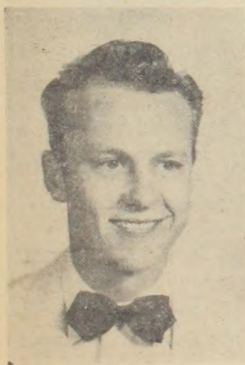

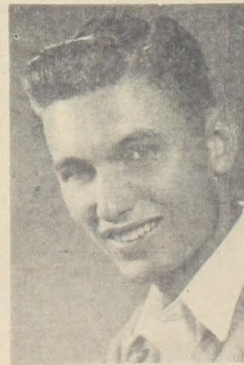

Miss Enochs would like more school spirit, the use of flash cards at games, having the cheerleaders appear at every game and more publicity for pep rallies.

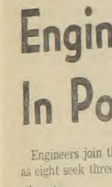
More student participation at pep rallies, use of flash cards, more school songs and the encouragement of freshmen and transfers to learn school songs is Miss Karnes' platform.

The added sections state that nominees for top student body offices must have petitions signed by five percent of the student body turned in two weeks previous to elections. Candidates for representative seats must have petitions signed by 100 persons turned in at the same time.
