John Orman Stalnaker Jr., a 21-year-old Tech freshman from Houston, was found dead in his bed at his rooming house at 2101 13 St. shortly after 6:30 a.m. Sat-

THE STUDENT COUNCIL has been working two years on the proposed in-surance plan for the Tech student body. It appears as though their labors are going to bear fruit.

ing to bear fruit. The plan, which is to be mailed out Thursday, is due to be acted on at the July 1 Board of Directors meeting. The Board will decide on which bid to ac-cept or even whether to cancel the en-tire project if they should so wish. Insurance will then be available at the start of the Fall semester on a strictly voluntary basis to the entire student body. If the plan ar proposed by the

If the plan as proposed by the Council goes through, it appears to be a good one. Its coverage includes accident,

sickness and hospital. One especially good feature, if it goes through, is the intramural sports clause. This would provide compensa-tion for any injury received while playing an intramural sport. Coverage would not be limited

strictly to campus, but would be either

on-campus or off and would be good 24 hours a day for one year.

In the plan benefits would be paid regardless of any other insurance the stu-dent might have. There would be no restriction in any way for pre-existing sicknesses

Finally, the insurance company would be bound to the premium for a period of two years without raising rates, thus insuring the continuance of a fair

Overall, this plan would be well worth the average student's money. The plan would give the student a buffer, provided he had no insurance, to soften the blow of any serious accident. If he had insurance, this would be further pro-tection

We would say the efforts of the Council were well worth the trouble. It will be a fine service to the Tech stu-

Rat Diets Give Parallels To Human Diets for Study

How does a freshman girl feel taking care of rats for the food and nutrition department? Gayle Kilgore, Home Ec edu-cation major from Lubbock, says: "At first I was scared to death of them, but now I'm getting used to it."

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


