Twenty-Six Matador Football Players Are Lettered; Forty Picadors To Receive Numerals

Awards To Be Made At College Fun Night In January; Must Pass All Scholastic Work To Be Eligible

W. L. Stange, chairman of the Texas Tech athletic council, announced last week that 26 Matador gridsters will receive varsity letter sweaters and 40 freshmen footballers will be awarded numeral sweaters.

Because of Coach P. W. Cawthon's system of playing two or more complete teams in each game, the council voted to award the largest number of letters in the history of the school in naming 26 players and the student manager, "Bo" Williams. From 22 to 33 Tech gridsters participated in single games during the past season. Matadors and Picadors will receive their sweaters at the college fun night program sometime in January. To be eligible for these awards, the candidates must measure up scholastically at the end of the term.

Four Matador regulars will receive their Double T for the third and last time. They are Harold Crites of Lubbock, Milton Moffett of Stanton, Bill Teal of Enochis, and Ross Ayers of Curo.

Ten members of the squad will get their letters for the second time, while 13 sophomore gridsters will be awarded their first varsity sweaters.

Matador Cagers End 3rd Week Of Court Drill

Tech Basketeers To Remain In Lubbock For Practice During Holidays; Games Are Scheduled

Coach Del Morgan is sending his Matador cagers through their third week of intensive training, and will not let up until Christmas day, when they will be given a one day holiday. The entire squad will not go home for the holiday season, but will stay in Lubbock to put the final touches on the 1933 hoop artists.

Fundamentals Stressed
Morgan has already spent two weeks on the fundamentals and floor work departments of the game, and is now working out charts on defensive and offensive plans. Signal drill, tip-off plays and sideline plays are being stressed at present. During the holidays, the squad may scrimmage among themselves or take on some of the second string players, who are also staying in Lubbock.

The latest schedule released for publication on the new basketball season is as follows: home games; House of David, January 3 and 6; Randolph Field Flyers of San Antonio, January 13; Oklahoma City university February 1 and 2; New Mexico Military Institute of Roswell, February 6 and 7; Durant Teachers (Okla.); February 17. Games scheduled away for home so far are the New Mexico university Lobos at Albuquerque and Las Vegas Normal. The Matadors meet the Las Vegas outfit February 8 and 9 and then journey to Albuquerque to meet the Lobos on the 10 and 11 of February.

Novelty Acts Planned

Bill Stubbs is in charge of the tumbling class, and has created a number of novelty acts to be presented between halves of the basketball games for the 1933 season. Boxing instructors have not as yet been named, but a student instructor will be placed in charge of this class. Lester Tribble, who was in charge of the wrestling class last year, will probably be appointed to the same position this year.

Plans are at present to take the boxing, wrestling, and tumbling teams to Tucson to compete in the sports carnival to be held there next spring.
