## Directors Name Dr. Wiggins To Tech Foundation Board

Dr. D. M. Wiggins, former Tech president, was approved as a member of the Tech Foundation Board by the college Board of Directors in a meeting held here Saturday.

His name was recommended by C. T. McLaughlin, chairman of the Foundation Board. Mr. McLaughlin also proposed the names of three prospective recipients of honorary degrees. The proposal was

approved by the board, and announcement of the names will be made upon their acceptance.

Other business transacted at the meeting included the approval of a recommendation calling for mandatory health certificates, permitting Negroes to participate in intercollegiate athletics here as members of opposing teams, and the authorizing of the use of Jones Stadium for a Negro all-star game and the Gainesville Circus.

### Health Certification

The resolution on health certification requires that health data and smallpox vaccination be required of all students entering college for the first time. It also stated that T.B. chest X-rays will be required each fall semester, effective in 1953.

The recommendation to allow colored members of opposing teams to participate in intercollegiate athletics was a result of letters from DeWitt Weaver, director of athletics, and Dr. J. William Davis, chairman of the Athletic Council. Both Mr. Weaver and Dr. Davis pointed out that many difficulties were being encountered in scheduling home games with Border Conference as well as non-conference opponents.

The board authorized the use of Jones Stadium for a Negro all-star football game sponsored by the South Plains Lions Club, and for the Gainesville Circus May 8 and 9, which is sponsored by the Lubbock chapter of Disabled Veterans.

### Buildings Approved

Other action by the board included the approval of the East Engineering and the Petroleum Buildings, and the authorization of payment on each contract upon certification of the architect; the appointment of R. Briggs Irvin as part-time legal counsel for the college; and the acceptance of the new Science Building with the stipulation that only 90 per cent of the contract be paid. The other 10 per cent is to be paid upon completion of several minor revisions and adjustments.

## Mr. Tate Finishes Doctoral Program

Donald J. Tate, head of secretarial education, has received official notice of his completion of the requirements for a Doctor of Education degree at New York University.

Dr. Tate's dissertation consisted of 107 job analyses of secretarial positions. He interviewed secretaries in New York City; Denver, Colo.; Wichita, Kan., and Salt Lake City, Utah.

Dr. Tate has a Bachelor of Science and Commerce degree from Kansas State Teachers College, Emporia, Kan. and a Master of Business Administration degree from New York University.

## Tech Wins Battle Of Blood... Finally

Tech's Air ROTC students won the blood donations contest recently in which they were challenged by the air cadets at North Texas State College, Lt. Col. C. A. McClelland, associate professor of air science and tactics, revealed today.

An earlier announcement stating that Tech had been defeated was repudiated by a letter from the commanding officer of the North Texas group. North Texas donated 184 pints of blood from a group of 791 cadets. Tech's donation from 750 cadets was 240 pints of blood.

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# Raiders Smother Wolfpack

Tech's Red Raiders hit their offensive peak Saturday as they asted an impotent North Carolina State eleven, 54-7.

The Raider victory ended a poor season on a high note with the powerful Tech attack rolling up 16 yards on the ground and in the air. The Techsans scored two touchdowns in every quarter with several long runs figuring in the scoring.

The Raider bench was cleared as 10 players saw action in the contests. Vicious blocking, outstanding pass plays, and a fistfight highlighted the game.

Sandy Welton scored the first Raider tally with a 41-yard gallop over left tackle early in the first quarter. Other Tech scores came on 22 and 23-yard runs by Bobby Cavazos, two 6-yard keepers by Jerry Johnson, a 39-yard pass interception by End R. D. Tradshaw, an 80-yard kickoff return by Don Lewis, and Vic Spomer on a 35-yard pass play.

Several outstanding plays thrilled the crowd. Dean White stole a pass from two Wolfpack defenders on the NC State 10 while Lewis' 80-yard kickoff return to start the third quarter blazed the tart of four more Raider tallies. It would be hard to single out

Mental examinations are being given today through Saturday for men interested in the Navy's flight training program. Examination will be given at 9:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. at the U. S. Naval Armory on the campus. Applicants must be between 18 and 27 years of age.

Two days are required to complete the mental and physical tests. If the applicant passes the tests he is immediately sworn into the Cadet (V-5) Program and will be called to active duty four to six weeks later.

Cadets who successfully complete the 18-month training period will be commissioned as ensigns, U. S. Naval Reserve, or 2nd lieutenants, U. S. Marine Corps Reserve.
