Rally Scheduled at 7:30 Tonight; Polls Will Open at 8 a.m. Tomorrow

Students will have the opportunity to meet candidates for Student Association officers, Student Council representatives, and cheerleaders tonight before going to the polls tomorrow.

The annual election rally will be held on the lawn west of the Student Union tonight at 7:30. All candidates will be introduced, and candidates for major offices and their campaign managers will each be given the opportunity to speak for two minutes. Candidates for cheerleader will lead yells.

Polls will open in 14 places in the morning at 8 o'clock for the general spring election. Students must present their identification cards to vote. Students who have not secured I. D. cards for this semester may pick them up at Herald's Studio on College Avenue.

Polls in the Administration, Agriculture, Home Economics, East Engineering, and Student Union Building will be open from 8 to 12 and 1 to 5. A poll in the West Engineering Building will be open from 8 to 12 only. Dormitory students will be given the opportunity to vote in their respective dorm from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Results of the voting will be posted on a board in the Student Union Building as votes are counted. Tabulations will begin at 5 p.m., and continue until counting is completed.

Candidates must present an itemized list of their campaign expenditures to the election committee in the Student Council Office before 5 p.m. today. Failure to do this will disqualify the candidate from competing in the election.

A runoff election, for those who fail to receive a majority, will be held April 20.

Amendments to be voted on by the students include the cheerleader amendment, which would allow popular election of all five cheerleaders, an amendment to allow Arts and Sciences to be represented on the Supreme Court, and an amendment allowing Student Council surplus funds to be placed in an account to earn interest.

Glen Cary, junior business administration student from Brownfield, and Don Brice, junior business administration student from Tahoka, are unopposed as candidates for Student Association president and business manager respectively. Candidates for other executive offices are: vice president, Ronnie Clark, Don Dilly, and Albert Troost; secretary, Huda Hassen, and Ette McGehee.

Cary, unopposed for president, states: "Although I am unopposed in this election, I would like to inform my fellow students that I will represent, serve and work for the entire student body of Texas Tech with all the energy I have. I will serve the students and the college to the best of my ability in an effort to make our great school a greater Texas Tech."

Clark, running for vice-president, states: "The first obligation of the Vice President is to carry out his duties of office in the best interests of the student body. From previous experience on the Student Council I am well aware of the need for better communication of student opinion to their Council. My pledge, if I am elected as your vice president, is that I will do everything in the power of that office to improve these communications and to represent the interests and opinions of the student body."

"Upon election to the office of vice president, a person also assumes other inherent responsibilities. These are the responsibilities of upholding the student constitution and assuming the various committee responsibilities. My pledge in regard to the student constitution is that I will not only uphold it, but that I will attempt to search it out and determine if there are those areas in which it is obsolete and which should be brought to the student's attention."

"The various committees I would become a member of if I am elected vice president are determined both by the constitution and the appointments of the president of the student body. Among these committees are the Publications Committee and the Out-of-Town Trip Committee. In both of these areas I have had a great deal of experience."

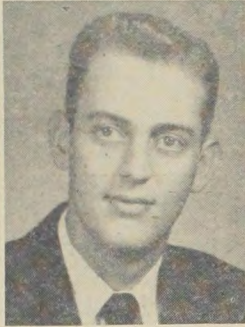
"I have served for over a year on the Publications Committee. During this time I have had the opportunity to conduct several surveys and to become well acquainted with the publications process and its problems. We meet twice weekly publication of the Toreador next year. I believe that this experience will be invaluable in determining matters of policy. Based on this experience, an indisputable qualification, I pledge myself to continue to further better publication, and above all to see that the best interests of the student body are respected."

"In the instance of the out-of-town trip, I have been very closely allied with its organization, operation, and problems. Having worked and gone on the out-of-

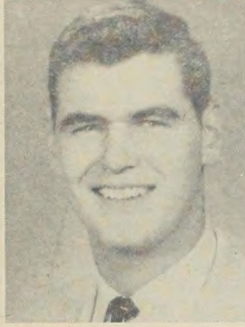

College Directors Request Property For Frat Houses

A step toward fraternity housing on the Tech campus was taken Saturday, April 2, by the college board of directors.

A request to the Texas Legislature to permit leasing of land for construction of housing for fraternities was approved at the meeting. The board also expressed opposition to dormitory-type housing outlined by Nolan Barrick, college architect.

Barrick's proposal would provide flexible and economical housing for 143 students in each housing unit on a quadrangle in the 19th St. vicinity, he said. Each unit would cost approximately \$494,000 and would house a total of 714 students. Each unit could house two fraternities and an independent group, or could be designed for all-fraternity groups.

Single unit chapter houses, if constructed, would result in the fraternity of each unit paying 25 per cent of the cost and the rest by the college revenue bonds which the fraternity chapters would retire. This would increase their holdings in the houses until the bonds were fully retired.

Classes To Begin In Radio Theory

Students and others wishing to qualify for an amateur radio license may enroll in a series of classes in international Morse code and basic radio theory. The classes are to be offered to the public this spring by the Signal Club of the Texas Tech Army ROTC.

The classes, beginning today, will be designed to qualify persons for amateur radio licenses, according to Maj. Leo A. Dietrich, Tech ROTC Signal Corps instructor. Dietrich will supervise the training. Classes will be Tuesday and Thursday nights, 7-8 o'clock. Enrollees will be required to attend only one class per week.

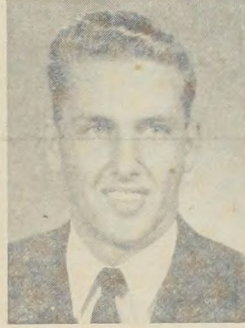

The Committee met Wednesday afternoon to interview applicants for editor and business manager of The Toreador and La Ventana.

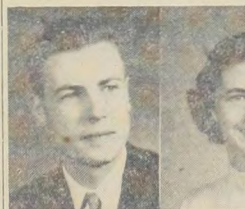

Delta Sigma Pi Names Clark President; Chooses Other Officers for Coming Year

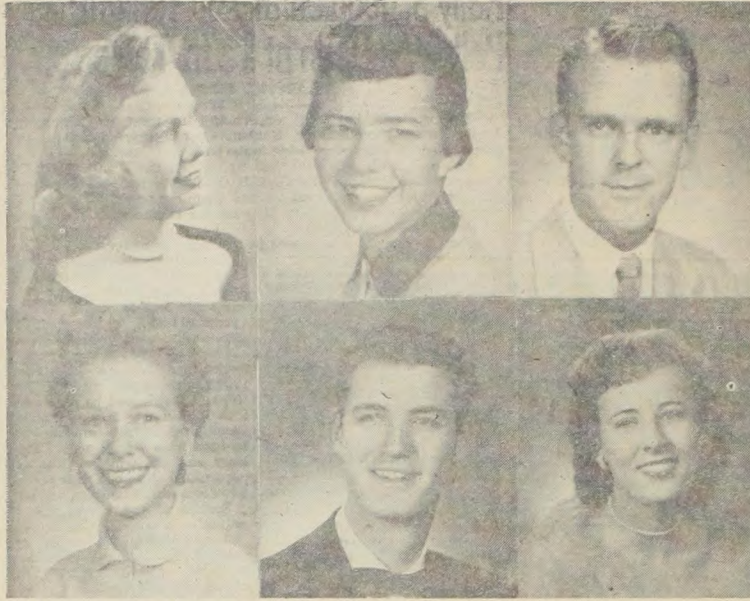

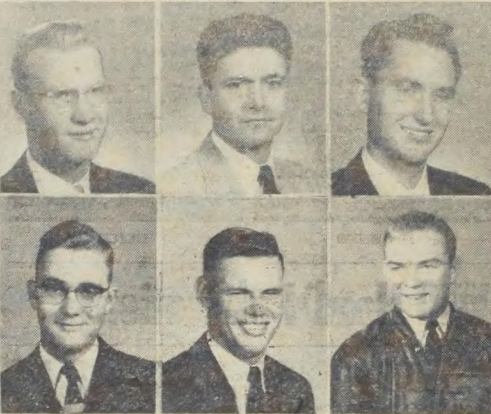

times, he may find that his over-sized feet land him in awkward situations.

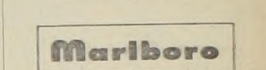

Candidates Seek Council Spots

Election To Produce 7 To Represent Division

A packed ballot of 14 candidates are seeking the seven positions open to them as Arts and Sciences representatives on the Student Council.

The candidates and their platforms include:

RONNIE AVERYT, Andrews junior: "I have enjoyed very much serving the students of the Division of Arts and Sciences as one of their representatives in the Student Council this past year. In fulfillment of my campaign promise, and in addition to them, I have:

1. Kept the council informed of the work of Dr. Giesecke, the Council of Deans and the Faculty Advisory Committee regarding a program for the improvement of instruction.

2. Succeeded in placing the ballot on a constitutional amendment calling for the election of all officers, voters, on it as you wish but you have the opportunity to decide if you think how you want your cheerleaders elected.

3. Served as the Tech correspondent to the Texas Intercollegiate Student Association, and on Elections, Recognitions, Defeat Week and Library Committees.

"Promises not made are no good and I can give you no absolute guarantee of being able to carry them out. But I have always tried to represent you as fairly and fully as the students of the Division.

"It has been a pleasure to serve you this year and you may be assured I shall continue to look out for YOUR interests."

JACK BADGETT, Floydada senior: "My interest in the student council stems from a belief that an effective student government is essential to harmonious relations between the Administration and students. I would like to participate in this coordination of mutual interest, and if elected, will support the desires of all the students."

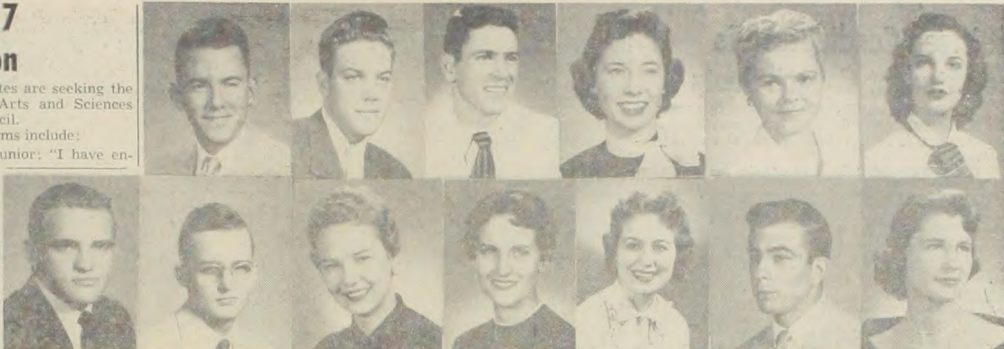

11 Candidates Will Vie For Seats On Council

The Division of Business Administration will be allowed five representatives on next year's Student Council. Candidates and their platforms are:

BRUCE CAMPBELL, Pampa sophomore: "I shall endeavor to uphold the high standards of the student body and Texas Tech. At all times, the betterment of conditions of campus life and activities shall be foremost in my mind and actions. I shall attempt to promote better relations between the administration, the faculty, and the individual student. Under the present expanding conditions here at Tech, a more open and straightforward thinking must be maintained, and I shall make every attempt to do exactly this."

DAN DAVIS, Lubbock junior: "I believe the representative should vote as his fellow students direct him to vote. Issues to come before the Student Council should be discussed by students with their representative before his vote is cast. One person cannot judge by himself what is right in all cases. Full representation is my platform. A representative should be representative."

JIM ETHRIDGE, Fabens senior: "Promises made with the honest intention of their fulfillment or as mere words in a political device, are still promises. They mean nothing to me. In fact, I had rather not even hear them. Although I do not hold certain opinions about current problems on the campus, I make no promises that I will, or will not bring about certain changes. 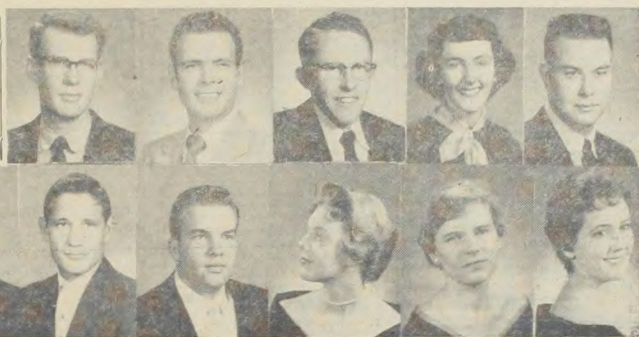
"2. I intend to work for a real and practical solution to the parking problem—either more space or less cars—at least a solution! I also believe that there should be marked places for disabled students."

Engineers Decare Platforms in Campaign

Thirteen Candidates Vie For Student Council Seats

"I believe that my interest in your aims and beliefs merits your support of my candidacy for Engineering Representative to the Student Council."

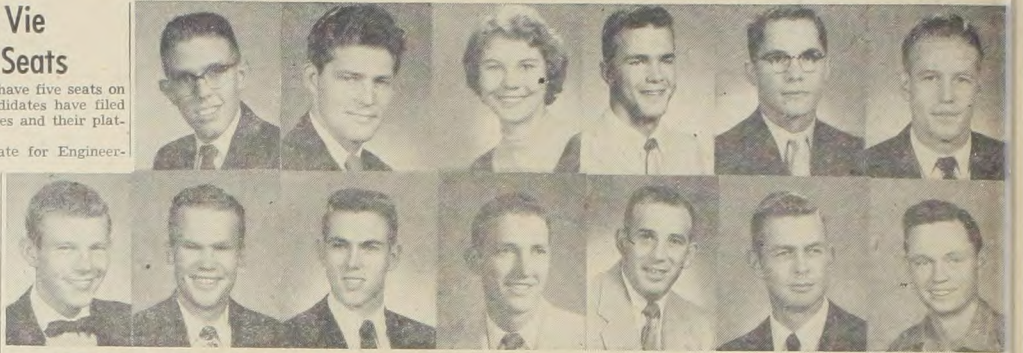
"Specifically, I will support the will of the students in regard to the compulsory student activity fee."
