Five Linemen Cut From Baylor Squad

Five members of Baylor University's football team, including the entire center of the famed Baylor line were kicked off the squad for breaking training rules.

"The Baylor Lariat" reports that Coach George Sauer has expelled from the team center Jim Taylor, guard Dan Miller, and guard Dugan Pierce. Taylor, Miller and Pierce were members of the first string varsity team and had played in most of Baylor's games this year. The other, two players losing their athletic scholarships were Jimmy Davenport and Paul Carver.

Sauer indicated that the "latest instance of rules infringement occurred in the early morning hours Saturday prior to the A&M-Baylor game."

Although the five are technically still in the school, they can never play on a Baylor football team again, nor can they ever play for another Southwest Conference team.

And at Texa A.M. two students have been suspended, one for theft and the other for unauthorized command of freshmen after taps. Both suspensions will remain in effect for the remainder of the school year.

Seventeen sophomores in the Aggie Band were campused until the end of the semester and placed on probation for the remainder of the year for marching down the quadrangle of the East Area at 3 a.m. playing "Texas Fight."

Excessive class cutting is now history at Davis and Elkins Cotlege in West Virginia. According to a new rule, upperclassmen are to be assessed a \$1 fine for each cut over the specified amount of cuts allowed. Freshmen aren't even considered. They may take only the regular amount of cuts, and if they insist on taking more than are allowed, they may be dropped from the roll any time the professor desires — with a final grade of F.


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
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

Tomorrow at 2 p.m., the Texas Tech Red Raider's will battle an Arizona eleven in the 28th Annual Homecoming game. The past Raider squads have won 16 Homecoming games while losing nine, and have never been tied, or held scoreless in any Homecoming event. The past Tech teams have held their opponents scoreless five times.

annual event by defeating University of New Mexico 32-6.
Baylor was Tech's victim in 1932. Lester Tribble, "Lefty" Sollis, and Aubrey Butts combined to make a triple threat to the defeating them 14-2.
In 1933, Tech got revenge on their first Homecoming opponents by defeating them 14-2.
In 1933, Tech got revenge on their first Homecoming opponents by defeating Hardin-Simmons 7-0.
Aubrey Butts played a big part in this game, too, along with "Mule" Dowell, and "Bear" Curfman. Dowell slipped across for the score after the three had moved the ball 72 yards downfield.
DePaw University fell under Tech in 1934, 48-19.
In 1935 Tech was handed its second Homecoming loss by this year's opponent, Arizona, 7-6. This was Tech's first loss to Arizona, and the first conference loss for Tech in four years.
In the 1936 game, Tech defeated the Centenary Gentlemen 12-6,

Tech's first Homecoming game was held in 1930, and was lost to Hardin-Simmons 20-6, but in 1931 13-0. Before the game, Duquesne Tech came back strong to take the annual event by defeating University of New Mexico 32-6.

Baylor was Techte with the Strong Strong

Gonzaga College gave Tech its hardest battle of the 1938 season, but was defeated 7-0.

In the 1946 game the Baylor Bears caused some excitement by scoring the first time they got possession of the ball, but settled down to have Tech defeat them 13-6.

The 1947 Homecoming game was the first game played in Jones Stadium, with Tech celebrating the event with a 14-6 defeat over Hardin-Simmons.

the event with a 14-6 defeat over Hardin-Simmons.

Tech was beaten in all Homecoming games the next three years. The Rice Owls beat them before an overflow crowd in the 1948 game, 14-7. The Baylor Bears fairly stomped Tech 28-7 in 1949, but Tulsa University handed Tech its worst Homecoming defeat in 1950, by a score of 39-7.

Tech evidently was fighting mad, and maybe a little desperate, for a homecoming victory, and got it in 1951, with a 41-0 win over Arizona. They must have celebrated too much, for Houston University ripped the Raiders wide open, 20-7, in 1952.

In 1953, Tech in one of its better years defeated Arizona, 52-7.

In 1954 Tech handed out its largest Homecoming score in the series to Tulsa University, 55-13.
