## Crosswalk lights due soon

Students may soon see crosswalk
lights at the intersection of Main Street
and University Avenue after being told
for more than a year the lights would be
installed.
Student Association External Vice
President David Beseda and Student
Senator Danny Koch contacted the
contractor in-charge ef the construction
about a month ago to find out if the
crosswalk would ever be completed.
THE CONTRACTOR told Beseda and
Koch that the service drive con-
struction between Sneed Hall and the
Sneed-Gordon-Bledsoe dining hall had
to be completed before the city would
put in a crosswalk light. He also said,
the drive had lower priority than the
completion of the loop system and
Music Building and Knapp-Horn
parking lots.
However, the contractor said if the
list of priorities were changed, the
service drive could be temporarily
blocked off.
Beseda said he and Koch then con-
tacted Fred Wehmeyer Vice President
of administrative affairs about
changing the priorities for con-
> struction. Beseda said if priorities had
been set by the time contracts were
awarded for construction, the service awarded for construction, the service

When the Women's Continuum, a program to assist women returning to school, was started point in a variety of programming a starting students.

just a few of the universities with strong programs for women, said Denning.
nOW THAT THE Women's Continuum has gotten off the ground, a group of people on campus who are interested in women's programming, have started to make plans for their next step. The problem now is one of
assessing needs, said Barbara Pillows, a assessing needs, said Barbara Pillow
coordinator of the Women's Continuum.
"we feel a
"We feel a need to expand and take the burden off the student life office," said Ann
Morgan, director of international programs who Morgan, director of international programs who is also instrumental in planning for women's
programs. "We would like to coordinate the efforts of different campus organizations and pull together for common goals.
The Women's Continuum is funded by the Office of Student Life.

SEVERAL HAVE EXPRESSED concern over whether programming for women has been given recagnition, by the university. Dr. Louise Luchsinger, Business Administration professor, ministration there is a need for women's programs.

Three general areas have been set up under
a women's resource center, according to
Morgan. The first committee will work on career orientation. It will supply information on traditional careers for women, she said, and help women do serious career planning.

THE SECOND DIVISION will concentrate on junior and senior women students who are
interested in job strategy, according to Morgan. Interested in job strategy, according to Morgan. It will include information on resume writing,
interviews, who can help get graduates a job and how to deal with discrimination in hiring and on the job.

The third division will continue to concentrate on returning women students. Morgan

Counseling Center who works with the returning women, said there has been a strong response for programs for women in life transitions. She said the programs are for women who are undergoing major changes in their lives and are seeking personal growth in returning to hool.

"The professor may be our contemporary in age but he is not in expertise," said Barton. "He is the expert in the area and returning student.

Barton made several observations on returning students' participation in class.
"We are inclined to talk more in class," she said. "This is an interesting and new experience for most women and they enjoy being there so much more than the other students.
"WE TEND TO overdo the course and dominate discussions. Most are so overly con
cerned they may not succeed in their new yen cerned
tures."

Despite some apprehension about returning to school, once they are there women find the experience is worthwhile.

It's great to get back and do something for yourself," said Barton. "After years of being family - centered and others - centered, it is good to be able to develop your own talents and caree or intellectual interests.

when they attempt suicide. Male when they are more likely to attemp suicide because they have failed to achieve success. Female students usually attempt suicide when personal relationships fail According to Betty Ross, director of Sontact tubbock, students that contemplate suicide feel
that they are trapped in an intolerable situation. They think they have failed to live up to the expectations of family and society. There is often a loss of self esteem and a lack of purpose.
One-fourth of the calls received by Contact Lubbock are from people under age 25. The most coinmon method of suicide is by drugs, according to Ross, particularly in the case of women. They
do not want to use a gun because it do not want to use a gun because it
would be disfiguring. Men use guns more often than women, she said. Barry Wood, university minister of the First Baptist Church, feels many students with suicidal tendencies may
be able to find a purpose in life but they be able to find a purpose in life but they that purpose out.

"Should someone be depressed and considering the possibility of ending his life, he needs to talk to somebody," Gordhamer said. 'He should get some other viewpoints on it. "A mistrial is ordered," said the judge. He said the trial should be rescheduled no later than Dec. 20 , when a new panel of prospective jurors would be called.
