# TU to Back Tech for SWC

## Kefauver, Taft Take Backseat Friday As Rag, Rally Bow to Tech Politicos

Campus politicos will make polished appeals to the student body Friday when The Toreador runs a special candidate's edition and a political rally is held at 7 p. m. in the Recreation hall.

Seventy Techsians will vie for six major campus offices and 20 Student council posts in elections next Friday. Four representatives will be selected from the Arts and Sciences division; three, Agriculture; three, Business Administration; three, Engineering, and two, Home Economics.

Candidates are urged to turn in pictures and platforms to The Toreador office J105, by 5 p. m., Wednesday. If a reporter is not in the office to receive the information, it may be tacked to the bulletin board, John Norcross, editor, announced.

Persons seeking the top positions of SC president, vice-president, secretary and business manager will be allowed six minutes at the rally to present their qualifications. Individuals may be aided in speeches by their campaign managers.

Hopefuls running for head boy and head girl cheerleaders also will display their talents at the annual politicians' round-up.

KTTG, campus radio station, is donating five minutes of program time to each candidate who wishes to present his views to the student body, Jess McVain, program director, said.

Interested persons may contact McVain in Gordon hall. Time available is between 7 and 11 p. m. each night except Saturday and Sunday.

Polls will open at 8 a. m. next Tuesday and remain open until 5 p. m. with the exception of the noon hour 12 to 1 p. m.

Dorsey, who began playing a trombone while still in knee pants, has produced over 300 recordings with his band. More than 70,000,000 copies of these records have been sold, with his all-time hit tune being "I'm Getting Sentimental Over You."

Vocalists to be featured in the April 30 concert are Frances Irvin and Charlie Shavers. Miss Irvin, a former resident of Amarillo, was "discovered" by Dorsey during a recent concert tour.

### Painter Abdicates Presidency of TU

Also at the Saturday meeting of the TU Board of Regents, Dr. T. S. Painter resigned as president. He said he wanted to return to his zoology laboratory which he left in 1944 to become head of the university.

Among the four mentioned as possible replacements for Dr. Painter were Dr. D. M. Wiggins, president of Texas Tech. Dr. Wiggins was considered for the post in 1945, when the university was seeking a permanent president to replace Dr. Homer P. Rainey who left the university under fire of the regents. Dr. Painter finally consented to take the post permanently in the spring of 1945.

Dr. Wiggins said in regard to the mention of his name, "I have a job to do at Tech that is not finished."

The other three mentioned for the job are Dr. J. C. Dolley, vice-president of the university and now being mentioned for president of the University of Arkansas; Dr. Wilson H. Elkins, president of Texas Western college in El Paso; Dr. C. P. Boner, dean of the college of arts and sciences and head of the defense research laboratory at UT.

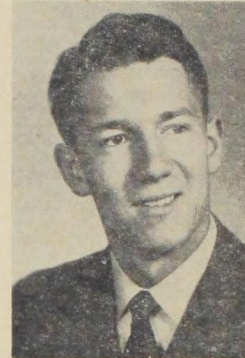
